Police Rushed To Singapore As Riots Grow

SINGAPORE, Oct. 27 (AP) — The death toll in the Singapore riots rose to 14 today, and police reinforcements from Johore and Malaya were rushed to this British island colony to stamp out the disorders, now in their third day.

More than 150 persons injured in the fighting were in hospitals. Rioting in scattered parts of the city continued all day, but not on a large scale.

Police fired volleys to break up several minor charges by rioters, including one attempt to raid a police station. Nearly 600 persons, including 150 Chinese secret society members, had been rounded up by nightfall. It was on similar secret society members that British authorities blamed rioting in Hong Kong recently which claimed 43 lives.

Chinese secret society members — known by tattoos on their bodies — have openly joined the thousands of Communist-led high school students who started the riots Thursday night, protesting a ban calling their student union a Communist front. Police began an island-wide search for known secret society members this afternoon.

Grave fears of a possible communal uprising were aroused by the death of one Malay at the hands of Chinese Communist rioters. Inche Haji Jumat, member of the Singapore legislative assembly, warned the Malays were stirred by the incident and might attack the Chinese.

There are about 100,000 Malays in Singapore and 800,000 Chinese. They have clashed before, and it was bloody.

Two Scooter Riders Hurt In Collision

Two Salem area youths were hospitalized Saturday evening with injuries believed not serious after a collision between their motor scooter and a car at Cummings Lane and N. River Road, state police reported.

Car-Bus Crash Injures 3 Salem Men in Portland

PORTLAND, Oct. 27 (AP) — Three Salem men today suffered injuries believed not serious when their car collided with a city bus at a downtown intersection.

Taken to a hospital for treatment were Frank Hadley, 22, the driver, and Robert F. Martin, 21, and Dean Power, 20, his passengers. Hadley reportedly suffered chest and leg injuries and the other two had lesser head and leg injuries.

The bus knocked over a signal post and crashed through a store front. Several passengers were shaken up but unhurt.

Dulles Holds Out Promise Of Aid to Poland, Hungary

DALLAS, Tex., Oct. 27 (AP) — Secretary of State Dulles tonight held out the promise of United States economic help to Hungary, Poland or other countries which may gain independence of Soviet rule.

But he asserted that the United States does not "look upon these nations as potential military allies." This was an evident effort to assure Russia that its security would not be endangered.

In a speech prepared for the Dallas Council on World Affairs, he also said that the United States and its allies must maintain conventional as well as atomic military forces because "it would be reckless to risk everything on one form of armament."

His speech, a general foreign policy survey, touched on these four main points:

1. In addition to rejection of Soviet rule in some Eastern European countries there seems to be an "irreversible trend" toward greater freedom of people inside Russia and this may bring the day when Russia and the United States "can deal with each other as friends."
2. The Suez Canal controversy remains grave with some "disturbing factors, unrelated to the canal itself." Dulles did not say what factors he had in mind but he may have referred to Russian Arab-Israeli tensions and French-Arab conflict in North Africa.
3. The nations of the free world are still seeking "a solid economic foundation for their freedom" and it is vital that they succeed. Dulles added: "Surely it is within the capability of the free world to assure that no people, dedicated to freedom, have to choose between communist serfdom and economic destitution."
4. General Terms

Dulles dealt with the crisis of communism in Eastern Europe in general terms but he did outline his thinking on several points.

"The captive peoples," he said, "should never have reason to doubt that they have in us a sincere and dedicated friend who shares their aspirations."

"They must know that they can draw upon our abundance to tide themselves over the period of economic readjustment which is inevitable as they reeducate their productive efforts to the service of their own people rather than of exploiting masters."

"Nor do we condition economic ties between us upon the adoption by these countries of any particular form of society."

In that sentence Dulles seemed to be saying what other officials have said privately in Washington — that the existence of a Communist government in Poland or Hungary will be no more of a barrier to close relations with the United States than it has been in the case of Yugoslavia. Yugoslavia has received American aid for years.

Anti-Russian Radio Heard In Romania

MUNICH, Germany, Sunday, Oct. 28 (AP) — Radio monitors early today picked up a broadcast in the Romanian language with an excited voice shouting "Death to the Russians."

The monitors were unable to pin down the exact source of the broadcast.

But they said it came from a radio station almost due east of Munich, which could place it in embattled Hungary, in the Soviet Union, or in satellite Romania.

The broadcast was picked up on a 6765 kilocycle band but shortly afterwards monitors said there was heavy jamming of the band. Then the same voice began shouting the message over the 6650 kilocycle band.

The voice shouted "Give us our homeland back. Death to the Russians, we want our Romanian lands back. Bessarabia, Bucovina. Give us our homeland back."

Most of the former Romanian provinces of Bessarabia and Bucovina were taken over by the Russians in the 1940s and incorporated into the Moldavian Soviet Socialist Republic.

Contempt of Court Asked For Crosby

PORTLAND, Oct. 27 (AP) — The attorney general's office today asked that Clyde C. Crosby, international representative for the Teamsters Union, be cited for contempt of court.

Crosby and five other persons, all among the 30 who were indicted following a grand jury probe of Portland's vice conditions, had asked that the charges against them be thrown out because they had not been advised of their rights on possible self incrimination.

Crosby is charged with conspiracy to commit a felony, with extortion and illegal possession of a firearm.

Asst. Atty. Gen. John Nichols had portions of the grand jury deliberations read which he said provided proof that Crosby had been advised of his rights.

After this transcript had been read into the record, Nichols asked that Crosby and the others be cited for contempt because what Crosby had said on the stand was "unequivocally refuted by the transcript."

Circuit Judge Frank J. Lonergan, before whom Crosby's motion is being heard, continued the case.

Cars Collide, Two Injured

Two Albany brothers suffered apparently minor injuries early Saturday evening when their car was involved in a head-on collision with another vehicle on the Salem-Dallas highway near the "Y" junction, state police said.

Dennis G. Chastain, about 17, listed by Officer Stanton Zeltner as driver of one car, suffered a head laceration and elbow injury.

He was taken by Willamette ambulance to Salem General Hospital and later released. His brother, Richard Chastain, 18, sustained a minor head cut, Zeltner said.

Listed by police as driver of the second vehicle was Carl John Dickman, Independence. Zeltner said the Chastain brothers' 1954 Ford was hurtled into a ditch as a result of the 6:15 p.m. mishap.

Airdrop Made At South Pole

GREENVILLE, S. C., Oct. 27 (AP) — An 18th Air Force C124 Globemaster dropped a load of fuel oil yesterday in the first airdrop ever executed at the South Pole, said 18th AF headquarters last night.

The report was relayed to Donaldson Air Force Base near here by U. S. Navy Task Force 43 in New Zealand.

Maj. Gen. Chester E. McCarthy, 18th AF commander, piloted the C124 in the historic mission.

The big transport dropped barrels of fuel oil which will be used by the recovery teams when they arrive later at the geographical bottom of the world.

Wives, Ordered From Asia, Claim Marines' Morale Low

SEATTLE, Oct. 27 (AP) — Arriving here from the Far East today, a group of Marine Corps wives charged that the commandant's "Go home, wives" order has dropped the Marines' overseas morale to "an all-time low."

The women, many with children, arrived here on the Navy transport James O'Hara. They returned under the order of Gen. Randolph M. Pate, Marine Corps commandant, who ruled that families were not a part of the "mobile combat force" required overseas.

The women issued a statement labeled the "collective opinions of Marine wives aboard the O'Hara."

It complained:

- "1. It is unjust to disrupt Marine families by ordering the wives and children home within 30 days and to threaten to punish husbands for a policy which has been so hazy and weak as to have allowed Marine families to join their husbands in Japan for years."
- "2. The majority of Marine wives obtained a military dependent's visa, valid for 12 months."
- "3. Freedom of speech is jeopardized when we are forced to hide our identities (in issuing the statement) to protect our husbands' careers."
- "4. Contrary to previous reports, the morale among the Marines in the Far East is at an all-time low because they are associated with other services whose dependents are allowed to be with them."
- "5. Marine families in the Far East paid their own transportation to Japan, lived in private rentals and paid for their children's schooling."

Born Dec. 28, 1904, Case reportedly had been a resident of Salem for several years.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Case, Salem; sisters, Mrs. J. W. Hudson, Turner, and Mrs. Irene Hargrove, Marysville, Mo.; brothers, Floyd and Melvin Case, both of Roseburg, and Clarence Case, Anchorage, Alaska.

The body was taken to the coroner's office pending funeral arrangements.

2 Cars Collide On Highway 22

Hall Among 92 Defendants in Suit to Find Hodge Payments

CHICAGO, Oct. 27 (AP) — Republican National Chairman Leonard W. Hall was named as one of 92 defendants today in a suit to find Hodge payments.

The suit, filed by Democratic State's Atty. John Gutknecht of Cook County, named 92 individuals, firms and organizations. Some were referred to by incomplete designations.

Gutknecht said the defendants — besides Hodge, the former Republican Illinois state auditor now serving 12 to 15 years for embezzlement, two other persons convicted of conspiracy, and the Southmoore Bank & Trust Co. — were listed by Edward A. Hintz, the former bank president, as recipients of money kept for Hodge by Hintz.

The names, Gutknecht said, were taken from a ledger kept by Hintz as a record of funds paid out from Hodge's envelope cache.

Hintz earlier told investigators that he had cashed numerous state warrants (checks) sent to the bank by Hodge, placing some of the money in a manila envelope which was kept in a teller's cage in the bank.

Over \$1.4 Million

An auditor's report recently put the amount of funds taken from the state by Hodge at more than \$1,400,000. Hintz, and Edward A. Epping, former chief aide to Hodge, were imprisoned after pleading guilty to conspiracy to defraud the state.

The defendants listed in Gutknecht's suit included, besides Hall, Warren Wright, Illinois' Republican state treasurer; "John Stille & Associates," not further identified; "Citizens for Merriam Dinner," an apparent reference to the contribution to the Chicago mayoral campaign of Robert F. Merriam, and "Cook County Campaign Fund."

Gutknecht, who filed the suit in Cook County Circuit Court, said defendants were ordered to file answers within 30 days after being served with notices of the suit.

He said he wanted to determine whether they received money

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
