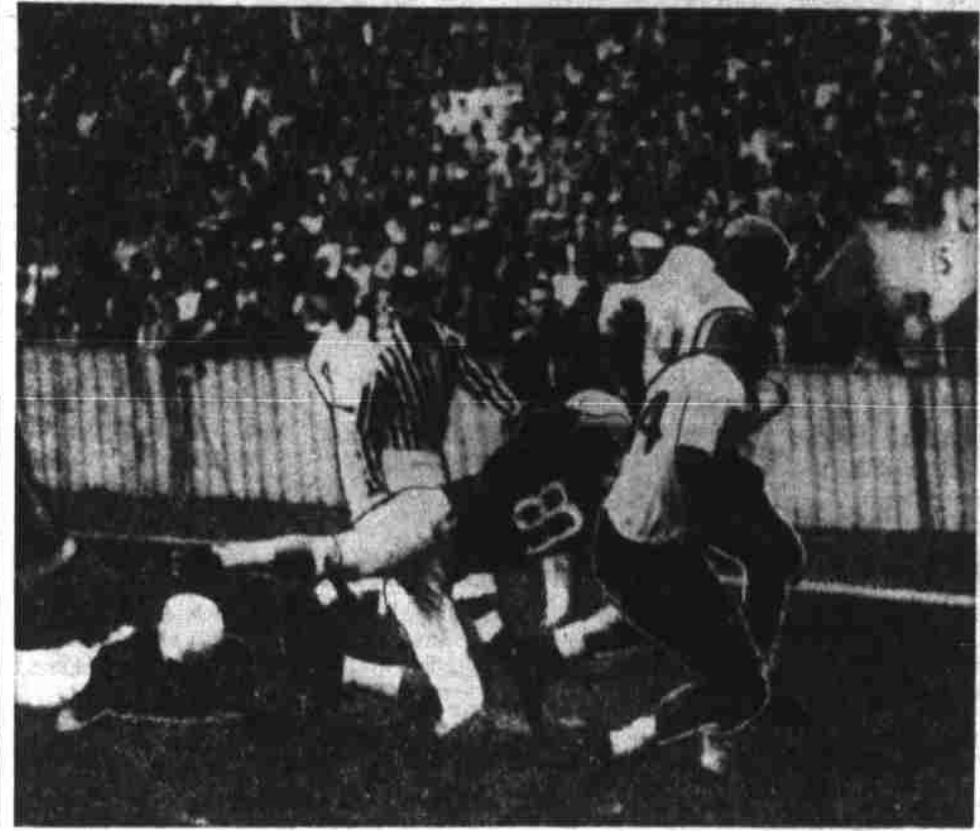

## Brodie's Talented Arm Foils Vaunted Webfoot Defenders

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 20—Stanford vaulted its second Pacific Coast Conference obstacle today on the right arm of John Brodie, the nation's leading collegiate yardage producer who passed Oregon to submission 21-7.

Oregon, which had the conference's best pass defense record prior to running across Brodie, could not cope with the deft tosses of the Stanford senior. He threw one touchdown pass to his favorite target, halfback Paul Camera, and all told completed 11 of 21 tries.

It was 21-0 by the end of the third quarter, and Brodie retired then along with the other Stanford

### Top Teams All Snare Grid Wins

The fond hopes that Texas Christian and Ohio State had been nurturing for undefeated seasons were snuffed abruptly yesterday by Texas A and M and Penn State, respectively.

But there was no stopping the top three teams in the country. Oklahoma, Michigan State and Georgia Tech all triumphed without incident.

Apparently the Southwest Conference is going to turn into one of its usual knock-down drag-out battles. Texas Christian, No. 4 in this week's Associated Press poll, was the favorite until yesterday's 7-6 loss to the Aggies.

Aggies Now Favored

Now, of course, the Aggies, who have one tie and four victories on their record, move into the favorite's spot. But they're shaky choices at best.

Little Don Watson, who was the main cog in beating the Horned Frogs last year, did it again, setting up his team's only touchdown in the final period, then personally passing for it.

Ohio State, which was ranked right behind TCU, lost to Penn State by an identical 7-6 score. Sophomore Bruce Gilmore plunged over from the 1-foot mark for Penn State's only score in the fourth quarter.

Oregon stopped the first Stanford drive on the 5-yard line, but moments later Brodie and his teammates came storming back 33 yards and fullback Lou Valli plunged the final two yards for the touchdown.

Drive Goes 90 Yards

A 90-yard drive, starting late in the first quarter, provided the second touchdown. Brodie contributed five passes in the march and climaxed it with a 20-yard toss to Camera for a 14-0 halftime margin.

Brodie wound up the stint of the regulars by conducting a 73-yard drive in the third period, completing two key passes in the march. Valli scored the touchdown, plunging over from a yard out.

He said Hack will be used as third base and infield coach, replacing Johnny Hopp, who resigned this month.

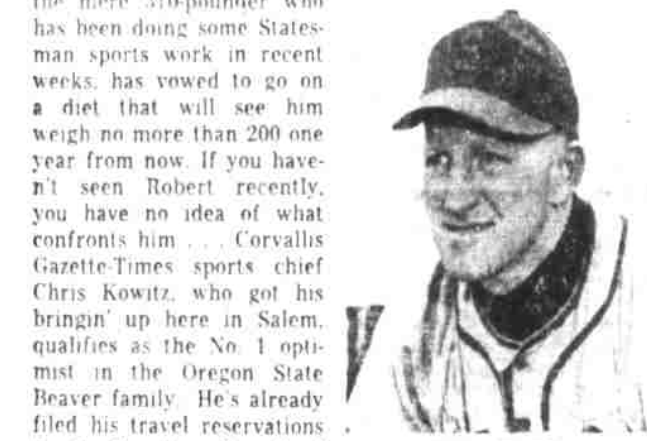

## Sooners Drub Kansas, 34-12

LAWRENCE, Kan., Oct. 20—Powerful Oklahoma ground out its 34th consecutive football victory, 34-12, today but met unexpected competition from a souped-up Kansas team that scored the first touchdown against the nation's No. 1 outfit in the last eight regular season games.

More than 31,000 fans, most of them Kansas rooters, howled lustily as the Jayhawks matched Oklahoma's first quarter touchdown when produced the only score of the last quarter against the spluttering defending national champions.

In between the first and last periods, however, it was all Oklahoma and the Sooners won much as they pleased as halfback Tommy McDonald, a 1955 All-America and his understudy, sophomore David Baker, each scored two touchdowns.

Oklahoma led 7-6 after one quarter, thanks to quarterback Jimmy Harris' conversion, then broke loose for three touchdowns in the second period and a 27-6 halftime lead.

Oklahoma lost a touchdown in the third quarter when halfback Clendon Thomas fumbled at the goal line and Kansas' Homer Floyd recovered in the end zone. The Sooners banged back, for their only second half touchdown with Baker striking from the 50-yard line and then converting.
