

Possible Upsets Seen In Governor Contests

Democrats Tuesday elected governors in Arkansas, Florida, North Carolina and Texas. Republicans captured similar honors in Vermont, Indiana and New Hampshire. None of these outcomes was unexpected. Contests were being waged in 29 states. Maine, on Sept. 10, re-elected Edmund S. Muskie (D) for a second two-year term. In Massachusetts, Democrat Foster Furcolo held a commanding early lead over Republican Sumner G. Whitier.

Demos Jump To Lead for House Seats

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6 (U.P.) — Due to unexpected Southern districts, Democrats took an early lead in tonight's vote count for control of the next House of Representatives. But with only slightly more than one third of the 435 House contests settled shortly before midnight, control was in doubt. Republicans actually had chalked up a net gain of one House seat by taking two districts now held by Democrats. They lost one of their own in the Sept. 10 election in Maine.

Late Count
The count at 11:45 p.m. EST, stood: Democrats elected 114, Republicans 40. In 74 other districts Republicans were leading. Democrats were ahead in 48.

Democrats were ahead in Districts now held by Republicans, while Republicans were leading in 10 held by Democrats.

Among early casualties was Rep. T. James Tamm, incumbent New Jersey Democrat who lost to Republican Vincent J. Delly.

Late Seat
Democrats lost another seat in Connecticut, where Patrick J. Ward failed to take the seat vacated by Thomas Dodd, Democrat running for the Senate. Ward lost to Republican Edwin H. May.

Democrats wrestled control of the House from Republicans in the off-year 1954 voting. They now hold an edge of 230 to 201. Each party has two vacancies.

Suomela Given Fisheries Post

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6 (U.P.) — Interior Secretary Fred A. Seaton today announced reorganization of the Fish and Wildlife Service and named Arnie J. Suomela to a key position. Suomela, former Oregon State director of fisheries, was named acting director of the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries. John L. Farley, former director of the old U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, was named acting director of the new Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.

Hatfield Election Means New County Face in Legislature

Sen. Morse Allowed to Vote Despite Challenge

EUGENE, Nov. 6 (U.P.) — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore) was challenged today as he cast his vote. He voted though, despite the effort of the man he defeated in the May primary. Woody Smith, Hood River service station operator who has challenged Morse's nomination in the courts since his defeat, waited at the small home which is the polling place where Morse votes.

When Morse went up to turn in his ballot, Smith said, "I challenge that vote of Senator Morse."

Takes Oath
Mrs. Earl Pallett, chairman of the precinct election board, then administered an oath to Morse in which he swore he was a resident of the precinct and qualified to vote.

Smith, who has contended Morse had no right to the Democratic nomination because he changed his registration from Republican, said, "I want to know if Mr. Morse changed his party in good faith."

Morse replied, "There's no question about the fact that I changed my party affiliation. I became a Democrat and I'm proud of my decision."

Decision Later
Mrs. Pallett said she would take up with the board later whether Morse's ballot would be accepted. But it was expected that it would because Lloyd Payne, county elections deputy, said earlier he knew of no legal restriction that could prevent Morse from voting.

Mrs. Morse, who changed her registration at the same time as the senator, was not challenged. A large party of Democrats accompanied Morse. That, along with newsmen and photographers, jammed the small polling place.

Filtration Plant Backed At Silverton

SILVERTON, Wednesday, Nov. 7 — Silverton voters were approving a \$175,000 bond issue for a water filtration plant by a decisive margin, complete returns for two of the city's four precincts showed early today. The margin was 413 to 146. Other precincts were reported counting general election ballots first.

Returns for four seats on the city council showed the leaders were Norman Eastman with 432 votes, Elmer Johnson 315, Harold Moore 299, and James Hollingsworth 309.

Trailing for council seats were John Brown with 286, Earl Hartman 268, Lenard Kephart 216, and Willard Hayne 204.

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 6 (U.P.) — Democrat Frank Church defeated Republican Sen. Herman Welker to day, shifting Idaho from the Republican to the Democratic column in the race for the United States Senate.

County Polls See Record Voter Number

Marion County voters marched to the polls in unprecedented numbers Tuesday, easily eclipsing previous ballot totals and reflecting the efforts of many organizations to "get out the vote."

A sample of twelve representative precincts in the county indicated that final results may show over 85 per cent of the record voter registration casting ballots. Two Salem area precincts, one of them the largest in Marion County, recorded 92 per cent of the total registration. Several others ranged above the 85 per cent mark.

Biggest mass of voters was in Salem Heights Precinct No. 48 where 845 voters of 911 cast ballots. Despite the heavy turnout, Election Board Chairman Mrs. Denver Young said no voters in line when a p. m. closing time came. Substantial lines had existed in the morning hours and late afternoon, however.

Approaching the 100 per cent mark also was Precinct No. 58 on East Center St. were 341 of 357 turn out. Precinct 168 and 13 were among those checked with over a 90 per cent showing.

McMINNVILLE, Wednesday, Nov. 7 — Wallace L. (Bud) Mekkers held a two-to-one margin over Sheriff W. J. (Bill) Jones early today in Yamhill County.

Mekkers, a Democrat had 2218 votes to 1144 for Jones (R), in complete returns from 12 of 38 precincts. The race had been tabbed as a close one.

In the other contested county race Republican Charles N. Tvedgard had 1871 votes to 1317 for Herbert Holt (D).

Magnuson Re-Elected

SEATTLE, Nov. 6 (U.P.) — Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash) was re-elected to a third term today by Washington voters, defeating Gov. Arthur B. Langlie who had been drafted by Republican leaders to oppose him. Langlie conceded when the vote from 1,238 of 40 state's 4,782 precincts stood at 157,949 for Magnuson to 102,614 for Langlie.

Linn Office Incumbents Hold Comfortable Leads

ALBANY, Wednesday, Nov. 7 — All incumbents for county offices in Linn County showed a comfortable margin as 30 out of 80 precincts were reported early today. For county commissioner, Floyd D. Jenks (R) had received 3,453 votes to his opponent's, Albert "Al" Zentz (D), 2,500.

County Clerk incumbent R. M. Russell (R), received 3,549 votes to 2,502 for Katherine Harris (D). Stella E. Hoover, Republican incumbent for recorder had 3,377 to 2,586 for Eva Sylvester (D).

Votes for county treasurer totaled 3,252 for incumbent Raymond Tomlinson (R), Evelyn Downing (D), received 2,719 votes.

In the race for county assessor, incumbent John W. Sheppard (R), received 3,227 votes and his opponent Jason T. Anderson (D), 2,724 votes.

W. Glenn Huston (D), incumbent for the coroner's seat, received 3,627 votes and his opponent Dr. Lawrence A. Dennis (R), 2,360. Republican incumbents Ed R. Cardwell and Jess W. Savage, were both leading in the race for 13th Representative District.

Cardwell received 3,016 votes, and Savage, 3,078. Democratic opponent Roy Fitzwater received 2,926, and William Gould (D), 2,548.

Returns for president showed 610 votes for President Eisenhower and 2,510 for Stevenson. McKay was leading for Oregon's U. S. Senator with 3,140 votes to 3,054 for Morse.

For Fourth District Representative in Congress, Harris Ellsworth (R), was leading with 2,553 votes, while his opponent, Charles O. Porter (D), had 2,328.

Gov. Elmo Smith (R), was leading with 3,306 to 2,868 for Robert D. Holmes (D).

Complete returns from two of four city wards showed fluoridation of city water trailing 32 to 275. The measure had been approved by a fairly substantial margin but opponents challenged the election and secured a new vote.

Marion County Voters Back Ike by 2 to 1

Marion County's voters gave President Eisenhower a nearly 2 to 1 margin in the general election Tuesday and gave substantial majorities to all national and state Republican candidates except in the attorney general race.
