

Extension of One-Way Grid Awaits Traffic, Rail Lights

One-way traffic across newly widened 12th Street on four streets north of the Capitol area will go into effect with completion of traffic and railroad crossing signals about the middle of next month.

Farm Income Up But Buying Power Dips

CORVALLIS, Sept. 20 (AP)—Oregon farmers handled more money last year, but fewer of the dollars stuck in their pockets, Oregon State College reported today. Gross farm income was 445 million dollars, 15 million more than in 1954, but farmers came out with a net income of 144.4 million, which was \$700,000 less than in 1954 and the lowest since records were started in 1949, said Elvera Horrell, Extension Service agricultural economist.

With fewer farms in the state the net income averaged \$2,532, which was \$26 more than in 1954 but \$771 below the peak in 1951. The economist said the Oregon average was \$200 above the national average with Oregon ranking 18th among the states. Farm income varied widely among the states with the Western farms in the highest bracket. "So far this year we have not kept pace. Oregon's cash receipts from the sales of farm products during the first seven months were running behind the same months last year. We have as yet no indication of the direction Oregon's production expenses are taking. Nationally prices on production items during the first quarter of the year were below the first quarter 1955 prices, but had caught up by mid-year," the economist said.

Group Formed To Support Tax Measure

Further organization of a Marion-Polk Citizens Committee supporting ballot measure No. 1 was made at a Thursday night meeting at the Hotel Senator. The measure would give the Legislature authority to pass tax bills with an emergency clause.

Arthur M. Erickson, Salem, chairman of the committee, said plans have been made for an educational campaign to acquaint the public with purpose of the measure. In placing the measure on the ballot, the 1955 Legislature pointed out that legislators are handicapped because present law does not permit immediate placing of tax plans into immediate effect. The emergency clause permits such action. Erickson said Oregon is the only state in the land without emergency clause provisions. Bruce Pickett was named chairman of the advertising and publicity committee of the organization. Al Locks and Lee Ohmart will serve as co-chairmen of the Speakers Bureau and Gardner Kropf was picked as co-chairman of the finance committee, with other co-chairmen to be named later.

Al Head, assistant state traffic engineer, said Thursday. Southern Pacific Railroad representatives in Portland said they could not tell when installation of crossing gates will start because of a delay in receiving materials. Head said, however, that railroad signalmen have indicated that the installations will be advanced by Oct. 15 at least to the stage where warning signals can be coordinated with the traffic lights.

One-Way Traffic
Extension of one-way traffic east to 12th Street on Court, Chemeketa, Marion and Center streets will go in effect when the signals are turned on, Head said. Capitol Street from Court to Center Street also will be made one-way for northbound traffic, he said. Since the entire length of 12th Street was opened to traffic Tuesday, four-way stops have been in effect at the busy intersections. Traffic on Capitol Street, which has been running 10,000 cars a day, dropped to 7,000 Wednesday, the first full day 12th Street was open, Head said.

Bridge Project
Work started on widening of the 12th Street bridge near Southern Pacific depot, but its completion is expected to take several months, Head said. Two-way traffic will be maintained, however, as well as on the city-financed widening of Pringle Creek bridge to the south, which City Engineer Harold Davis said will be completed before the end of the year.

Estate of Elder Nixon Estimated At Over \$15,000

SANTA ANA, Calif., Sept. 20 (AP)—The will of Frank A. Nixon, father of Vice President Richard M. Nixon, was filed Wednesday in Superior court. The elder Nixon died at his La Habra home Sept. 4 after a long illness. He was 77. The will, drawn last May 20, left more than \$5,000 in personal property and "in excess" of \$10,000 in real property to his wife, Hannah.

Man Breaks Into Jail at Klamath

KLAMATH FALLS, Sept. 20 (AP)—A man who scaled the county jail wall to a second-story window wound up on the inside today. Lewis Shipps, 28, Virginia, Calif., gold miner, was refused permission to visit a prisoner on the jail. When he started going up the wall, Jailor Fred Calfee arrested him for vagrancy. "If you like our jail so well I'll fix it so you can get in," District Judge Van Vactor told Shipps. "Thirty days."

Steer Found in Sorority House

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Sept. 20 (AP)—Mrs. Jewel Spangler, housekeeper for the Alpha Chi Omega sorority at Purdue University, opened the house for the new semester Wednesday and found a visitor. A 1,200-pound steer was strolling nonchalantly about the living room. The steer was removed in time for 48 girls to move in, but damage to the living room carpet and walls was estimated at \$2,000. Police said the animal was stolen from the university livestock barns.

BLM Income Sets Record

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—A record \$100,992,686 was taken in by the Bureau of Land Management during 1955-56 from its long established public land management activities, the Interior Department announced today. This compared with \$97,144,101, the previous record, for the book-keeping year 1954-55.

In addition, the bureau received \$111,223,856 during the year ended June 30 from oil and gas leasing of submerged lands in the outer continental shelf in the Gulf of Mexico. That total compared with \$142,404,630 for 1954-55, when the offshore leasing was started. The department said 26 states and Alaska this week are receiving their final shares of the record 1955-56 receipts. Checks totaling \$13,845,865 are being delivered. These represent leasing receipts for the last half of the fiscal year and their share of receipts from grazing leases and public land and timber sales for the full year. A year ago the final payments totaled \$13,071,775.

Wyoming received the highest amount, \$4,822,774, and New Mexico was next with \$2,487,574. The state receiving the lowest payment was Illinois—\$1. Missouri got \$6.10.

Handicapped Week Proclaimed by Ike

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—President Eisenhower today set the week beginning Oct. 7 as "National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week." He said that "opportunity for employment should not be denied any qualified person because of a physical handicap." Eisenhower issued a proclamation calling on the nation to observe the week for the 12th time. He urged "increased community efforts to overcome misconceptions among employers and co-workers concerning the handicapped." When properly placed, he said, they make "efficient, reliable, and loyal employees and fellow workers."

NO WAR PROMISED
JERUSALEM, Israeli Sector, Sept. 20 (AP)—Israeli Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion declared today in a newspaper interview that Israel never would make war against the Arab states while he remains at the helm.

Solution Ends Paper Plant Pollution Row

PORTLAND (AP)—The Georgia-Pacific Corp. promised not to dump wastes from a proposed 20 million dollar pulp and paper plant on Yaquina Bay and the state withdrew its objections to the plant today.

The company will have to build a pipeline from the proposed plant at Toledo to Newport and on to the ocean to dump the waste. Oyster growers of Yaquina Bay said they no longer objected to the plant if wastes were to be dumped in the ocean. They said earlier dumping into the bay would damage or destroy oyster beds.

Union Asks for Bargaining Right At St. Helens

PORTLAND, Sept. 20 (AP)—The Associated Millworkers, an independent union, has petitioned for recognition as bargaining agent for workers at the Fix-Tex plant at St. Helens.

The plant was struck in April, 1955, by the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union after prolonged negotiations failed. The plant shut down but later reopened when non-union employees went through the picket lines. The independent union, asking recognition from the National Labor Relations Board office here, said it had made a similar request to the company last March but got no reply.

Canary Seed Tests Fail

PENDLETON, Sept. 20 (AP)—Two dozen Umatilla County farmers are growing canary seed in an experiment this year. So far the experiment seems to have failed. The harvest is much below expectations, but the growers said they had learned what mistakes to avoid. "Guess we'll try it again next year," one of them said. Canary seed, used both as a feed for birds and for floral sprays, also has been tried in Montana, North and South Dakota. The bulk of it used in this country comes from Morocco and Turkey. Farmers here have found it grows in areas with as little as 11 inches of rain a year, and that fields planted early have the better crops.
