The region was set up to include Washington, Oregon, Montana, Idaho, British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan.

Official welcome was given by Rt. Rev. Abbot Damian Jentes, Msgr. Randall gave the keynote address. Speakers for the two-day conference included William P. O'Connell, managing editor of the Catholic Northwest Progress, Seattle; Father Bader, managing editor of the British Columbia Catholic; the Rev. Terence Tully, editor-business manager of the Inland Register, Spokane; the Rev. Demot Cullen, editor of The Prospector, Nelson, B.C. and Patricia Dayton, associate editor of St. Joseph Magazine.
