Junior High At Dallas Has More Pupils

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DALLAS, Sept. 12—Completion of a pre-school registration here today indicated a sizeable enrollment gain in the junior high school, while more students after the start of classes next Monday, 358 pupils had signed for the seventh through ninth grades in preliminary registration this week.

Principal Kenneth Wait predicted that enrollment would read some 430 students in the three grades as compared to 390 a year ago. The junior high building this year will also include the sixth grade and a section of fifth grade, due to shortage of elementary classroom space.

Enrollment in Dallas High School will be about the same as last year, Principal Carl Morrison predicted. A total of 276 students had signed for sophomore, junior and senior classes by the close Wednesday of pre-school registration.

Morrison believes enrollment will reach 337 students, the same as last year.

The junior high has enrolled 22 students who are new to the district, while the senior high has enrolled 23 new students.
