

Adlai Rebukes Nixon 'Shouts' on Socialism

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Oct. 5 (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson criticized Vice President Nixon tonight for using "threats" about socialism. He also said the Republicans were using "soft soap" slogans, gimmicks, handwagons and "infernal machines of modern, high-pressure politics" to re-elect President Eisenhower.

The Democratic presidential nominee, speaking in Yale University's Woolsey Hall, said Nixon in this year's campaign reverted "to the familiar tactics of associating Democrats with socialism."

In his speech prepared for a rally in the university, Stevenson contrasted Nixon's tactics with those of his fellow Californians, Republican, Chief Justice Earl Warren, and said:

"I do not think the American people are going to be much more impressed in 1956 by the vice president's threatbare shouts about communism."

"Hard-hitting, factual debate is the essence of democracy," Stevenson said. "Insinuation, smear and slander are not. They debase the language of politics; they defile the dialogue which is the means

Hungary Red Bosses to Visit In Yugoslavia

LONDON, Oct. 5 (AP)—Tanjug, the Yugoslav news agency, reported tonight that Hungarian leaders, including the Premier and Communist party secretary general will visit Yugoslavia Oct. 15.

The announcement gained added significance from the fact that both countries participated in a series of meetings in the Soviet Crimea this week. President Tito returned to Belgrade only today from those conferences.

The Hungarian delegation will meet with representatives of the Central Committee of Yugoslavia's League of Communists in Belgrade and then will visit other towns, the statement, broadcast by Belgrade radio, said.

Party Secretary General Erno Geres, who attended the Yalta talks, will lead the group, which will include Prime Minister Adras Hegedus, a member of the Politburo.

The announcement was seen in London as a possible upshot to the Yalta conference, which thus far has mystified the West.

One of the more persistent reports has been that Russia sought a new ideological arrangement which would at once discourage Titoism among her satellites yet accommodate Yugoslavia's President Tito himself. Tito and Geres took part in the talks.

Dead Flier To Be Buried In Salem Rite

The body of Air Force 2nd Lt. Charles V. Benner, who was killed when his jet plane crashed Thursday near Lakeside, Ga., will be brought to Salem for burial, according to his mother Mrs. Helen N. Engstrom.

Li Benner entered the Air Force on Aug. 15, 1953 following his graduation from North Salem High School.

After he completed his basic training he entered the aviation cadet training program and received his pilot's wings and lieutenant's gold bars in June 1955.

He was born on May 17, 1935 in LaCrosse, Wash., and moved to Salem in 1941. Before he enrolled in North Salem, he was a student at Parrish Jr. High School in 1949 and 1950.

A check of his North Salem record showed he was one of the top students. He was 94th from the top in a class of 497 students.

Stassen Says Adlai Weak As Governor

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Oct. 5 (AP)—Harold E. Stassen, contrasting Democratic statements that President Eisenhower has shown a lack of leadership, said tonight Adlai E. Stevenson was a "relatively weak" governor of Illinois.

Stassen, the President's special assistant on disarmament, said "critical smiting" at Eisenhower's quality of leadership reminded him of "a sandlot slugger saying that the trouble with Mickey Mantle is that he does not know how to hold the hickory!"

He then went on to say that official records show "many instances of maladministration" in Stevenson's four years as governor of Illinois, and added:

"Thus I believe that these important questions should be asked by independent and undecided voters: Can a relatively weak governor of Illinois make a good president of the U.S.? Can he measure up to what this critical time requires in America?"

Britain Faces Oil Charge By Lebanon

BEIRUT, Lebanon, Oct. 5 (AP)—Minister of State Saeb Salam today accused the British-owned Iraq Petroleum Co. of trying to drive a wedge between the Lebanese people and their government.

The company had announced it would abandon plans for a new pipeline to a Lebanese port and instead build one to the Syrian coast as a result of Lebanon's demands for more revenue from the pipeline.

New taxes were levied after the company refused to pay higher fees for running pipelines through Lebanese territory.

Salam told a news conference: "We shall not retreat under such threats and we shall carry out the taxation law in full."

Death Takes Arlie Simkins

Arlie Simkins, 65, a resident of Salem, died Friday evening at a Salem hospital.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. Hazel Ray, Salem, and a brother, E. J. Simkins, Salem.

French Slay 40 Algerians

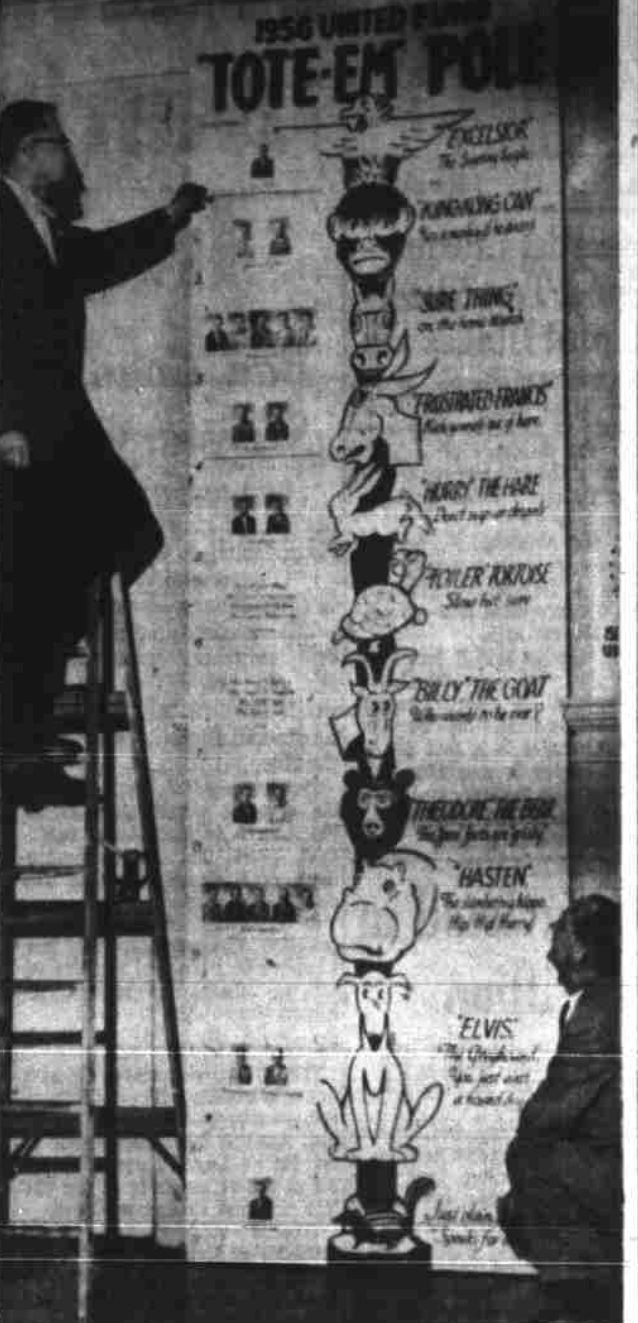

12-Ft. Totem Pole Shown to UF Workers

A 12-foot drawing of a totem pole with 11 animals was shown Friday for the first time to volunteer workers of Salem's United Fund drive.

The drawing depicts graphically the various standings of United Fund division.

For example, top animal on the pole is Excelsior the Eagle and is occupied by the drive's current top campaigner. On Friday it was Jack Frisbie.

Number two spot, King Kong, a monkey, went to general gifts.

Number three animal is a horse, four, donkey; five, rabbit; six, turtle; seven, goat; eight, bear; nine, hippo; ten, greyhound and eleven, Pansy, the skunk.

Inheriting Pansy on Friday was Willard Wilson, automotive co-chairman.

Silent Tito Returns From Soviet Confab

BELGRADE, Oct. 5 (AP)—President Tito came back to Yugoslavia without fanfare today from his Yalta conference with Soviet leaders. He gave no inkling of what they talked about.

Only the official Yugoslav news agency Tanjug was permitted to have reporters at the airport to greet the returning President. He was accompanied by his wife, Vice President Aleksandra Rankovic, and Djuro Pucar, a Politbureau member.

Seven hours later Tanjug distributed a statement by Tito saying his eight-day visit to the Russian Crimea was "purely private in character and intended for rest."

The statement added, "It is understandable that we used the occasion of our vacation and rest on the Crimea for talks on relations between the two countries."

There was no further reference to the Yalta discussions in the Tanjug statement and on confirmation of reports from Yugoslav Communists of a conflict within the Kremlin over the spread of Titoism in other East European Communist governments.

Car With 10 Persons Flips

A Salem woman suffered apparently non-serious injuries and five others escaped unhurt Friday night when a car flipped over about a mile east of 99E on the Chemawa-Silverton Road, state police reported.

Officer John Mekkers said Mrs. Betty Biles, 1290 Clear View, was taken by Willamette ambulance to Salem General Hospital for treatment of a shoulder injury. Attendees said her condition was "good."

The woman and eight other persons, including six children, were riding in a Chrysler coupe driven by her husband, John David Biles, same address, Mekkers reported. The vehicle flipped while making a turn about 10:30 p.m.

Resentment in British Troops Brings Furloughs

LONDON, Oct. 5 (AP)—The War Office, worried by unrest among troops called up in the Suez crisis, tonight declared all British reservists in Germany and the United Kingdom eligible for seven-day furloughs.

The announcement said that in addition to the furlough, each reservist may receive an additional day for travel home. The move followed numerous indications that resentment among 20,000 men recalled in the 10-week old canal dispute has approached the explosion point.

This week a "we-want-to-go-home" demonstration among reservists on Cyprus resulted in the arrest of 21 corporals and privates.

A War Office spokesman said the furloughs were a privilege over and above the reservists' normal leave time.

Hike Revealed In Coal Price

CINCINNATI, Oct. 5 (AP)—Appalachian Coals, Inc., the nation's largest coal marketing firm, today announced an immediate 35-cent a ton minimum increase in coal prices as a follow-up to the agreement on a new labor contract between the United Mine Workers union and the Bituminous Coal Operators Assn.

V. M. Johnston, representing the firm, said the increase will apply to all grades. The new price would vary by grade, he said.

Johnston also said another coal price increase would come next April 1. The new labor contract for miners calls for a \$1.20 daily pay boost now and another 10-cent daily increase next April 1.
