

Political Note Also Included in Games

BROOKLYN, Oct. 2—When the President of the United States attends a World Series game, it calls for a lot of extra doing.

The box seat layout had to be revised for President Eisenhower's visit to Ebbets Field tomorrow. The chief executive, with a party of 12 (Mamie's not along), will sit near the Brooklyn dugout and will toss out the first ball.

He will arrive at 12:35 p.m. (EDT)—25 minutes before the start—like a true fan, so he can witness the final warmups.

Twenty Secret Service men will be spotted—unrecognizable—at various key spots. A group of the Times made a thorough inspection of the Ebbets Field layout today.

Wonder if Democratic candidate Adlai Stevenson, who'll attend the opener at Yankee Stadium Friday, will ask equal time—and equal seating space?

The last President to attend a World Series game was the late Franklin D. Roosevelt, who watched the Yankees beat the Giants at the Polo Grounds in 1936.

"I remember I caught Hank Luber's fly for the final out," Joe DiMaggio recalls. "I ran up the steps to the dressing room, only to find it locked. I just had to stand there with the ball in my hand. Nobody could leave the park until the President had made his exit."

Cry for Beer Recalled in Hoover's Time

Fans recall that during the depression era, when Herbie Hoover attended a game, the spectators chanted, "We want beer."

The city will have 500 uniformed policemen on hand to direct traffic, watch pickpockets and keep order.

Other Lefties Win, So Ford Will Try

Whitey Ford, the Yankees' starting pitcher, welcomes the challenge of pitching in Ebbets Field, a nightmare for most lefthanders. "John Antonelli of the Giants and Joe Nuxhall of the Redlegs was there this year, and they're as lefthanded as I am. I want to prove I can win in the Brooklyn park."

The veteran of both Yankee and Dodger casts is the Brooklyn Captain Dewey Bessie, playing in his seventh World Series. In Ebbets he pitched 237.1 innings, about one-third regular season. He's a lefty.

Another pitcher who has won 15 World Series is "Lefty" Grove, who pitched a second time for the Yankees in August. Slaughter played his first World Series in 1947 as a reliever, helping beat the Yankees, and he played with the Cubs against the Boston Red Sox in 1946. "Nobody like that below in a short series," despite his 40 years or whatever they say he is, commented Stengel.

Knox to Sign With Calgary

CALGARY, Oct. 2—Bonnie Knox, former UCLA and Hamilton Tigercat quarterback, has come to terms with the Calgary Stampede of Western Interprovincial Football Union (WIFU), club secretary Pat Mahoney announced tonight.

The six-foot-one, 200-pound player, who arrived here with his stepfather, Harvey, this morning, will sign a contract tomorrow. Young Knox worked out with Calgary tonight.

Harvey said he liked the idea of Bonnie playing with the exciting Stampede because of the challenge it provided for him.

In an interview shortly after his arrival, Harvey made it clear that while he was spokesman for the Knox family, it didn't necessarily mean he made all the decisions.

"I don't want to say whether he's a good football player or a lousy one—we may as well let the Calgary fans decide on his ability, for you know you can't fool the fans," Knox said.

Ronnie, who chose to leave UCLA after he was one of a group of Bruins penalized by the Pacific Coast Conference, played in only two games with Hamilton before quitting the team.

Trojan Stars Leading PCC

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 2—C. R. Roberts, Southern California's crashing rambler, and Stanford's passing ace John Brodie rank one-two in the Pacific Coast Conference offense issued today.

After two games, Roberts has racked up 294 yards, all on the ground in 23 plays. Brodie has amassed 280 yards, all but one via the air, in 32 plays.

Third is SC's Jon Arnett, with 250—168 rushing, 89 passing.

Bruins, averaging 123 yards per carry, is better than 100 yards ahead of Jack Morris, Oregon, with 100 in the rushing department.

Brodie has completed 27 passes in 34 attempts for 608 net yards. Washington State's Bob Newman with 21 for 36 and 269 yards is the second ranking passer.

Arnett leads the PCC scorers with 22 points, on three touchdowns and four conversions.

Police Arrest UCLA 'Back

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 2—Gerry McDougall, UCLA halfback sidelined by Pacific Coast Conference edict for a half season, warmed the bench in West Los Angeles jail today.

McDougall, 21, and another UCLA student, Richard E. Molen, 23, were arrested on suspicion of burglary after Fay Gordon, 20, stonographer, told police they took a clock radio, record player and about \$6 from her apartment near the campus.

McDougall said they were playing a practical joke.

"It's all a misunderstanding," the senior tailback said. "We only took the stuff as a prank."

Miss Gordon, an acquaintance, said she saw them leave her apartment with the radio and record player and depart in a car later traced to McDougall. She said her purse had been emptied of money.

McDougall was taken into custody during football practice yesterday.

He has been working out with the team although he chose not to play until the final five games of the season, beginning Oct. 27 against Oregon State.

McDougall said he and Molen intended to return Miss Gordon's things later and "then kid Fay for leaving her door unlocked." Miss Gordon told police she met the pair three weeks ago at a party.

Maglie to Pitch Series Opener Today

Casey Figures He Can't Wait To Use Ford

NEW YORK, Oct. 2—"Why am I going with Ford tomorrow?" asked Casey Stengel. "Because I can't wait until the third game when we get back home because maybe I won't get a chance to use him again because maybe it's too late and the series is over."

That's just one of the reasons, however, why the New York Yankee manager has picked Whitey Ford, a southpaw, to open the World Series tomorrow in Ebbets Field, a park that shows off Brooklyn's righthanded batting power at its best.

There hasn't been any open criticism of Stengel's choice, although Whitey, a 19-game winner this season and a two-time winner over the Dodgers as the Yankees lost the 1955 series, never has won in the Brooklyn bandbox.

"I guess I'd have started Ford anywhere," said Stengel, dressed in a natty brown suit instead of the Yankee pinstripe as he sat in the Yankee dugout during a workout today. "I mean, he'd be my starter if we were at Milwaukee or Cincinnati, too. I guess Casey gives lineup."

It's a big league professional pitcher, He's No. 1 man. He's been a starter all season, and he'll be a starter now. I don't figure to use him in relief. And he won two against that club, you may remember last year."

The Yankees, American League champions as ever, pranced through the final pre-series workout in the cool sunlight at Yankee Stadium, the monstrous hunk of concrete and steel that's been built since the war.

Ailing Sal Recovers, Faces Ford in Ebbets Field Tilt; Odds Pick Yanks by 3 to 2

BROOKLYN, Oct. 2—Sal Maglie, Brooklyn's 25-year-old "tomback kid," faces Whitey Ford, the New York Yankees' lefthanded ace, in the opener of the seventh Dodger-Yank World Series tomorrow at Ebbets Field with President Eisenhower in a box near the home dugout.

Although the Yanks finally were beaten by the Dodgers last fall in seven games and must play the first two games in enemy territory, the oddsmakers rate the American League champions 3 to 2 favorites to win the best-of-seven series. The opener is 6 to 5 and take your pick.

Fair weather with temperatures around 65 was forecast for game time at 1 p.m. (EDT) with a throng of between 34,000 and 36,000 in the ancient stands. The game was to be beamed on network radio (Mutual) and television (NBC).

Police Check Dodgers Park As Bums Drill

BROOKLYN, Oct. 2—There were nearly as many secret service men as reporters attending the Brooklyn Dodgers' pre-series workout at Ebbets Field today.

The government agents probably didn't know Walter Alton from Casey Stengel and cared less. Actually, they came to Ebbets Field on assignment from Washington, to inspect the park, search the ball field and check the exact location where President Eisenhower will sit tomorrow when he and his party will attend the opening game of the 1958 World Series between Brooklyn and New York.

The president's party, numbering 12 in all, is scheduled to arrive at LaGuardia Field about 11:45 a.m. tomorrow and leave for Brooklyn no later than noon. The president is expected to reach Ebbets Field about 12:35 p.m. His car will be driven to home plate, where Mr. Eisenhower will meet both teams and the presidents of the National and American leagues.

Dodgers Stage Workout
Unaware of the presence of the president's advance guard, the Dodgers staged a two-hour workout in preparation for the series. Sal Maglie, now a certainty to pitch the opener, reported he was fit and ready and said he was anxiously awaiting his important assignment.

"I'm looking forward to it with eagerness," he said. "But I'm not any more nervous about it than I would be if I were to pitch in a regular season game. In fact, I (Cont. page 10, col. 3)

Manager Alton hardly had time to catch his breath after the tense Sunday windup before he plunged into immediate series plans. Because of Sandy Amoros' two home runs Sunday and his hot batting streak, Alton decided to use the lefthanded batting outfielder against a lefthanded pitcher for the first time.

Amoros, who made the sensational running catch in the seventh game last Fall, had been widely criticized by his own mates last week when he dropped a fly ball in a losing game with Philadelphia's Ford Dodge killer.

Ford (19-6) beat the Dodgers twice last year, both times at Yankee Stadium; and lasted only one inning in 1953 at Ebbets Field. Although the Brooklyn park is supposed to be a graveyard for lefthanders, Johnny Antonelli of the Giants and Joe Nuxhall of Cincinnati beat the Dodgers in their own cozy park with his handy left field stands this year.

Manager Casey Stengel described Ford as "a big league professional pitcher" as he sat in the dugout at Yankee Stadium before today's final workout. "I can't rest my No. 1 because they say it's a bad park for him. Between you and me, he has pitched the best ball on the team. If I wait for the right park, the series will be over."

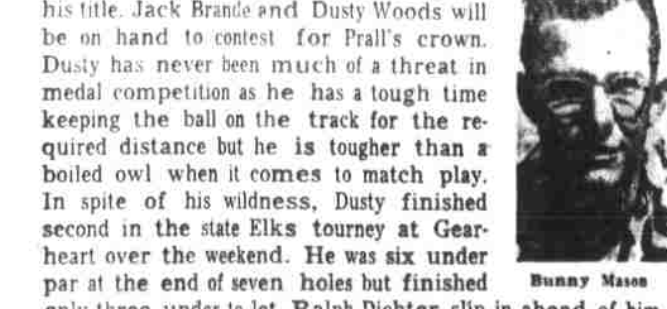
Salem's leading amateur players are about to try to fend off the rest of the hot shots in the Oregon Golf Assn. medal play championship at Medford this coming weekend.
