

# 'Red Hat Days' Program Opens

Governor Elmo Smith's annual "Red Hat Days" campaign, one designed to improve hunter conduct, obtain safer hunting practices and create a better understanding between landowners and sportsmen opens today.

All Oregon hunters are invited to become members of the campaign. The pledge—"Be a careful sportsman, be law abiding, respect the life and property of others and care for fire and firearms." The governor and his committee have again stated the "10 Commandments of Safety" with a hope that all hunters will this year live by them. The commandments are as follows:

- 1: Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. 2: Always carry a loaded gun home.

Hunters remember:

or when otherwise in use, must always be unloaded. 3: Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. 4: Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot. 5: Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt. 6: Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while handling a gun. 7: Unattended guns should be unloaded and kept beyond reach of children and care-less adults. 8: Never climb a tree or fence, or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle. 9: Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water. 10: Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

The Brittany is becoming quite popular in the western states and each year finds his numbers increasing and the owners praising their fast, stylish work. ## Some Anglers Don't Play Things Right

There is increasing unrest amongst the salmon sports anglers as to the number of commercial licenses being issued to non-commercial fishermen. We have had many calls of late asking if there is not some measure to be taken to stop the indiscriminate issuing of commercial licenses to anglers who use the licenses, not for the commercial sale of salmon, but for the purpose of catching a boat load of fish every time they venture out so that they may keep the fish on their friends and neighbors.

As far as we can see, there is little to be done about it at the present time. The Oregon Fish Commission should be well aware of the fact that many of the issued commercial licenses are not used by fishermen who make their living fishing. Until such time as the existing laws and regulations governing commercial fishing and the issuance of licenses are changed, we're afraid there will be little change. Except that there will be more commercial licenses issued.

Salmon fishing has been good off the mouth of the Nestucca with some hefty chinooks and silvers being

# Speedy Buddy Young Quits Gridiron Sport

BALTIMORE, Sept. 20 (AP)—Buddy Young no longer will amaze professional football fans by being bounced around by players who made him look like a Pygmy and coming back for more.

After nine years of running around with the biggest and best players in the country, the sawed-off 170-pound Negro decided today he'd had enough.

"I could continue in the game, but I believe the Baltimore Colts have progressed to the point where the new boys should get a full chance to play," said the 29-year-old football runt of five feet, four inches.

One of Reasons

Another Negro, Lenny Moore, is one of the reasons Young feels it's time to quit. Moore, a halfback from Penn State, has shown signs in exhibition games of becoming a new National Football League star.

Young is credited with helping to bring Moore to Baltimore. Moore was tempted with an offer from Canadian football after being drafted by the Colts last winter. Young drove up to University Park, Pa., and convinced Moore he should come to Baltimore. On the way back, Young was caught in a snow storm and had to sleep in his car overnight.

Young wanted to retire last spring, but Don Kellest, president of the Colts, talked him into attending training camp this summer "until we were sure of our backfield talent."

In addition to Moore, the Colts picked up Billy Vessels, the former star halfback at Oklahoma, after he had eluded them for three years in Canadian football and the Army.

Young turned pro in 1947 after starring at Illinois, in the Rose Bowl, and that year's college All-Star game in his native Chicago. He played four years in New York with the Yanks of the now defunct All-American Conference. The franchise and Young moved to Dallas in the National Football League and landed in Baltimore in 1953.

Although he was smothered countless times by the giants of the game when they could catch him, Young's most serious injury in his long career with the pros was a broken rib.

Young possessed dazzling speed.

# Fresh Salmon Runs Noted

The Oregon State Game Commission reported in its weekly fishing bulletin Thursday that fresh runs of chinook and silver salmon have been noted in many of the western Oregon streams. Chinooks are running in tide-water at the mouth of the Salmon River; silver jacks and adult salmon are being taken in the Nestucca, and the Tillamook, Wilson, Killechis, Miami and Umpqua rivers have also been yielding, according to the commission.

The weekly report for the five sections of the state is as follows:

**NORTHWEST**  
Chinook salmon are running in tide-water at the mouth of the Salmon River. Silver jacks and adults are being taken near highway 101 bridge on the Little Nestucca. Half and half spinners have proved the best lure. On the Nestucca river fresh runs of jacks are being taken upstream to the fifth bridge above Beaver. Adult chinooks are in the holes below Hebo. Tillamook jacks are in the Wilson river up to Kansas creek bridge. Both silver and chinook jacks are in the Killechis and Miami rivers. Sea-run cutthroats are being taken in tide-water and up river in all streams of the Tillamook area. Fishing continues fair in the streams of the upper Willamette valley. Lookout Point and Dexter reservoirs are poor. Water is low in Dorena. Clear lake is producing a few good catches.

**SOUTHWEST**  
A few sea-run cutthroats are being caught from the Umpqua from the community of Umpqua to Winchester. All other trout fishing is very slow, except for the extreme upper North Umpqua in the Lemolo and Tokelee reservoir areas where fair catches are being taken. Summer steelhead angling is very poor. The run in the North Umpqua is not good. Only an occasional salmon is being caught from the upper sections of the main Umpqua river. A few fish are in, but the river is quite low. Some rain and a little freshet should stimulate considerable activity along those lines. Salmon angling (Continued page 31, col. 1)

# Milwaukee '9' Game Behind

Bob Friend Proves No Friend of Haney

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 20 (AP)—Bob Clemente's two-out 10th inning single gave the Pittsburgh Pirates a 2-1 victory over Milwaukee today and dropped the Braves a full game behind the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers with only seven games remaining in the drama-packed National League race.

Right-hander Bob Friend, the Pittsburgh pitching ace, stopped the pennant contenders with a last 4th-inning masterpiece to bring his season record to 16-16. Clemente's single broke a 1-1 deadlock after the Braves knotted the score in the ninth with the aid of two errors by Pirate first sacker Dale Long.

Bill Mazerowski led off the Pittsburgh tenth with his second hit of the game, moved to second on a sacrifice and tallied on Clemente's solid smash to center.

Crone Gets Loss  
It was Friend's first victory since Aug. 26. The loss went to relief Ray Crone.

Jack Sheppard's seventh homer of the season—a 370-foot poke over the left field wall—put the Pirates ahead and in the seventh and they had the game in the bag until Long blew it with his two miscues.

Chuck Tanner, batting for Milwaukee starter Bob Buhl, walked to lead off the ninth and moved to second on a sacrifice. Frank Torre then bounced out second to first and Tanner moved to third. With two out, Hank Aaron grounded to shortstop but Long (Continued page 30, col. 3)

# 126-Pounders On TV Tonight

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 20 (AP)—A pair of ambitious featherweights, Miguel Berrios and Ike Chestnut, meet tomorrow night at Detroit in a 10-round nationally televised bout. Berrios, a Puerto Rican fighting out of New York, ranks sixth among the contenders for a shot at Sandy Saddler, king of the 126-pounders. Chestnut, also of New York, currently is ninth in the ratings.

Berrios, only 5-foot-2, likes to crowd inside and hammer his man with hooks to head and body. Chestnut, a more orthodox boxer, has a sharp left jab to pave the way for a strong right followup. He is about three inches taller than Berrios and has a correspondingly longer reach.

The Puerto Rican has an 18-6 win and lost record to 22-5-3 for Chestnut. The bout will be televised (NBC) at 6 p. m. (PST).

# Diamond Star Lost in Crash

BALTIMORE, Sept. 20 (AP)—Tommy Gastall, 23-year-old Baltimore Oriole bonus catcher, was overdue tonight from a solo airplane flight and was believed to have crashed into Chesapeake Bay.

Gastall, Boston University baseball star signed by the Orioles for a reported \$40,000 last season, took off from Harbor Field at 4:30 p. m. (EDT) today with five hours' fuel.

He radioed the tower about 90 minutes later that he was in trouble but static and other interference prevented the tower operator from learning exactly what was wrong or the location of the plane.

Tower Operator James J. Wellner said there was considerable interference, static and noise from other speakers, but he thought the pilot mentioned "fire" and said he was diving for the water.
