

Adlai Blames President for Suez Trouble

NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (AP)—Adlai Stevenson said today that President Eisenhower's foreign policy "misled us and our friends" and must "bear a heavy responsibility for the crisis in the Middle East."

Stevenson offered advice to Ike on policy in the Middle East.

NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson tonight telegraphed President Eisenhower that he hopes the President is not "going to commit the United States to the costly use of armed forces" in the Middle East.

The telegram was released from La Guardia Airport shortly before the Democratic presidential candidate left for Pittsburgh where he had a speech scheduled for tonight.

He issued the text of the telegram before President Eisenhower went on the air to explain the United States policy.

Stevenson said "no United States involvement" in the Middle East fighting.

He said the United States can never condone an unprovoked attack by any nation on another.

But let us pray, not too quick to judge whether there has been provocation, or what Israel has done or what the British and French are doing.

"We know little, as I say. But we do know that the British and French have commitments to preserve peace in that area and so have we. We know also their dependence on the Suez Canal."

"This was another busy day for Stevenson, in a furious drive to pull the election his way. He had four speeches scheduled in New York where 45 big electoral votes are at stake."

His speech tonight in Pittsburgh was another bid for Pennsylvania's 32 electoral votes.

In the strongest statement he's made since the start of the Israeli-Egyptian conflict, Stevenson said: "Unhappily, the vacillations, the uncertainties, appeasements and provocations of the Eisenhower-Dulles policy bear a heavy responsibility for the crisis in the Middle East."

Stevenson talked of Israel in his speech at Manhattan Center in the heart of the garment district, an area where Jewish influence is strong.

To Support Israel

"By every consideration of law, of moral and spiritual obligation and faith," he said, "this nation is bound to support this integrity of Israel."

But he said: "Surely the United States can never condone an unprovoked attack by any nation on another."

"But let us pray, not too quick to judge whether there has been provocation, or what Israel has done or what the British and French are doing."

"We know little, as I say. But we do know that the British and French have commitments to preserve peace in that area and so have we. We know also their dependence on the Suez Canal."

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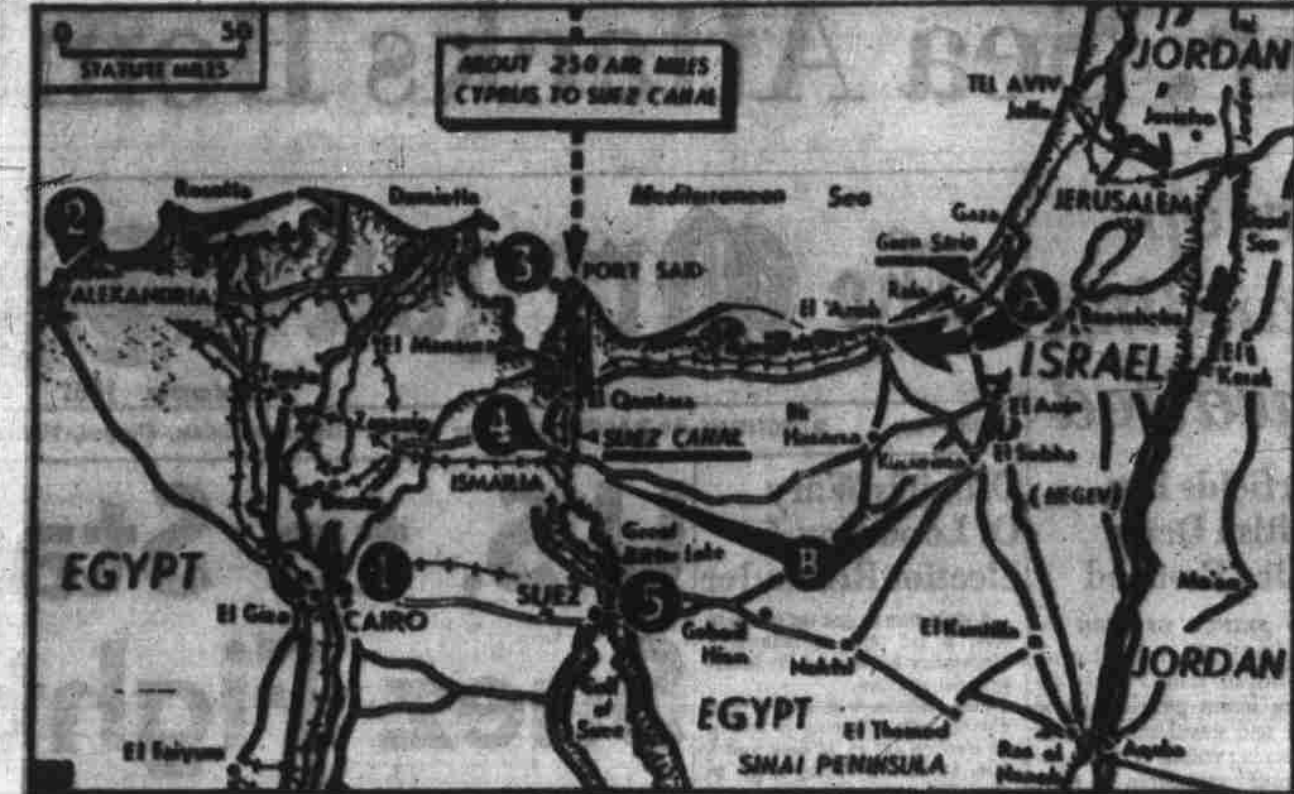

Israel Army Cutting Across Gaza Strip

TEL AVIV, Israel, Nov. 1 (AP)—The Israeli army said tonight an armored tank force has driven across Egyptian territory in a move to cut off the Egyptian-held Gaza Strip on the Mediterranean.

It said the Israelis pushed from El Agaila, south of Gaza, to secure a foothold at El Arish on the sea shore. Completion of that operation would sever the Gaza Strip from Egypt. The area was awarded to Egypt in the armistice settlement of the 1948 Palestine War.

Along the route of the Israeli march lay a prize Egyptian airfield, one of the main objectives. It was considered possible that the Israelis, after pocketing the strip, would invade in force and occupy it.

Israeli radio said the Gaza Strip is being encircled. The Jerusalem radio station predicted an early Israeli army victory over Egyptian units in the Sinai Peninsula.

The broadcast warned Arab Palestinian refugees in the Gaza Strip they soon would be isolated. About 250,000 Arab refugees from old Palestine have been living in the Gaza Strip since the 1948 fighting. All told, there are nearly one million Arab refugees from Palestine in the surrounding Arab countries.

The Gaza Strip is a tongue of land 26 miles long and 4 miles wide extending along the Mediterranean coast northeast to the Israeli border.

Unofficial reports said thousands of these refugees are fleeing along coastal roads to Egypt despite the Israeli warning instructing them to remain in the strip and obey Israeli orders.

The anti-aircraft fire, Slater said, was "wildly directed."

The Canberra bombers of the royal air force used high level tactics in their raid on the Egyptian fields, an air force spokesman said.

The spokesman did not state how many aircraft were employed. He did not disclose whether there were any casualties.

SHIP CATCHES FIRE

BANGOR, Wales, Oct. 31 (AP)—A British battleship caught fire and was damaged severely, but it did not hurt Britain's naval strength much. It is the 117-year-old wooden battleship Conway, now being dismantled.

U.S. Loans to Warring Nations Top \$13 Billion

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (AP)—The United States has extended more than \$13 billion dollars worth of economic aid grants and loans to the four countries involved in the Middle East fighting—Britain, France, Egypt and Israel.

Britain has been given the biggest slice of economic aid—\$6,500,000,000. All but \$4,200,000,000 of this was in loans.

France ranks as the second biggest beneficiary of American assistance, having received nearly \$5 billion dollars. The biggest chunk \$3,800,000,000 was in grants.

Since it was founded eight years ago Israel has been awarded more than 400 million dollars, including \$20 million in grants.

Egypt, which has been receiving aid only since 1952, has been allotted \$16 million dollars worth. About \$5 million dollars of this went for surplus American farm products sold to Egypt for local currency.

Ex-Con Admits Setting \$300,000 Fire in Seattle

SEATTLE, Oct. 31 (AP)—Lester A. Rosenthal, 29, an ex-convict who said he was "looking for some excitement," tonight surrendered himself to police and admitted setting a \$300,000 fire in Seattle last night.

Rosenthal gave himself up on the street to a King County sheriff's captain and later signed a confession for Seattle police. The fire which destroyed the four-story Oceanic Building near the waterfront was the largest in a number of years in this city.

Rosenthal said he was convicted of assault in Yakima in 1955.

Arab Chiefs Summoned

BEIRUT, Lebanon, Oct. 31 (AP)—Lebanon's President Camille Chamoun tonight invited all Arab heads of state to an urgent meeting to discuss the Israeli attack on Egypt.

Chamoun asked heads of state to suggest the time and place. Invited were the kings of Saudi Arabia, Yemen, Libya, Iraq and Jordan and the presidents of Syria, Lebanon and Egypt. The Sudan's executive power is held by an executive committee.

Judge Rules Ballot Office To Stay Open

KLAMATH FALLS, Oct. 31 (AP)—Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg ordered the Klamath County Clerk to keep his office open until 11 p.m. tonight to give out and accept absentee ballots for the Nov. 6 election.

The order followed a protest brought by Sidney I. Lezak of Portland, assistant counsel for the Democratic Party of Oregon, in behalf of Dennis L. Dunksen, a Klamath Falls railroad man.

Dunksen contended that County Clerk Charles DeLap refused to give him an absentee ballot. DeLap said he thought that absentee ballots should not be given out until 10 days before the general election.

However, Lezak contended that the deadline was five days before the election.

Judge Vandenberg ruled that DeLap was to keep the office open and was to give out and accept absentee ballots.

The ballots are to be kept separately until Vandenberg rules on whether the ballots may be counted for the general election.

DISASTER SHIP RAISED

HONG KONG, Oct. 31 (AP)—Red China has raised the passenger ship Kiang Ya that sank eight years ago in one of the worst sea disasters in history. The ship went down with a loss of 3,800 Chinese in the mouth of the Whangpoo River off Shanghai in December 1948. A Peiping radio broadcast said salvage showed the ship may have hit a mine.

High Italian Officer of WW II Dies

GRAZZANO BADOLIO, Italy, Thursday, Nov. 1 (AP)—Marshal Pietro Badoglio, who conquered Ethiopia for Mussolini and eventually signed Italy's unconditional surrender in World War II, died early today in obscure retirement. He was 85.

The old soldier who rode in triumph into Addis Ababa in 1936 and who was chosen by the late King Vittorio Emanuele III to replace the dictator Mussolini in 1943 had long been retired from public life.

In failing health for months, he left his home in Rome last August to return to his native village—Grazzano Badoglio. It had been named Grazzano d'Asi but was renamed in his honor.

Badoglio died of an asthmatic heart attack.

He suffered a similar attack in late August and had been ailing since.

Badoglio was born Sept. 28, 1871. In private life he was Marquis of Sabotino and a devoted follower of the now exiled house of Savoy. He and Benito Mussolini once held the rank of Marshal of Italy, which was abolished after fascism was abolished.

He also was awarded the collar of the Annunziata, a decoration which ranked him as "cousin of the king."

After the war, the Italian Supreme Court deprived him of his seat in the Italian Senate on charges of collaboration with fascism.

Mob Heckles Russ Visitors

DENVER, Oct. 31 (AP)—Cries of "Rusians! Rusians!" greeted three Russians tonight as they arrived here on a coast-to-coast tour to observe the Presidential campaign.

As uniformed patrolmen moved in to clear a path for them at Union Station, hecklers yelled, "This is a free country, you can say what you want. See, you don't need those police. This is not the U.S.S.R."

The crowd of some 100 persons was identified as Ukrainians, Latvians and Lithuanians, most of them refugees from the Soviet Union.

Albany Hospital Grant Approved

ALBANY, Ore., Oct. 31 (AP)—Albany General Hospital has received preliminary approval for a federal grant of \$36,250 from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Total cost of the 22-bed expansion project has been estimated at \$258,804.

Estes Attacks U.S. Position In Mid-East

BAY CITY, Mich., Oct. 31 (AP)—Sen. Estes Kefauver said tonight President Eisenhower's statement on the Near East conflict "revealed for all the world to see, the deterioration of American influence in the world."

The Democratic vice presidential candidate said, in a statement issued after the President's radio-televised address to the nation tonight: "The United States, the greatest power on earth, is left standing flat-footed and open-mouthed while world events pass us by."

Kefauver, who for two days has been repeatedly criticizing what he termed Secretary of State Dulles' "zig-zag" policies in the Near East, said:

"The Eisenhower-Nixon-Dulles foreign policy has so destroyed confidence in our government that today we find ourselves without friends and our counsel disdained by the free powers of the world."

Kefauver said the United States left the free world when the Democrats left office, but that now we are not even consulted by the other major democracies before steps are taken which could lead to general war.

Construction Up Sharply In Portland

PORTLAND, Oct. 31 (AP)—New starts in heavy construction were reflected in higher bank transactions here in October.

The Portland clearing house reported transactions for the month totaled \$884,789,172, more than 15 million dollars above September figures and 61 million dollars ahead of October, 1955.

Building permit totals were listed at nearly 2 million dollars for 240 permits issued in Multnomah County. The 168 permits in September were for a total of \$5,301,000.

City building showed an increase over September. Of the 617 permits in October, 149 were for new work valued at more than 3 million dollars. The overall total was nearly 5 million dollars.

Blaze Sweeps John Day Mill

JOHN DAY, Oct. 31 (AP)—Damage was estimated at between \$150,000 and \$250,000 today in the fire that swept through the C. L. Pine Lumber Co. near here last night.

Glenn Lee, owner of the plant, said he had not made a decision about rebuilding.

The firm employed 75 men and produced 15 million board feet of lumber annually.
