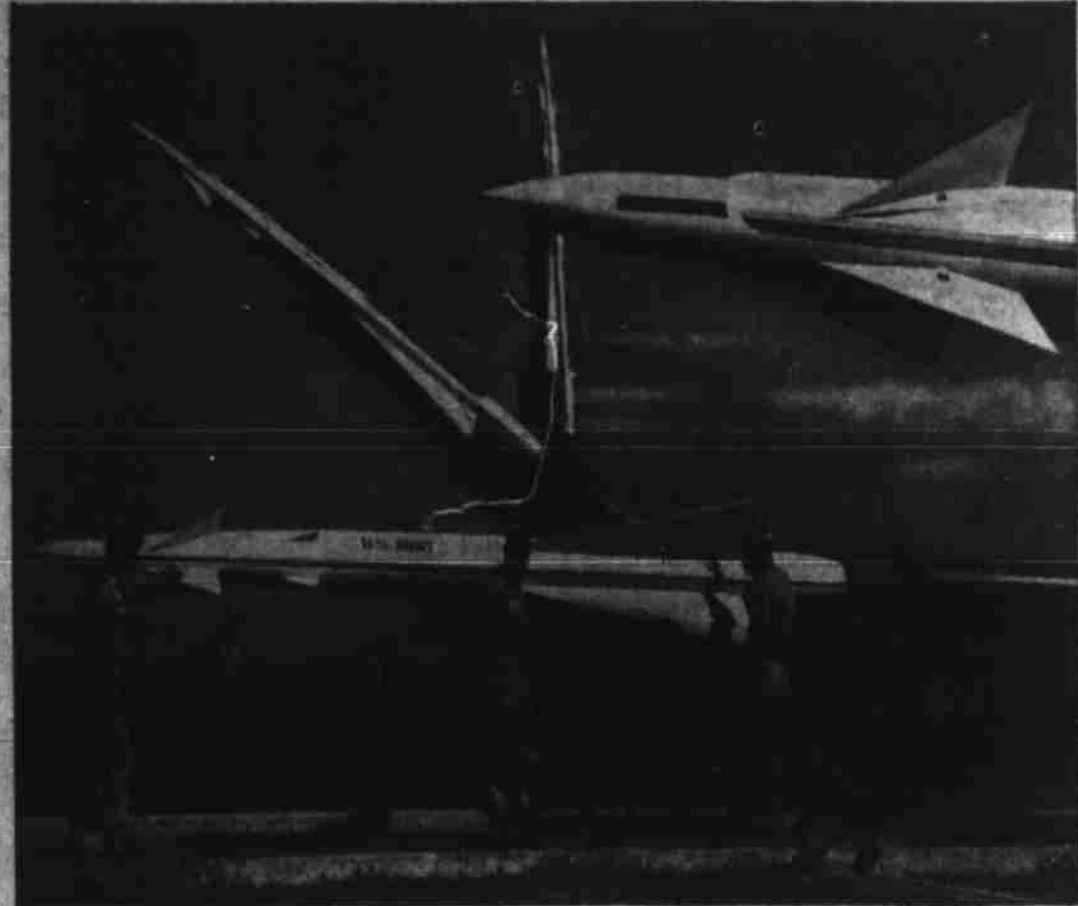
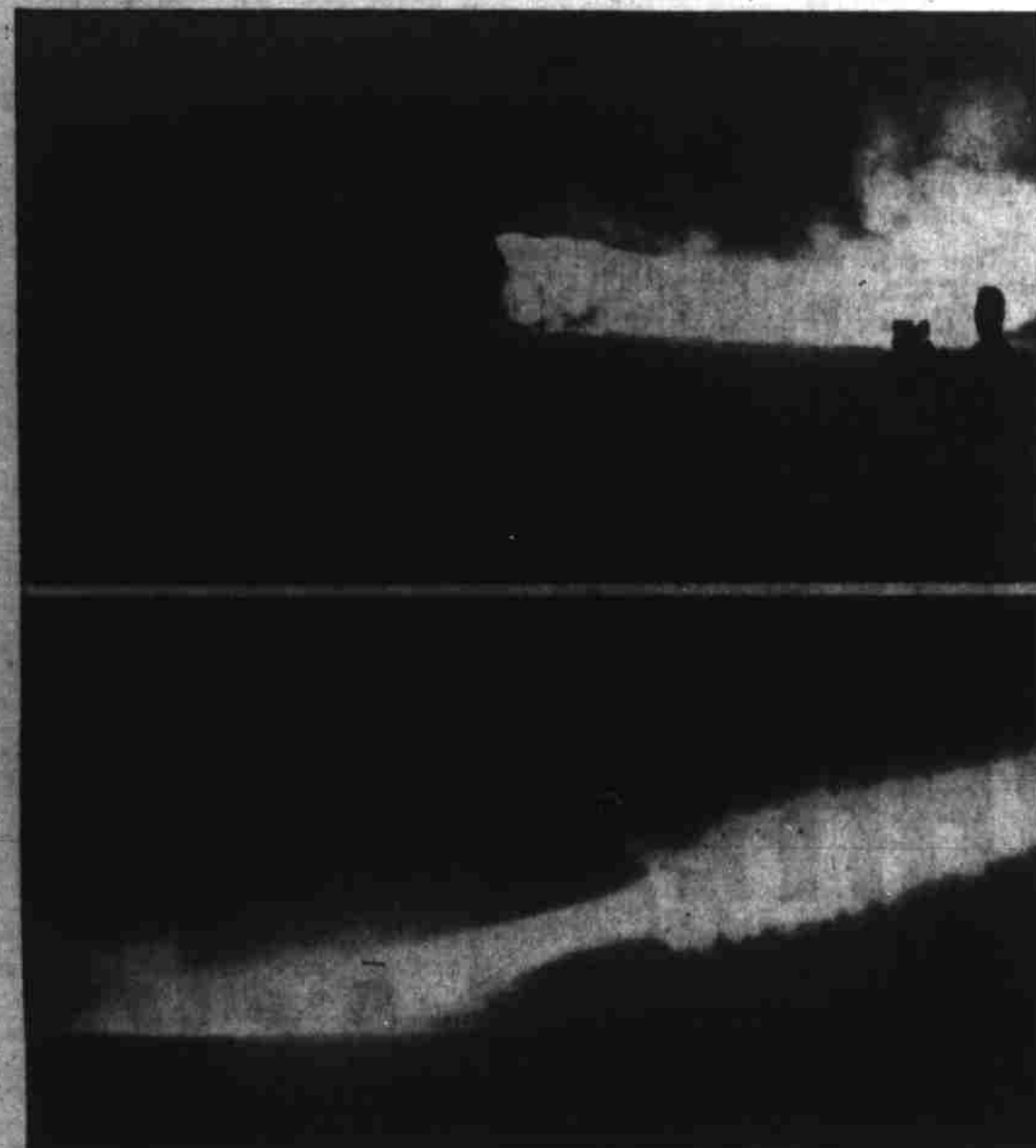


MISSILES RACE IS ON



THE NIKE. Ready to take the sky in event of an enemy approach, a battery of Nikes, the Army's anti-aircraft missiles, is shown after raising from an underground storage revetment.

The Defense Department has ordered top priority for the production of guided missiles. They're stressed in the new military budget. A billion dollars is earmarked for research, development and production. The United States is determined to be the front runner in the race with Russia or any other country.

In the brief period of 10 years the guided missile has evolved from an idea to practical applications in the nation's arsenal of defensive and offensive weapons. The Army, Navy and Air Force already have a great and ever-increasing variety and numbers of the push-button hardware.

There are many now familiar types of missiles. These are the surface-to-surface types, like the Army's Honest John and the Corporal, the air-to-air "birds," like the Navy's Sparrow and the Air Force's Falcon, and the ground-to-air, such as the Army's Nike and the Navy's Terrier. Under development is an air-to-surface missile, actually a pilotless craft, which would be launched from a mother plane and travel 100 miles or more to seek out and hit a selected target. Also in the development stage is the air-to-underwater missile for launching from helicopter or patrol plane against an enemy submarine.

But these missiles, with short or limited range, are only the forerunners of the "ultimate" weapons to come—the ballistic missiles, or giant rockets, with ranges of 500 to 5,000 miles, capable of carrying thermonuclear warheads at speeds of 12,000 to 18,000 miles an hour.

Veterans Day Observance Due Nov. 12

Veterans Day observances, which will include a parade, will be held in Salem Nov. 12 because Veterans Day, Nov. 11, falls on Sunday, Harriet Belcher, president of Patriotic Orders of Salem, said Wednesday.

The parade will march from the Capitol Mall to Marion County Courthouse at 10:30 a.m., according to plans made by veterans organizations and patriotic women's clubs in a meeting Tuesday, she said. The parade will be followed by a short memorial program on the courthouse steps or, in case of rain, in Salem Armory.

The day's activities will start with a breakfast at American Legion Capitol Post 9, which will have open house all day and a dance in the evening.

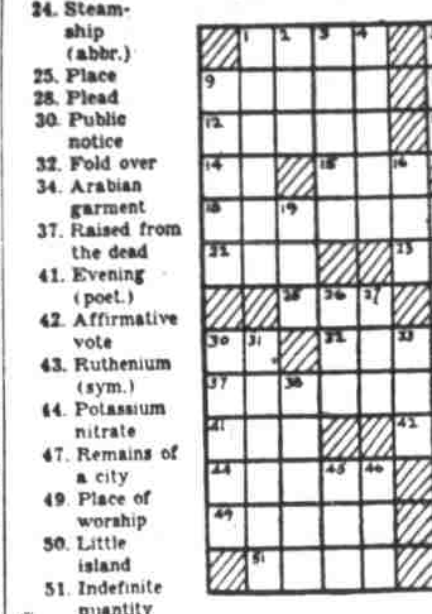

County Increases Grader Crews' Car Allowance

Marion County road employees who use their own cars in going to and from their work with grader crews will hereafter be allowed \$1.25 per day as expenses, an increase of 25 cents per day.

In granting the increase Wednesday Marion County Court heard County Engineer John Anderson say the former allowance was not nearly adequate to compensate the men for their expenses.

State Highway Department Rated High

Gov. Elmo Smith and W. E. Williams, Oregon's chief highway engineer, have received a plaque honoring Oregon's traffic engineering program.

The plaque was presented in Portland Tuesday by Herbert Higgins, district director for the Institute of Traffic Engineers, and marked the third consecutive year the Oregon department has been so recognized.

Oregon was one of only eight states in the nation earning the "certificate of merit" award for 1955. To be honored, the state must have an efficiency rate of 90 percent or better in signing, traffic control, accident prevention and other traffic engineering aspects.

Also present at the meeting was J. Al Head, assistant state traffic engineer.
