UF Leader Says Pledges In Drive 'Could Be Better'

"It could have been better," is how United Fund campaign chairman William H. Hammond described pledges turned in Friday.

About \$12,000 was counted at noon and an additional \$1,000 a few hours later. This brought the total pledged so far to \$178,000 or 78 per cent of the \$227,800 goal.

Cited as outstanding yesterday was the county section of the governmental division. Under the chairmanship of County Treasurer Samuel H. Butler, county employees pledged \$1,450 or 117 per cent of their \$1,200 quota. Last year their quota was \$960, which they also met.

Hammond said he wasn't displeased with the overall pledge turn-in, but he had expected a heavier amount at this stage of the campaign which he described as crucial.

Roughest Part of Road
"It's the roughest part of the road," he said, "but we have no alternative but to continue at least for a limited time."

He called the current campaign one of "extremes." At one end there were groups and employees who contributed more than their share, and at the other end individuals who fell way below their fair share.

As examples of groups who were outstanding, he mentioned a furniture store that reported an average of \$34 per employee and a department store that averaged \$21 per worker.

On the other end, he said, there were the employees and residents who gave \$1 or less.

"I don't want to sacrifice results for speed," he said. "If it takes a few more days to get in as much as we can, then I want those few days." He added that he has no choice but to continue the drive at least for another week or more.

Dairy Product Production On Farms Down for Month

Less milk and butter, cheese and ice cream at higher prices were produced this past month in Oregon on feed priced below that of a year ago for the same period, according to reports released Friday by the Oregon State Department of Agriculture.

Announcement was made through the Oregon Monthly Dairy Report.

Milk production on Oregon farms during September, estimated at 93 million pounds, was 3 per cent below the 96 million pounds produced a year ago. This was the lowest September production of record, going back to 1932. United-States milk production during the same month was 2 per cent above a year ago.

Oregon creamery butter production was lowest on record back to

1935, averaging 22 per cent below the past five-year record. Cheese was down 15 per cent and ice cream dropped 5 per cent this past year.

Dealer's buying price in early October at Portland, for 3.8 per cent milk, used in the bottle and can, was \$5.71 per hundred weight compared to \$5.43 for early October last year.

Average Price Down

On the other hand, the average price paid by dairymen for 16 per cent dairy feed in September this year was \$3.65 or 10 cents below the same month last year. Baled hay in this past September averaged \$37 per ton, down \$3.50 from September in 1955.

Oregon producers during August, according to the Friday report, received an average of 82 cents per pound butterfat for manufacturing milk, which was 2 cents per pound above August, 1955. Producers shipping to cheese plants received an average of 85 cents per pound fat, which was 3 cents above the same period last year. Butter plants paid producers an average of 75 cents during August, 3 cents up from a year ago, and cream shippers averaged 60 cents, up 2 cents from a year ago.

The dairymen were also ahead on one other count: Volume of milk fat used in the bottle and can trade in Oregon, was estimated at 1,474,000 pounds, 3 per cent above last year. This is the milk for which the dairymen received the highest price.

Forest Land Fall Seeding Gets Started

Fall seeding of forest land began this week with the naming of a low bidder for an aerial seeding project, Wendell Ewing, state forestry official, announced Friday.

Dean Johnson, McMinnville, was low with \$6,311, and he will seed two separate units of land in Tillamook and Clatsop counties.

The larger area consists of 4,973 acres in the watershed of the Little North Fork of Wilson River near the western edge of the Tillamook burn. The Clatsop area of 345 acres is near Nicolai mountain in the northern part of the county.

Ewing stated that this will be the first time that Oregon will carry out direct seeding without pre-baiting for rodent control. "Instead," he said, "the seed is treated with WRL 2. A 300-acre experiment last year indicated its effectiveness as a repellent."

Ewing indicated that seeding would begin at the end of October providing weather conditions are satisfactory.

Fatal Marion Crash Brings \$20,000 Suit

A train-auto crash at Marion last Feb. 15, in which a Turner man and his son were killed, resulted in a \$20,000 suit filed against the Southern Pacific Company Friday.

Bringing the suit is Joyce Carlson, widow of William Edward Carlson, 25, one of the victims of the wreck. Also killed in the same accident was the father, Edward H. Carlson, 45.

The accident occurred when the Carlson log truck was crossing the tracks at Marion, about 17 miles southeast of Salem. The moving freight train carried the truck about 200 feet down the track, according to news reports at the time.

In the complaint, Joyce Carlson, mother of two small children, alleges the accident was caused by the negligence of the railroad. The complaint alleges poor visibility, speeding on the part of the train and failure to warn or look out for motorists.

Also listed as a defendant is Carl Erickson, train engineer.

Chauffeur License Renewals Ready

Oregon chauffeurs can now make application for renewed licenses which will be mailed after December 1, the State Department of Motor Vehicles said Friday.

Renewals for 1957 will be accepted at all branch offices as well as at the main office in Salem and will become valid Dec. 15.
