## Road Program to Save Drivers \$92 Per Year

The ordinary auto driver will save about \$92 a year when the ambitious federal highway building program is completed, the speaker said. The basis of the federal highway plan is connecting highways for virtually all state capitals and cities of over 50,000 population throughout the U. S. by highways (principally four-lane) made for high speed through travel with controlled access and other safety factors.

Enfield described the expected results of the 13-year \$27 billion highway construction program in a talk before Salem Chamber of Commerce at a Marion Hotel luncheon.

Among many economic advantages from the program, according to the attorney, will be cash savings to the citizen road user. He said experts maintain that the network of through highways will mean a savings of at least one cent a mile on the cost of operating a car.

For the 10,000-miles-a-year driver, said Enfield, this would be \$100 savings a year. From that he subtracted \$8 as the estimated cost of additional taxation supporting the roadbuilding program.

## Bank to Fight Closure Plan For Saturday

First National Bank of Portland served notice Monday that it will oppose any Oregon legislative move toward required closing of banks on Saturday.

C. B. Stephenson, president of the bank, wrote The Statesman that he understood such a bill would be introduced in the 1957 Legislature.

He said recent professionally conducted surveys in both Portland and upstate communities showed that bank closing on Saturdays would inconvenience over one-third of the bank's Saturday customers and would be an unpopular move in general.

The bank president also said since most of his employees are now employed on a 5-day week basis, any forced Saturday closing would mean about a 13 per cent reduction in bank employment.

Stephenson said Friday and Saturday are the biggest banking days of the week.

## Unexpected Win Gained by GOP Aspirant

An unexpected 22nd seat in the State House of Representatives was picked up Monday by a Republican candidate when final counting of votes showed John D. Mosser, Portland attorney and Washington County resident, won out over Democrat James R. Shick, Forest Grove attorney.

In the unofficial county last week it had appeared that Shick won. Another reversal which turned up over the weekend put Republican State Rep. Edwin E. Cone, Eugene, back in the Legislature from Lane County, instead of C. A. Paddock, Democrat of Oakridge who had been listed last week as the winner of that race.

Democrats will control the House by 38 to 22 votes according to the party line split indicated by election results.
