Grand Jury Indicts Linn Jail Breakers

ALBANY, Oct. 20 — The Linn County Grand Jury indicted three men yesterday on charges of assault and robbery stemming from a Linn County jail break.

Indicted were James Arthur Patton, Earl J. Bonney and Ernest L. Gibson.

Patton currently is in custody at Los Angeles awaiting a Nov. 7 extradition hearing; Gibson is in prison under a 10-year sentence for a car theft after he escaped from jail; and Bonney is still at large.

Linn County jailer Lou Andrus was beaten and robbed when the trio escaped from jail here Aug. 7. Also indicted on a separate charge was Melvin Robert Schlicht, driver of a log truck involved in a crash near Cascade that killed a Silverton couple. He was charged with negligent homicide.

Car Smacks Into House Near Albany

ALBANY, Oct. 20 — An auto crashed into a farm house early today, buckling the parlor floor, upsetting the TV set and starting the residents, Mr. and Mrs. Dale Koehler.

Four Albany young people, all occupants of the car, were shaken up and two of them were hospitalized overnight for observation of injuries.

The accident happened on Knox Butte Road as the young people were returning to Albany from Lebanon at 1:20 a.m.

State police said steering apparatus on the car apparently failed and caused the crash. Driver was listed as Pat Darr, 17. Hospitalized were the two girls in the car, Marlene Mason and Phyllis Finney.
