JERUSALEM, Oct. 28 (AP)—Arab mobs burned the French consulate in the Old City of Jerusalem today, smashed windows of the French Embassy in Amman and made fire raids on five French buildings in the Syrian city of Aleppo.

500 Expected Here Today For Meeting of Educators

Ike's Business Claims Listed As 'Drivel'

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—The director of Independent Businessmen for Stevenson-Kellogg said today President Eisenhower's claim that his administration has done more than any other for small business is "nothing more than political drivel."
John R. Graves, executive director of the National Small Business Group supporting the Democratic ticket, said in a statement that Eisenhower has "twisted and distorted the facts... in an effort to mislead independent businessmen and the public into believing something that just isn't true."
Graves referred to a statement by Eisenhower on Oct. 21 that his administration "has done more for small business than any prior administration." The President said this in a letter to Fred Herman of Rochester, N. Y., chairman of a group there called "Small Businessmen for Ike."
"The Eisenhower administration," Graves said, "has either failed to do anything or has done too little, too late. As a result small business... is in grave danger of being squeezed out of the American business community."
Graves said his group made a survey of 100,000 small firms which showed "profits of small business are down 35 per cent while big business profits are up 41 per cent" under the Eisenhower administration. He said the report also showed that small business failures "have almost doubled."

MONEY BOX TAKEN

7 Escape in Spectacular Salem Wrecks

Spectacular in nature were two Salem area traffic crashes Sunday which caused apparently non-serious injuries to seven persons. Six of the injured were hospitalized.
A head-on collision about 5:10 p.m. on Fringe Road near Aerial Way injured four persons and demolished two vehicles, state police reported. Three others were hurt in a crash on the Marion Street bridge.
One of the vehicles in the Fringe Road crash, a 1948 Plymouth, did a flip-flop on impact. Its driver was Earl Drake Brown, 15, Turner, officers reported. Driver of the other vehicle, a 1955 Chevrolet station wagon, was listed as Mark Gehlar, 774 Cascade Dr., Head Injuries.
Most severely injured was Gehlar's wife, Paula, who suffered a deep head laceration and crushed foot. Gehlar had a forehead laceration and a passenger in the Plymouth, Kenneth Eugene Lemmons, 21, Atlanta, Ga., sustained facial and leg lacerations. All were taken by Willamette ambulance to Salem Memorial Hospital.

Traffic was slowed for a considerable time on busy Marion Street bridge after a crash involving cars driven by Don Williams, 28, 114 Third St., and Jack Elsworth, 17, 810 Missouri St., city police said. The accident took place at bridge junction of routes leading to Dallas and Dayton.
Hurled Island
Officers said Williams' 1947 Ford convertible hurled a traffic island and smashed against a traffic sign after apparently being forced over by an unidentified vehicle. The Williams' car then was struck in the rear by a 1947 Ford coupe driven by Elsworth, which also apparently was forced over by the third vehicle.
Mrs. Dorothy Williams, 38, mother of Don Williams, suffered deep head lacerations and a fracture of the right arm in the 5:45 p.m. smash. She was hospitalized as was Elsworth, who had facial lacerations. Don Williams sustained a knee laceration but did not require hospitalization.

out the Arab world on behalf of Algerian nationalists' fight for independence from France.

With smoke from the burning consulate billowing above divided Jerusalem, Israel announced partial mobilization of reserves. Premier David Ben-Gurion's Cabinet said reserve battalions are being stationed on the frontier "to safeguard security of Israel's borders and border settlements."

However, this evidently was not sparked by the Jordanian action against the consulate. The Cabinet listed purely military reasons, including the formation of a joint Egyptian-Jordan-Syrian command.

Mobilization Report

In Washington, President Eisenhower said he has received reports Israel's mobilization is almost complete and he urged Ben-Gurion to avoid doing anything "which would endanger the peace." He also called on the Arab states to "refrain from any action which could lead to hostility."

Between 2,000 and 3,000 demonstrators fresh from a meeting in a Moslem mosque, made the march at noon on the consulate outside the Old City's walls and within sight of the Israeli sector of Jerusalem.

Witnesses said they demanded that the French flag be lowered. The consulate officials refused. Several small bands broke in to start the fire, systematically setting matches to furniture, files, drapes and anything else that would burn.

20-Minute Fight
In the fighting and shooting, which lasted about 20 minutes, 15 Arab civilians, two consulate clerks and several policemen were reported wounded.
A French official said the consular staff members sought refuge on the roof and finally were rescued by Jordanian troops.

It was not clear how the shooting started. On the Israeli side it was believed the bullets came from the guns of Jordanian police. A rumor among the Arabs was that the Frenchmen had opened fire on the mob.

'Nationalism Raises Head,' Nehru Says

NEW DELHI, India, Oct. 28 (AP)—Prime Minister Nehru said today "nationalism has raised its head" in Communist-ruled Eastern Europe. He implied his own ruling Congress party, whose ultimate goal is a welfare state, should watch its step.
Nehru told a public meeting at Jaipur, in his home state of Uttar Pradesh, he has asked Congress party workers to bear in mind the events in Poland and Hungary indicate "even something very strongly entrenched could be uprooted."
The Congress party is the most strongly entrenched political organization in India, which professes neutrality in world affairs.
Nehru offered no other comment on the uprisings in the two Soviet satellites, saying he did not want to express further reaction yet.

Hunter Dies Of Gun Blast

MOUNT VERNON, Oct. 28 (AP)—A Seattle hunter died in a hospital here today of injuries received when his shotgun accidentally discharged near a marshland cabin south of here yesterday. He was Charles Curran, 41, of 6744-25th N.W.
Curran was in a duck hunting party with A.E. Foss, Snohomish, and Ed Mackey, Seattle. Foss told Skagit County officials he was in the cabin deep in the marshlands off the Skagit River when he heard a shot.
Curran had set his gun on a stump near the cabin. Foss said. Foss told sheriff's deputies he dashed from the cabin and found Curran on the ground, wounded.
Foss said it took about 2 1/2 hours to get the injured man from the scene to a hospital.

MAN INJURED
Weldon Catterson, 1201 Reedy Dr., suffered a head laceration about midnight Saturday in an altercation at the home, Marion County sheriff's deputies reported. The man was taken by Willamette ambulance to Salem General Hospital and later released.

Emphasis on Education, Ike Claims

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—President Eisenhower said today his administration "has given unprecedented emphasis and leadership to the cause of education."
Eisenhower's statement was made in a letter to Miss Karen Cornell of P. O. Box 6272, Asheville, N. C. She described herself as a college student.
Miss Cornell had written the President saying she had heard a recent address by Adlai E. Stevenson, Democratic presidential candidate, attacking the Eisenhower administration on the issue on education.

She said the address raised some questions in her mind. She inquired about the administration's viewpoint, plans and projected "positive action" on issues like federal aid to higher education.
Eisenhower replied that he deplored "cynical political criticism" of his citizens committee, called the White House conference on education.

"Our actions have been based on the time-tested principles that, first, there is a national interest in education, and second, that the role of the federal government is to aid, encourage, and facilitate, but never to control—education."

Eisenhower said he submitted two special messages on education to Congress. One, he said, called for record funds to expand the Office of Education, and the other requested a five-year federal aid program to build more schools.
Congress approved an increase in Education Office funds but never enacted the federal aid program, he said. Eisenhower told Miss Cornell he will repeat his request at the next Congress.

Four Held on Theft Charge

LEWISTON, Idaho, Oct. 28 (AP)—Law enforcement officers were holding tonight four persons they say have committed a series of thefts from farms in an area which includes four counties in Washington and Idaho.
Asotin County Sheriff Hugh Curry and Garfield County Sheriff Edmund Taylor said the names of the four would be released when the men were charged Monday. Two were described as adults and two as juveniles.

In addition to the thefts in Asotin and Garfield counties, both in eastern Washington, the officers said the four had admitted thefts in Whitman County, also in eastern Washington, and Latah County in northern Idaho.
The officers said a receipt for property sold to a Spokane firm led to the arrest. The property listed as stolen included parts from farm equipment, at least one electric welding set and gasoline.

Eight Escape County Jail In Reno, Nev.

RENO, Nev., Oct. 28 (AP)—Eight prisoners burrowed their way to freedom early today with broken shower pipes through the ancient mortar of the Washoe County Jail.
Sheriff C. W. Young said he believed the fugitives, ranging in age from 19 to 24, stole two cars in Reno to drive to Carson City. One of the missing cars has been found there and another was stolen a block away. A Clark County license plate was also taken from a third car.

The prisoners burrowed a 14-inch square hole through a 14-inch wall, then lowered themselves one story to the exercise yard below with a rope fashioned from blankets. The prisoners then boosted each other over a high wall to complete the escape.
Eight others in the same tank chose to remain. The temperature outside was 19 degrees.

The missing prisoners are Edward Jennings, 21, Peoria, Ill., charged with obtaining money under false pretenses; Owen Burkhardt, 27, of McMinnville, Ore., armed robbery; Woodrow Caldwell, 24, Revanna, Tex., obtaining money under false pretenses; Jimmy Parker, 21, Charles Russell, 23, and Wilbur Montgomery, 25, all of Pinedale, Calif., and all charged with violating the federal firearms act; Charles Thomas, 20, Auburn, Wash., and Alex Robert Kessack, 19, of Seattle, both charged with violating the Dyer Act.

Sheriff Young said the mortar in the jail wall "was so old you could dig through it with a spoon," but it's the first break there since 1953.
The prisoners left sometime between the cell check at 4 a. m. and 7 a. m. mealtime.

GIFT TO JAP SCHOOLS
TOKYO, Oct. 28 (AP)—Dr. Robert Blum, president of the Asia Foundation of San Francisco, announced here the foundation plans to give about \$600,000 yearly to Japanese universities and research institutes. Established in 1951, the foundation has branches in 13 Asian nations.

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Cobalt Bomb Not Planned, Wilson Says

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—Defense Secretary Charles Wilson said today talk of a "cobalt bomb," mentioned by Adlai Stevenson was "loose talk" and that "there's no such thing" in existence or on the drawing boards.
"It's like the popular mechanical business in the atomic field," Wilson said.

Stevenson, the Democratic presidential candidate, asked recently what the Republicans would do if they refuse to stop H-bomb tests and the Russians catch up with the United States on H-bombs. He questioned whether their next step would be to build a "cobalt bomb" or something even worse.

Wilson, interviewed on CBS TV "Face the Nation," said there was no "serious intention to test such a bomb."
No Bigger Explosion
Asked if the Defense Department wanted to explode any bomb larger than the 20-megaton H-bomb, he replied: "No—there is no such plan."

He added that stopping H-bomb tests "wouldn't solve the problem that faces the world" and that the administration has asserted leadership constantly "in trying to solve the real problem" of disarmament.

Saying there was "nothing new about" Stevenson's proposal that the United States seek an agreement to halt the tests, Wilson added:
"The Russians have been doing it right along. They've brought it up from time to time."

Reason for Red Letter
That, he said, is the reason Soviet Premier Bulganin recently expressed approval of Stevenson's proposal in a letter to President Eisenhower.

Wilson said he was "unclear" about which weapons Stevenson referred to. He questioned whether Stevenson proposed halting tests of bombs from one megaton up, only H-bombs, fusion bombs or fission bombs.
He said the best information he had was that fallout of radioactive material from the bomb tests was not at any point where it constitutes a danger.

Mentions Hungary
Wilson said he did not believe the U. S. government had anything to do with the "exact timing" of the revolt in Hungary or with the "planning" of any particular action by the Hungarian rebels or those in Poland.

Wilson said he expected the Defense Department budget proposals to show a reduction of manpower of five or possibly 10 per cent.
Asked if this meant that Stevenson was correct in saying the country might dispense with the draft in the foreseeable future, he replied that the planned reduction would "not particularly" affect the draft.

Man Questioned In Hit-Run Death

DRIGGS, Idaho, Oct. 28 (AP)—Jewell Jones, 22-year-old laborer from Jackson, Wyo., was jailed today for investigation concerning a car-pedestrian accident here Friday night in which Mrs. Mike Byrne, 81, was run over and killed in front of her home.

Jones was arrested yesterday in Jackson by Sheriff Fred Coffin who noticed Jones' car was damaged. Sheriff Dwight Loosli of Idaho's Teton County said Jones waived extradition and was brought here from Jackson.
The car which ran over Mrs. Byrne failed to stop.

Nixon Notes 'Tremendous Surge' to GOP

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 28 (AP)—Vice President Nixon said today there has been "a tremendous surge toward the Republicans in the election campaign and that he now feels 'we have an even chance to carry the Senate and a better than even chance to carry the House.'"

"In my entire political experience," he said, "I have never witnessed such a significant change in voter attitudes that has occurred in the past few days."
"Two weeks ago, while it was generally agreed that President Eisenhower was running ahead of Mr. Stevenson, virtually every political expert in the country was predicting the Republicans would fail to win control of either the House or the Senate."

Nixon gave his views on the congressional situation in a statement as he worked at the Ambassador Hotel here on his speeches for the final week of the 1956 campaign.

Crash Fatal In Washington

SPOKANE, Wash. Oct. 28 (AP)—A head-on crash about six miles west of Spokane tonight has taken the life of a Seattle woman and injured her husband and two other persons.
The dead woman has been tentatively identified by state patrol officers as Mrs. Willard Jensen of 3200 Lexington Way, Mercer Island, Seattle.
Her husband is in "serious" condition in a Spokane hospital.

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Candidates Gird for Last Campaign Week

Republicans and Democrats turned their attention to the Portland area today for the final week of this year's political campaign.
The Portland area has the state's heaviest concentration of voters.
Douglas McKay, Republican trying to unseat Democratic Sen. Wayne Morse, said he would tour industrial plants at Portland today and tomorrow, and would make three speeches tomorrow night.
He said he would continue with a heavy schedule in Portland until Friday, when he will go to the Bend area for an overnight campaign trip. Then he will return to Portland.
Morse, who spent the weekend campaigning in Southern Oregon, planned a speech before a San Francisco labor convention today, then a flight back to Oregon to speak at a nighttime rally at Milwaukie, a suburb south of Portland. He said he will spend much of the rest of the week in the Portland area.
Others Active
Other Democrats also were active in Southern Oregon, following Vice President Nixon's speech at Medford Friday night. Nixon urged the election of McKay.
Charles O. Porter, Democratic candidate for Congress in Southwest Oregon, said at Eugene, "It would not surprise me to learn the state GOP party, hurt by the truth of the timber-steal from our Rogue River National Forest, is financing the mining operations" recently reported at the Al Serena.
The Democrats have contended the Al Serena mine owners got patents on the land there to get at valuable timber.
State chairmen of the rival parties continued an argument on whether Republicans "doctored" a picture of Morse. The picture, appearing in a Republican pamphlet distributed to the public, showed Morse speaking in an empty Senate chamber.
Photograph Cited
Robert Bover, Democratic chairman, said the pamphlet was sent to every home in Oregon. He said the "purpose in distributing the doctored photo is exposed by the caption... It says: 'Wayne Morse empties the Senate with his longwinded speeches. The Senate refused to listen to him.'"
"The truth is that the picture was taken at 3 in the morning when Sen. Morse was leading a band of determined liberals in a 13-day fight that prevented a complete giveaway to private monopoly of our atomic energy program," Bover said.
"The frantic claims that the picture of Wayne Morse speaking alone in the Senate has been doctored is false. The full picture shows Morse talking only to Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.)," said Wendell Wyatt, Republican state chairman.

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
