Win or lose, Nashua races for the last time in the Gold Cup, for he departs Monday for Lexington, Ky. to parade before the hordes of Kentucky fans at the home-folk at Kentucky race course Oct. 12. The winner of \$1,251,200 in purses will enter stud duty next year.

The Langloen Farm's Mister Gus, who upset Nashua in the Woodward Stakes two weeks ago, will attempt a repeat in the two mile Gold Cup.

Still hurtling from that right, Sullivan absorbed a straight right to the jaw that sent him down for the fight's first knockdown. Although the bell at the end of the seventh saved the Britisher, he was glassy-eyed and bleeding from the mouth. His seconds helped him stagger to his corner.

When the bell sounded for round 8, Calhoun came clear across the ring to Sullivan's corner and landed three straight rights to the jaw of the dazed Britisher. Referee Davis then pulled Calhoun off. The fight had been scheduled for 10 rounds.

## Dodgers Leave On Long Trip

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 12 (Special)—The Brooklyn baseball team flew away for a tour of Japan today and the prospects seem dim indeed that the Dodgers will ever return as a permanent institution in Los Angeles.

Few people held much hope for a shift of the National League champions to Los Angeles, and at least one person interested in the project conceded:

"It does not look like Los Angeles will get a major team." The speaker was a county supervisor, Kenneth Hahn, and his words came after a breakfast session with Walter O'Malley, president of the Brooklyn Club.

"The Brooklyn authorities have promised the Dodgers a new stadium," said Hahn. "If this should fall through, O'Malley says this would be the first place for him to move. But he thinks there is no likelihood of it (the stadium deal) not going through."

Hahn was equally pessimistic about a possible transfer of the American League Washington Senators to Los Angeles. There has been vague talk that their president, Calvin Griffith, was interested in coming to the West Coast.

# Sooners Expected to Equal Victory Mark in Top Game With Texas Today

Football statisticians and trade old-timers have come up with the information that Pittsburgh, not Oklahoma, probably holds the modern major-college winning record and that automatically converts the Texas-Oklahoma game into a big one today.

Bud Wilkinson's red-clad Sooners, basking in the glory that goes with 32 straight victories, had been strongly favored to beat Texas, just as they have every year since 1951. Now they're looking on this game as a chance to regain the record that was snatched away from them.

All this resulted from some research which revealed that the Pitt teams of 1914-1919 had whipped 23 opponents in succession—more than Oklahoma's current streak.

The Texas-Oklahoma game usually is a matter of considerable importance, but the records of the two teams has taken some of the luster off Oklahoma. No. 1 team in the Associated Press poll, has romped over North Carolina and Kansas State so easily that even Coach Wilkinson argued the scores were no indication of the team's real strength. Texas took a thumping from Southern California, edged out Tulane 7-6 then lost to West Virginia by the same score.

This contest now appears to be one of the high spots of a day when there should be a lot of interesting games. Only one of those listed in the first ten has what could be a crucial game. The Southeastern Conference lead is at stake in the clash between the unbesieged Mississippi and Vanderbilt teams. Vanderbilt is an top new with a 24 record, but Mississippi and Georgia Tech, both rated higher nationally, are close behind. Tech, which takes on winless Louisiana State, is third in the AP ratings and Ole Miss is seventh.

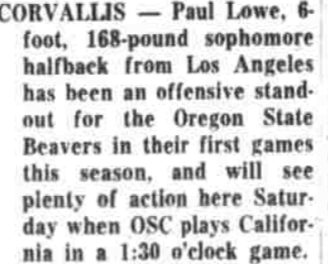
Here's what seems to be in store for the other first ten teams: Michigan State (No. 2) encounters an Indiana team that feels it is better than the records show. Texas Christian (No. 4) visits twice-beaten Alabama. Ohio State (5) plays Illinois, which hasn't quite justified its high early rating. Tennessee (6) meets Little Chautauoga, Texas A. and M. (9) plays Houston and Baylor (10) has its first Southwest Conference game against Arkansas after three non-league victories. Southern California (8) is idle.

The intercollegiate games may provide some lively action. These include Michigan-Army, always a colorful spectacle; Marquette-Sewanee College, Tulane-Navy, Florida-Rice and Duke-Southern Methodist.

The East's best game is more or less intercollegiate. Strong Syracuse, after an extra week recovery from its loss to Pitt, takes on West Virginia, a Southern Conference member.

Boston University meets unbeaten George Washington in a similar game. Penn State, which played three great quarters against Army, meets Holy Cross, upset winner over Colgate.

## Season Opens For Waterfowl

The waterfowl and either-sex deer hunting seasons open today and the shotgunners can look forward to a good season opener if the buildup in duck and geese populations continues to increase. According to the game commission, northern flights are beginning to arrive in good numbers throughout the state with large populations reported from in the marshlands of Klamath, Lake, Harney and Malheur counties. A smaller buildup is also noted in the Willamette valley and the coastal plains.

Hunters who have failed to fill their deer tags during the regular buck season will have a chance to take a deer of their choice beginning today and ending Oct. 21. Western Oregon Areas

In Western Oregon, the hunter's choice season is confined primarily to tree farms and areas within one mile of agricultural lands in the Willamette valley. National Forest lands will be closed the other sex season also includes strips of farm lands along the Alsea, Siletz and Yaquina rivers in Lincoln county.

On the east side of the mountains, all of the state will be open for taking deer of either sex with the exception of an area in central Oregon which roughly includes Deschutes national forest and parts of Lake, Klamath and Deschutes counties.

No other sex season will be held in Jackson, Josephine, Douglas, Coos and Curry counties in southern Oregon or in Clatsop county in the north.

Hunters should check their hunting synopsis map and also ask local authorities to be certain that areas are open or not.

## California Passes Rated Over OSC

CORVALLIS, Oct. 12 (Special)—California's pass-minded football team jumps into Pacific Coast Conference play tomorrow, facing Oregon State and a threat of rain.

Underdog Oregon State was defeated, 21-13, by Southern California, in State's only previous conference contest.

Rain damped the field earlier this week, and forecasters said showers could fall during the game, which starts at 1:30 p.m. (PST).

Coach Tommy Prothro of Oregon State said rain would not give his team an advantage over the visitors. He pointed out the States has worked with dry footing all season until this week. Footing was firm on the field today, and Prothro said he hoped showers held off until after the game.

California, which upset Pittsburgh, 14-0 last week, after dropping decisions to Baylor and Illinois, again is expected to use the pass as the main weapon, although four regulars may be on the sidelines.

These are quarterback Gus Giamalis, ends Roy Wheatcroft and Roger Ramseier and halfback John Stewart, all injured. Sophomore Joe Conestabile is expected to replace Giamalis.

Oregon State managed a 19-13 win over Missouri in its first game, but then lost its breakthrough back, fleet Sam Wesley, through ineptitude, and has been down since by Southern California and Iowa.

## Low Accused Of Stealing

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 12 (Special)—A crowded docket today forced postponement of a court appearance for Paul Lowe, 20-year-old Oregon State College football halfback accused of stealing a bicycle on the campus last June.

Lowe, the team's leading ground-gainer and replacement for No. 1 tailback Joe Francis, is expected to play in tomorrow's Pacific Coast Conference game here against California.

Coach Tommy Prothro and Dan Poling, Oregon State dean of men, said any action by the school would await the outcome of the court case. It is expected to be heard Monday.

A grand jury returned a felony indictment against Lowe and another student, Bert Washington. Each was accused of taking a bicycle from the campus June 29 without permission of the owner. Washington is not on the football team.

The two appeared in court July 7, waived preliminary hearing and were released on their own recognizance. A maximum fine of \$500 or two years in prison is the possible penalty.

Lowe, a fleet 177-pounder from Los Angeles, said he would plead innocent. He said the bicycle was loaned to him by a friend and that he was unaware it did not belong to the friend. He named the friend as Washington.

In the three games Oregon State has played, Lowe leads Francis in rushing and total offense. Lowe has gained 154 yards rushing and has thrown passes for 99 yards.

## Eugene Nabs 7-6 Win Over Albany

ALBANY, Oct. 12 (Special)—The Eugene High Axemen surprised the Albany Bulldogs, 7-6, in a non-district football game here tonight.

The host eleven rolled up a 6-0 halftime lead on Fullback Pat Emmons' 1-yard smash over center to climax a sustained Bulldog drive, but the conversion attempt was missed.

The Axemen knotted the count in the final canto when Chuck Warren passed to Don Lawrence for a TD, and then won the game on Joe Blakeley's successful conversion from placement.

Albany brought the crowd to life by driving from their own 30 to the Eugene 5-yard line, but tumbled the ball with less than one minute remaining.

## Bearcats, Pioneers Meet in Big NW Tilt

Willamette's Bearcats face their crucial test of the Northwest Conference season today when they travel to Portland to tangle with the Lewis & Clark Pioneers at 1:30 p.m. Coach Ted Ogden will send his freshman-dotted Bearcats against the team that is expected to make off with the NWC title.

Playing in their first NWC game last week, the Bearcats ran wild in the fourth quarter to dump Pacific State, 39-7. At the same time, LC was meeting College of Idaho and romped merrily over the Coyotes, 34-9. C of I had been co-favored with the Pioneers for the conference title.

On the basis of this, the Pioneers will be highly favored to win today. Pioneers Experienced
