# Scientist Sees New Ice Age For World

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 on keeping" suggest that North America may be heading into an-

America may be heading into another major ice age, a government geologist said today.

The possibility exists, said Dr. Thor N. V. Karlstrom of the U. S. Geological Survey, that climatic conditions conducive to the expansion of glaciers may even now be brewing in the arctic and that within the next 10,000 to 15,000 years ice might spread over Canada and reach the U. S. border.

He told a reporter about this in

He told a reporter about this in amplifying a technical report he made to the fall meeting of the National Academy of Sciences. His report dealt with new findings about glaciers of the past which he said have been made possible by the use of "radiocarbon dating" techniques.

Radiocarbon dating—or "atomic imp-keeping"—is a method of computing the age of organic macrial by means of the radioactivity it emits. That is, the older he specimes, the weaker its radioactivity.

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
