Big Tests Will Face Major College Teams

By HUGH FULLERTON Jr. The Associated Press The "it" teams of 1936 college football—and which ones aren't at this stage of the season?—are due for some severe tests today as the season moves into the first real football month, October.

The upsets and erratic performances of September have left some doubt about the strength of such highly-rated teams as Notre Dame, Ohio State, Missouri, Southern Methodist, Texas A&M, Maryland, Georgia Tech, Army, Colgate, Yale, Cornell and others. All but Georgia Tech get chances to find the answers today.

There's little doubt, of course, that Oklahoma has lived up so far to the No. 1 rating it carried over from last season or that today's Michigan State - Michigan tussle likely will be an important factor in the Big Ten and national championship races.

Oklahoma's Sooners are rated first in the current Associated Press ranking poll and are expected to hold that spot after meeting twice-beaten Kansas State in their first Big Seven game of the season. They opened last week with a 36-0 victory over outclassed North Carolina.

By May Decide Big Ten Michigan State (No. 2 in the poll) and Michigan (5) both looked impressive in opening victories over Stanford and UCLA, respectively. The winner of today's struggle before 100,000 spectators at Ann Arbor likely will become the favorite in the Big Ten, with only defending champion Ohio State to be reckoned with Ohio's Buckeyes, minus Hopalong Cassidy, take on Stanford in a game that offers the basis of a comparison with Michigan State.

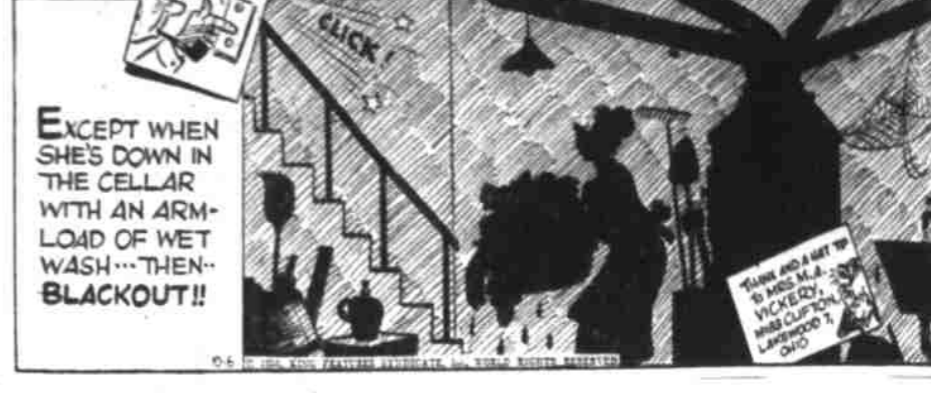
The Missouri-SMU contest also should settle a few uncertainties among fans after upsetting Notre Dame in its opener, was edged out by Georgia Tech last week. Missouri, rated second only to Oklahoma in the Big Seven, has dropped close decisions to Oregon State and Purdue.

Notre Dame has had two weeks to recover from its opening game loss. Reports have it that Coach Terry Brennan has been thinking of using some single wing plays, instead of the T, against Indiana today in order to make the fullest use of Paul Hornung's talents.

Army, Navy Meet Foes Texas A&M, top rated in the southwest, shouldn't have much trouble against Texas Tech. Maryland, beaten by Syracuse in its opener, tackles another southwest power, Baylor. Duke, another early loser, faces all-winning Tennessee, which hasn't beaten the Blue Devils since 1931.

Army, again experimenting with quarterbacks, faces one of its strongest eastern rivals, Penn State. UCLA got a scoring break when Duck quarterback Tom Crabtree tumbled and UCLA's Hal Smith recovered on the Oregon 19. The Bruins, with tailback Doug Bradley and fullback Barry Billington leading the way, bulled to the five where the drive fizzled.

A few minutes later, wingback Chuck Holloway put the Bruins again in striking distance as he returned Morris' punt 34 yards to the Oregon 14. The Bruins drove to the seven where they gave up the ball. In the second quarter, Long took the Bruins from their own 31 to the Oregon 7. The big gain was a Long pass to end Hal Smith for 26 yards.
