Tickets Available 'Family Style' for Stayton Breakfast

STAYTON, Nov. 6.—The many organizations in the North Santiam area are busily planning the first annual Santiam Memorial Hospital benefit breakfast to be held Sunday.

All the organizations are backing this breakfast much as all the communities backed the buildings of the hospital a few years ago. Breakfast will be served from 6:30 a.m. until 11 a.m. at the Civic Building in Stayton. It will consist of ham and hotcakes. Tickets will be sold on the family plan—three dollars for a family or one dollar for an individual.

Some of the organizations who will take part are: The Junior Chamber of Commerce, which will attend to getting tables and chairs; Knights of Columbus, who have charge of dishes and silver; and the Stayton Chamber which is selling tickets. The Chamber reportedly has distributed tickets to every organization in the canyon. The Shrine Club will clean up.

Services for the Rev. Mr. Schoeler, whose home in recent months has been at 3551 E. Burnside St., Portland, will be at 11 a.m. at St. Paul's Lutheran Church, SE 39th and Tibbets St., with final rites at Portland Memorial Cemetery.

The Rev. Mr. Schoeler has conducted many services at Siverton, and was instrumental in organizing the Lutheran Student Founda at Oregon state colleges and universities.

Trinity Lutheran congregation, Siverton, was one of the early Lutheran congregations in the state to endorse the work of the Rev. Mr. Schoeler. For the last 10 years he was state supervisor for the Lutheran Brotherhood Insurance, as well as substitute pas-

tor in many Lutheran churches in the state. Survivors include the widow, Martha Schoeler; four daughters, Gertrude Schoeler, Hildegard Heustis, Margaret Smith and Marie Harris; two brothers in Germany and seven grandchildren.
