Stuff, No Nonsense

Tomatoes Dignified as Main Dish for Dinner

Stuffed tomatoes deserve a lot more attention than we are inclined to give them. Just because they are convenient as a salad vegetable, tomatoes are usually considered good enough sliced or quartered and served almost plain. We agree that there is no item in the summer salad menu better than just plain, unembellished tomatoes, but now that the season is almost over, and while they still remain in garden and market let's hasten to look at tomatoes as a main dish or at least an important hot dinner vegetable.

Stuffed tomatoes, given a chance, can be a pretty swell dish and here are some of the ways to make them so.

For a hot dish, you can stuff your tomatoes with ham or chicken or with rice. And, unless you've thought of it yourself, you might enjoy the Romanian idea of stuffing green tomatoes with a rice and onion stuffing.

Here is a filling that can go into either the red or green ones:

STUFFED TOMATOES WITH RICE
6 tomatoes Salt and pepper
Oil Raisins
1 cup uncooked rice Tomato sauce
1 onion Butter
Parsley, thyme Sour cream

Cut off stem end of tomatoes, scoop out centers. Heat oil in a pan, add rice, onion finely chopped, parsley chopped, thyme, seasonings and a few raisins. Simmer slowly a few minutes.

Place tomatoes in a pan, fill with mixture, replace cut-off ends, cover with tomato sauce, dot with butter, sprinkle with finely chopped parsley and cook until tender. Serve with cold sour cream on top.

These taste wonderful served cold with or without the cream. The flavor of tomatoes complements that of the ham filling. This uses chopped ham, but deviled ham could be used.

STUFFED TOMATOES WITH HAM
6 large tomatoes Salt and pepper
Butter 1 tablespoon bread crumbs
Chopped cooked ham Milk
Parsley, fennel, thyme 1 onion
Tomato sauce

Select firm tomatoes, cut off stem ends and scoop out pulp and seeds. Sprinkle inside with a little warm butter. Prepare stuffing as follows: Mix together enough boiled ham and chopped hard cooked egg, a few sprigs parsley and fennel if available, a little thyme, salt and pepper to taste, 1 large tablespoon breadcrumbs moistened with milk and one finely chopped onion. Now add the tomato pulp and mix all together well. Stuff tomatoes with mixture, place in a saucepan, replace the top, cover with tomato sauce. If any stuffing remains, form into balls and place in pan around tomatoes. Dot with butter and sprinkle with chopped parsley. Handle gently. Cover pan and bake slowly until tender. Serve either hot or cold with sweet or sour cream for sauce.

Gauge how much ham is needed for the 6, by measuring how much one tomato will require.

You can use chicken in about the same way to fill the tomatoes, serving either hot or cold.

New Church Outlines Plans For Growth
A program of advancement was adopted at the business meeting of the Willamette Baptist Church (Southern Baptist Convention) presently holding meetings at 300 S. Cottage St.

An estimate of growth based upon the present constituency was outlined by the pastor and a four-point program consisting of the following areas of attainment was adopted.

Concentrated leadership training in which every officer in the Sunday School will be offered the opportunity of holding a worker's diploma. The diploma credits will necessitate the completion of courses in Bible, Administration, Teaching Technique, and Church Doctrine.

A suggested numerical enlargement of the membership was considered and a 200 percent gain for the fiscal year was accepted. A budget goal of \$6,000 was declared a minimum operating amount for the year.

The educational organizations, including teaching, training, and missions, were planned to be increased by at least 100 percent.

The building committee was instructed to proceed immediately in locating a lot on which the church will be built.
