

GOP Domination of Oregon's Statehouse Ended With Vote

The 22-year Republican Statehouse domination and a good many Republican jobs were buried here Wednesday under a phenomenal pile of ballots.

Atop the heap, with a Democratic Legislature to keep him company, was Robert D. Holmes, 46-

year-old Clatsop County senator, who climbed from near defeat in his own party's primary to upset incumbent Elmo Smith for the governorship.

Holmes' victory, along with the election of Republican Treasurer Sig Unander and Mark Hatfield to the secretary of state post, will bring to the Capitol in January probably one of the youngest boards of control in state history. Holmes at 46 is the senior of the trio. Unander is 38 and Hatfield 32.

Served Together

Hatfield, who watched his margin held against Democratic opponent Monroe Sweetland from his home in Salem Wednesday night, said he was "looking forward to working with Bob Holmes." They have served in the legislature through three sessions, one of them in the Senate.

Holmes' victory brings him the chairmanship of the board of control which he has campaigned to abolish along with many of the state government boards and commissions.

Holmes had campaigned also on a promise to "clean house in Salem," and the impact of Tuesday's victory hit hard at many of the state's top non-civil service employees.

'Business Good'

As one observer put it "The real estate business ought to go good in Salem for the next few months."

"There'll be no wholesale firing," Holmes said Wednesday night in a telephone interview as his victory margin edged up. "I would plan to do nothing to have people doing good jobs put out of them," he said.

"Naturally there are many areas of state government in which I plan changes," Holmes added, but he declined to name specific offices.

'Little Numb'

"I'm a little numb," the surprising but not surprised victor said Wednesday night. "I honestly felt that last night when it was close, 7,000 to 5,000 votes—and realizing the pattern of the late vote for the Democrats, that I had an excellent chance. I went to bed at 2 a.m. (Wednesday morning) feeling I had an excellent chance."

Holmes planned no immediate trip to Salem where he has served through four legislative sessions. Ahead for the next few days are some rest and relaxation for him and his wife Mary who have been constantly on the campaign trail since last March.

"Then we'll come home here."

Labor Points To Demo Wins In Congress

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (U)—Labor union leaders took a licking in President Eisenhower's election victory but claimed credit today for having helped keep Congress Democratic.

Leaders of the 15-million member AFL-CIO and most individual unions had endorsed Democrat Adlai Stevenson. But many union members seemed to ignore this advice and to have voted instead for Eisenhower.

This repetition of what happened in 1952—when the unions were also for Stevenson only to have union workers cast their ballots for Eisenhower in great numbers—is hardly likely to discourage union political activity in the future.

In fact, George Meany, AFL-CIO president, already was looking ahead to the next election. He said the 45th Congress, while Democratic, will "not be predominantly liberal" but organized labor now has "renewed hope for accomplishing that objective in 1958."

Personal Tribute

Meany said Eisenhower's personal popularity, not the Republican program, won the presidential phase of the election. He said considering Eisenhower's record margin it was "little short of a political miracle" that the GOP failed to carry Congress.

"I am convinced it was due in large part to the educational work of labor," Meany said. "The Committee on Political Education, the political arm of the AFL-CIO, has concentrated its efforts, day in and day out throughout the year, on the election of liberal, progressive candidates to Congress."

Secretary of Labor Mitchell said on the other hand the election results should "dispel forever the myth that the Democratic party is the party of labor." He said Eisenhower's vote demonstrated "endorsement of his policies by the working men and women of America."

All the key industrial states, with heavy union membership, went for Eisenhower, mostly by heavy majorities, but union labor undoubtedly was a factor in many gubernatorial and congressional races.

In Michigan where Walter Reuther, United Auto Workers Union is strong, Democratic Gov. G. Mennen Williams was elected to a fifth term although Eisenhower carried the state by more than 200,000. Labor helped Democrats win hard races for the U.S. Senate in such states as Pennsylvania, Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Russ Boost Cease-Fire

MOSCOW, Nov. 7 (U)—Moscow radio said tonight that the Middle East cease-fire is "the first step toward peace." The radio added in the first official Soviet comment on the cease-fire that "the danger of aggression against Egypt is still not ended" by the cease-fire alone.

The radio said Britain, France and Israel had been forced by pressure of public opinion and the U.N. General Assembly resolution to cease their attack on the Egyptian people.

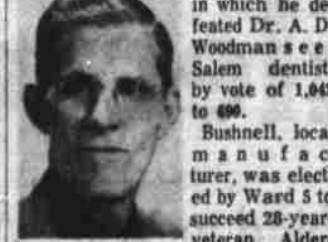

Nehru Warns Soviet Union

LONDON, Thursday, Nov. 8 (U)—Moscow radio today broadcast a message from India's Prime Minister Nehru apparently warning the Soviet Union that if it intervenes in Egypt a world war may break out.

Nehru sent his message to Premier Nikita Khrushchev in connection with the latter's threat to Britain, France and Israel on Monday that the Soviet Union will invoke the use of force to halt their fighting against Egypt.

"Your country has headed the campaign in defense of peace," the Moscow broadcast quoted Nehru as saying.

"Therefore, although we fully agree that aggression of any kind should be stopped, we firmly believe that any step which might lead to a world war would be a crime against mankind and should be avoided."

Marion County One of Few Backing McKay

It wasn't much, but the approximately 2,400 vote majority Douglas McKay gathered in Marion County, his home pasture, over his opponent Sen. Wayne Morse was one of the biggest bulges McKay gained in any county in the state.

In voting this slim preference for McKay, this county lined up with about a half-dozen other pro-McKay counties, according to incomplete returns from the state's 37 counties late Wednesday.

On the other hand the whopping 13,000 plus majority Marion County voters gave to home county boy Sen. Mark Hatfield amounted to a considerable portion of the approximately 18,000 state-wide edge Hatfield held over his democratic opponent, Monroe Sweetland, early today.

This county went along with the state on other major candidates, with the exception of Gov. Elmo Smith, to whom it gave an approximate 6,000 majority.

Voters in Marion County agreed with other Oregon ballot-casters on the seven state-wide measures with the exception of the measure seeking to boost state salaries which was defeated state-wide and passed in this county and the measure repealing old salaries, which was defeated here and yet approved state-wide.

Marion County also contributed to the Democratic majority created in the state House of Representatives at the coming session by electing Guy Jonas, a Democrat.

7 of 11 Towns in Oregon Reject Fluoridation

Fluoridation proposals lost in seven of 11 places where they were on the ballot.

Portland voted 3-2 against it. Proposals were rejected by varying margins in Eugene, Klamath Falls, La Grande, Medford, Redmond and McMinnville.

At Coos Bay, voters favored fluoridation as they did in Astoria, Gearhart and Warrenton. The last three cities have had fluoridation for some time.

VIENNA, Nov. 7 (U)—A new demand for more freedom, including halting immediately of jamming of Western radio broadcasts, came today from Poland's youth.

Gazeta-Robotnica, the Communist party newspaper at Wroclaw, carried demands by students at the polytechnic institute there. They asked also for publication of all international agreements made by Polish governments.

7 of 11 Towns in Oregon Reject Fluoridation

Except in coastal communities, residents in widely scattered parts of Oregon voted against fluoridation of their water supplies Tuesday.

Fluoridation proposals lost in seven of 11 places where they were on the ballot.

Portland voted 3-2 against it. Proposals were rejected by varying margins in Eugene, Klamath Falls, La Grande, Medford, Redmond and McMinnville.

At Coos Bay, voters favored fluoridation as they did in Astoria, Gearhart and Warrenton. The last three cities have had fluoridation for some time.

Demand for More Freedom Issued By Polish Youth

VIENNA, Nov. 7 (U)—A new demand for more freedom, including halting immediately of jamming of Western radio broadcasts, came today from Poland's youth.

Gazeta-Robotnica, the Communist party newspaper at Wroclaw, carried demands by students at the polytechnic institute there. They asked also for publication of all international agreements made by Polish governments.

Nehru Accepts Swiss Invitation To Summit Meet

BERN, Switzerland, Nov. 7 (U)—India's Prime Minister Nehru today accepted the Swiss government's invitation to a summit meeting to meet what Switzerland regards as the threat of a third World War.

The government yesterday asked Britain, France, Russia, the United States and India to hold a meeting of heads of governments in Switzerland to save world peace. The Big Four powers have not yet replied.

Nobel Peace Prize To Go Unawarded

OSLO, Norway, Nov. 7 (U)—The Nobel Peace Prize will go unawarded for the second straight year, the Nobel Committee announced today. The committee gave no reason for its decision.
