

Blazing Pursuit Carries Chinese Commie Troops Into Hong Kong

HONG KONG, Sunday, Oct. 7 (AP)—More than 40 Communist frontier troops raced into British territory last night, with guns blazing in pursuit of about 30 Chinese fleeing Red China.

They shot one dead and seriously wounded three.

The Hong Kong government in a brief statement said the Reds withdrew with an undetermined number of fugitives after running 50 yards into British territory.

They pulled back when British border police arrived.

"The police did not open fire and sustained no casualties," the statement said. "All is now quiet on the border."

The dead, wounded and 30 of the fleeing Chinese were found on the British side of the frontier. Five suffered minor injuries in their flight across a ravine and the shallow Shamchun River marking the border.

Officials clamped a secrecy curtain on the incident, the worst since the Communist took over the Chinese mainland in 1949.

A government official said he understood the Chinese were fleeing a forced labor battalion near the border. He added that he assumed they will be granted asylum.

Guard Asked for Diversion Of Peace Atoms to War Use

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6 (AP)—The United States has proposed that Russia join in "standardizing safeguards" against secret diversion of peaceful atoms to military purposes by small nations which get atomic aid from the big powers.

Russia has agreed in a general way that this is a good idea, but State Department officials are convinced that the Soviets are really stalling on the whole project and using it as a propaganda issue against the United States.

The proposal, and the Soviet reaction to it were disclosed tonight with the publication of an exchange of 18 notes between Washington and Moscow on promoting and controlling peaceful uses of atomic energy all over the world.

U. S. officials said they believe that in the long run the Soviets will join in some kind of safeguard arrangement for the peaceful uses of atomic energy.

The series of notes given out here by the State Department began back in November, 1954, when the United States was urging Russia to get on with negotiations for some kind of international organization for peaceful use of atomic energy.

The series continued through last Sept. 24, when Soviet Counselor Sergei R. Striganov informed U. S. officials that the Soviet government has no objection to the proposal of the United States government for a study of the possibility of standardizing safeguards.

U. S. officials say the record shows that Russia has gone along on the formation of an international atoms-for-peace agency and related projects mainly because of prodding by the United States and the other Western powers and only after extracting all possible political and propaganda advantages.

The central problem raised at the end of the exchange of notes was said to fit into this pattern. The heart of the problem is that while 82 nations, including the United States and Russia, are now meeting in New York to form the projected new agency for atomic power, the most hopeful estimates are that the agency will not start operating before June, 1957.

Political War Flares Over Disarmament

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6 (AP)—Political warfare broke out today among members of a special Senate committee set up to study disarmament as an aid to world peace.

Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.), chairman of the group of six Republicans and six Democrats, released a special staff study on disarmament—and at the same time supported the proposal of Adlai Stevenson that this country take the lead in moves toward halting tests of large nuclear weapons such as H-bombs.

Sen. Bridges (R-NH) protested that he and other members of the disarmament group had not seen the staff study or been consulted about its release. He said Humphrey's action "instead of fostering bipartisanism in foreign policy, in effect undermines it."

Bridges expressed doubt as to "the propriety of releasing staff studies bearing upon serious international problems without a meeting and careful consideration of them by the subcommittee."

"Such a practice can be predictive of much trouble," he said "especially if it becomes involved in the heat of a political campaign."

At the same time Bridges backed President Eisenhower, Vice President Nixon and other Republicans who have taken issue with Stevenson's suggestions for halting H-bomb tests.

"Our preparations and tests in nuclear defense should go on to insure maximum progress in technology and a strong national security," Bridges said.

Humphrey contended it would "not be necessary to rely on the Soviet word alone" that an agreement on banning H-bomb tests was being observed.

Registrants Clog County Clerk Office

The usual last-minute rush materialized Saturday at the Marion County clerk's office as lines of persons stacked up before half a dozen windows to beat the deadline for vote registrations.

The courthouse lobby was packed with 11th hour registrants as the 3 p. m. closing time approached, though the rush was lighter during mid-day hours, officials said.

It was indicated that Saturday was not as busy as registration deadlines prior to last May's primary election.

Officials in the clerk's office refused to attempt any estimate of total county registrations for the general election. However, County Clerk Henry Mattson said earlier the total should come close to equal the 1952 general election record of 90,000 registrants.

Complete figures on registration totals will be available later this week, it was reported. Before final compilation can be made, totals must be received from some 20 registrars scattered about the county.

Rifle Barrage Misses Trio; Man 'Sorry'

BURLEY, Idaho, Oct. 6 (AP)—Officers accused an itinerant laborer today of firing 10 wild shots at his wife, her boss and a bystander.

They said he told them he was sorry he wasn't a better marksman when he later learned none of the bullets hit anybody.

Theodore Nolan Gray, 34, who said he came from Oklahoma to do farm work at Fruittland, Idaho, was arrested near Burley after the fusillade of shots outside a Malta, Idaho, cafe.

Gray pleaded innocent by reason of insanity this afternoon on his arraignment before Probate Judge Henry W. Tucker on charges of assault with a deadly weapon and attempted murder. Tucker set Gray's bond at \$5,000.

Blindfolded Youths Sit on Busy Highway

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 6 (AP)—Two youths, picked up by police for sitting blindfolded in the center of busy U.S. Highway 90 near the city, said they did it because "there just wasn't anything else to do."

Francis Fahrenholt, 17, and Thomas Lee, 18, were booked with disturbing the peace Thursday night after officers found them sitting back-to-back in the middle of the road.

Parents of the boys said it was just a game. "Trouble with people is... they forget they were kids," said Mrs. Fahrenholt.

Small Vessel Sinks, 3 Lost

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 6 (AP)—A small British Columbia coastal freighter capsized and sank in Howe Sound about 16 miles northwest of Vancouver early today. Three missing crew members were feared drowned.

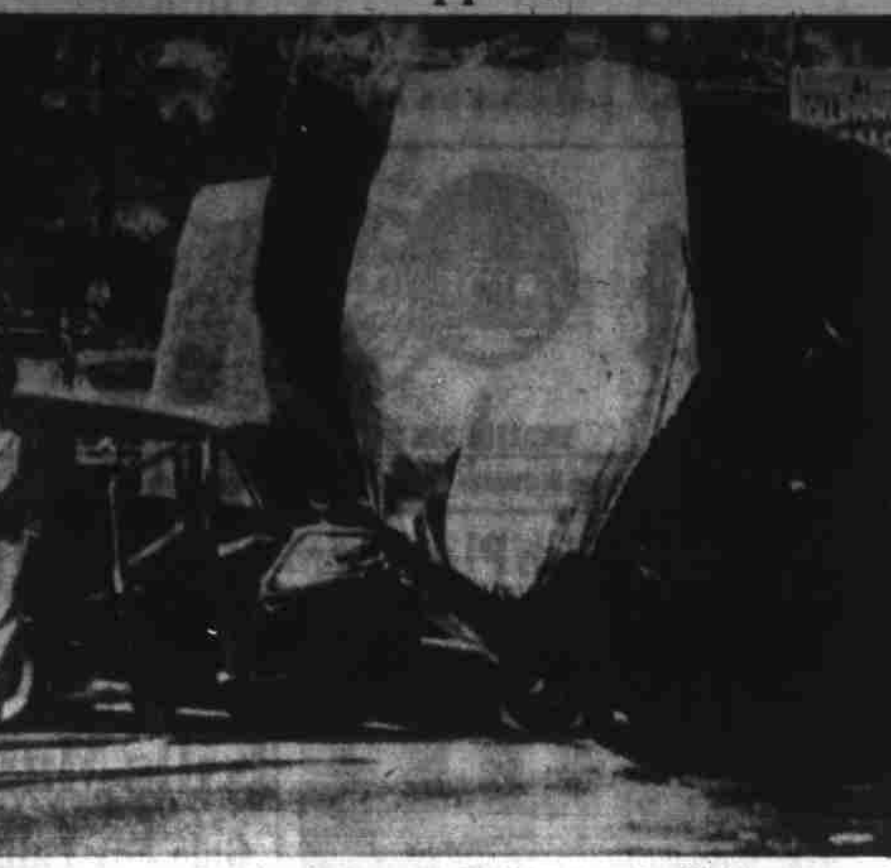
The wooden vessel Triggerfish, converted American submarine chaser, went down about 1 a. m. PST. The weather office said winds were light at the time.

Holmes, Smith Share Same Platform, Plug Education

SAN BRUNO, Calif., Oct. 6—Education was among the prime topics here Saturday as Oregon's two gubernatorial candidates, Democrat Robert D. Holmes and Republican Gov. Elmo Smith appeared on the same platform under sponsorship of the Corvallis League of Women Voters.

Both candidates plugged for higher teacher salaries, increased effort to make life of the teacher a more pleasant one, and careful consideration for the budget of the state board of higher education.

Gov. Smith said he doubted if the board's budget could stand or would get much trimming. Holmes deplored what he termed unnecessary delay in giving Portland a four-year college, asserting that as many as 10,000 Oregon young people had been denied higher education because the legislature failed to act sooner on Portland State College.

Holmes attacked and Smith defended the increase in government by boards and commission in Oregon. The governor said many able people serve at nominal or no pay and make a great contribution to state government. Holmes said Oregon now has the most boards and commissions of any state in the government and that a bill he sponsored in the legislature to consolidate some of the 91 would have cut government cost an estimated \$300,000.

Water resources, which he termed as one of the state's most valuable assets, are getting the attention of committees established in nearly every county, under legislation he promoted, Gov. Smith said. Flood control studies are underway on the Southwest "Timber Forever."

"Oregon will have a timber economy forever," the governor said in referring to a program to promote sustained yield and complete utilization of forest products conducted by the state.

The partisan undercurrent was active even if the luncheon session remained a friendly one throughout. However, Holmes got the bulk of the questions, most of them coming from Republicans including Benton County's State Sen. Francis W. Ziegler of Corvallis, and Rep. Wayne R. Giesy of Monroe.

But the most partisan reaction came with the announcement between speeches that Oregon State College was leading Iowa, 13 to 0. Both candidates were on their way to other Saturday afternoon engagements before the final truth was known on that non-political argument.

U. S. Seeks Suez Canal Settlement In Secret Huddle

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Oct. 6 (AP)—The United States is attempting in secret talks here to learn whether there is a basis for negotiating a settlement of the Suez Canal crisis.

If there is a basis for negotiations, the United States will favor the U.N. Security Council forming a negotiating committee to try to work out a settlement between Egypt and world powers using the canal, an authoritative diplomatic source said today.

The Security Council, with Secretary of State Dulles and five other foreign ministers taking part, will go into secret huddles next week with Egyptian Foreign Minister Mahmoud Fawzi.

If these talks produce results, the United States and other Western Powers hope that negotiations can be started. If not, the West will have to figure out what to do next.

Lad Quizzed In Burglary

A 16-year-old Salem youth was arrested Saturday evening following investigation of a recent burglary at the Bingham Construction Company, 13th and Cross Streets, city police said.

The arrest was made after questioning about theft of a transit from the firm two weeks ago, according to officers. The transit was recovered last week from a service station on S. 12th Street, where the instrument reportedly had been left by a youth.

Blaze Destroys Hood River Mill

HOOD RIVER, Oct. 6 (AP)—Fire destroyed a lumber company sawmill about nine miles south of here early today.

Firemen from six departments fought the flames six hours at the Neal Creek Lumber Co. mill, newly equipped two years ago with electrically operated machinery. The mill, owned by Neils Emry, was described as one of the most modern in Oregon.

Emry said some insurance was carried but was unable to make an early loss estimate.

Stacked lumber and a small pine mill and box and veneer plant were saved from the blaze. The sawmill employed 60 men in addition to a logging crew of 100 to 120.

Fire Threat to Hood Forest

ESTACADA, Ore., Oct. 6 (AP)—Some 300 acres of slash and green timber were threatened tonight by a wind-fanned fire in the Mount Hood National Forest.

The blaze was in the Fish Creek area, 24 miles southeast of this Clackamas County town.

Foresters asked for 100 firefighters from the U.S. Forest Service in Portland.

Some 40 men were dispatched to the area tonight. They planned to camp near the fire and begin operations as relief crews early tomorrow.

Wind gusts were estimated at 50 miles an hour in the fire area and the blaze had blackened some 60 acres by nightfall.

Foresters had succeeded in bringing another fire southwest of Estacada under control when a lookout spotted the new blaze early Saturday.

Fire danger was reported high elsewhere in the state.

Death Takes Wife Of Late Mayor Jimmy Walker

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Oct. 6 (AP)—Mrs. Janet Allen Walker, former wife of the late New York Mayor Jimmy Walker, died today in a hospital after a long illness.

Her doctor said Mrs. Walker, 70, died of an internal cancer which began about three years ago. She had undergone several operations.

Mrs. Walker had lived at Miami Beach since divorcing Walker in 1933. She was a former showgirl who married Walker in 1912, the same year he became an attorney, and never remarried after their divorce.

Walker married actress Betty Compton shortly after the divorce but that marriage also ended in the divorce court in 1941.

Mrs. Walker operated a small religious book store next door to St. Patrick's church.

Salas said the first person marked for elimination was Sen. Rolando Masferrer, publisher of the Havana newspaper Tiempo en Cuba. Masferrer has been an outspoken critic of those who oppose President Fulgencio Batista's government.
