Healy Accepts Position With Truck Firm

William E. Healy, for more than eight years assistant Secretary of State here, said Wednesday he had accepted an executive position with Pacific Intermountain Express, one of the nation's leading interstate trucking concerns. Healy resigned early last March to become a candidate for Secretary of State at the Republican primary election.

Healy will be assistant to S. A. Holmes, director of the company's government and tax relations. Healy, during his service as Assistant Secretary of State, built a national reputation as an authority on truck taxation. He was author of the reciprocity agreements under which most of the western states now regulate and tax interstate truck movements. His headquarters will be in San Francisco.

Lee Charges Norblad Fails To Help State

"My opponent has failed completely to further the economic development of Oregon," Jason Lee, Democratic candidate for congress, charged at the luncheon meeting at the Salem Exchange Club at the Marion Hotel Wednesday.

Walter Norblad has passed only two insignificant bits of legislation during his 10 years of office and is a lazy, do-nothing congressman, Lee said.

"Oregon needs a man in Washington who will fight and fight hard for hydro-electric development, and river and harbor projects. My opponent was asleep when it came to obtaining the initial funds for dredging the mouth of the Columbia, the Warrenton Ship Basin, and the Tillamook Bay and Bar projects."

"Eight generator stalls at the Dalles Dam are being left vacant," Lee contended, "because storage waters a high dam at Hells Canyon could have provided are about to be lost."

Light Colors Urged for Pedestrial Safety



Visibility of pedestrians is always important, but especially so in these coming days of early darkness, rain and fog. Here in dramatic contrast are how three pedestrians look in auto headlights' glare at 200 feet. The pair in darker clothes are almost lost to driver's vision, while light clothing can be seen clearly. Public officials are stressing safety as heavy accident period of fall and winter begins.

Highway Safety Officials Warn Accident 'Season' Now at Hand

The worst time of the year—for traffic accidents—is now at hand. Early darkness is here and this week's showers hint that fog, wet or icy streets, steamy windshields can't be far away.

Add to these the expected careless pedestrians and drivers plus holiday celebrating, and the traffic accident and death rate are nearing the annual peak over the next four months, say accident analysts.

Outstanding fall and winter driving hazards, and how motorists may combat them, are outlined by an official of the Oregon state traffic safety division.

Fog—Use full lights on low beam. This helps oncoming traffic to spot your car. Never drive with parking lights only.

Skids Possible—Falling leaves—Prevents fast stopping. Tires skid. Increased hours of darkness—Makes poor visibility of road and pedestrians. Common fault is for motorists to "overdrive" their headlights. They can't stop within the limits of visibility.

Rain, snow, ice on road—Best

precaution is to reduce speed under slow summertime rate.

Faulty "bad weather" equipment—Have windshield wipers, defrosters, tire treads and other items checked for winter-time driving.

Youngsters in school cross walks and halted school buses—Oregon law says a motorist approaching a halted school bus from either direction must stop if the bus is loading or unloading youngsters. Only exception is if the motorist is approaching the bus head-on on a three or four lane highway.

Light Colors—Increased pedestrian hazards—Caution should be exercised by both drivers and walkers. Pedestrians should realize they can usually see an auto before the driver sees them. Wear something light colored.

Bicycles—Bike riders, especially at night, should be extremely cautious of traffic and all bicycles

should be equipped with rear reflectors and lights.

Salem's year-round peak accident hours are from 4 to 6 p.m. Salem had 53 accidents involving pedestrians last year and four of seven traffic deaths included pedestrians.

Darkness Dangerous—Oregon's accident figures show that night time accidents are more than twice as deadly as daytime crashes, and that the fatality rate creeps even higher on wet nights.

Figured nationally on a mileage basis four times as many persons die in night city accidents than daytime.

Because some Salem street construction projects will extend into the fall and winter season, local drivers are urged by city traffic officials to be especially cautious. Slated to extend almost to the Christmas season is work on South 12th Street widening program and construction of a new street bridge on South High Street.

Group discussion leader will be Roy Brain from Victoria, B.C., Northwest Y's Men's Clubs regional director.

Speakers at the dinner will be Robert Sherman, international vice president of Y's Men's Clubs and C. Ben Schmoeker, member of the YMCA's national council staff.

Salem's Y's Men's Club president Larry Greider, will be master of ceremonies during the dinner.

Convention chairman is Dr. Herbert L. Nelson, member of the Salem Y's Men's Club. Dr. Nelson is clinical director at the State Hospital.

Sunday's activities will begin with morning worship services and will be followed by a series of meetings. The convention will adjourn at 2:30 p.m.

Wives of convention delegates will also be meeting Saturday and Sunday under the banner of the Y's Men's Clubs. They will hold several meetings in the Salem YM and in homes of local Y's Men's Club members.
