

# Holmes Campaigns in Salem, Attacks Gov. Smith's Record

Gov. Elmo Smith was accused of "political immorality" here Thursday night by his Democratic opponent Robert D. Holmes, who said Smith was turning his back on his legislative record for campaign purposes.

State Sen. Holmes, seeking to unseat Smith from his governorship chair, cited the governor's record on education, civil rights and United Nations as specific examples of what he termed a lack of political morality in politics. An example of these about face maneuvers, Holmes said, was brought out in a talk by the governor this week at Eastern College of Education. He quoted Smith as deploring the education problems of teacher supply and a need for better salaries for teachers.
