Armory Bid Call Slated At Woodburn

National Guard Structure Cost Near \$160,000

Statesman News Service WOODBURN, Sept. 20 — Bids for Woodburn's new National Guard Armory will be called about Nov. 1, it was reported here today.

Cost of the armory is estimated at \$160,000, according to Gen. Thomas Riley, Oregon adjutant general. Preliminary plans for the building have been approved, he said.

The building will be erected in the northwest part of the city, near Legion Park, and will replace the present downtown armory.

The one-level building will be located on a three-acre tract purchased by the city with the cooperation of the North Marion County fair board from Mr. and Mrs. Albert Lemmey and turned over to the state of Oregon. The armory will cover 16,911 square feet of space.

Large Drill Hall Due Included in the building will be a 7,000-square foot drill hall with arched roof, a rifle range, a classroom which can be divided by folding partitions into three rooms, unit storage, locker rooms, four administrative offices, and a boiler room.

The main part of the structure will be of reinforced concrete designed for tilt-up construction. The concrete floor will be poured first, then the wall panels poured on this base and lifted into place. The wing projecting west of the main building will be the classroom, day room and administrative section, and will be of SCR brick with tile floor.

Space has been provided for the parking of cars and for a future 40 by 96-foot tank stand. John F. Jensen of Portland is the architect.
