Juveniles Admit School Break-ins In Two Counties

ALBANY, Nov. 29 — Three men whose plans to manufacture accordion-type tables folded up are involved in litigation here.

Plaintiff in the original suit in Linn County Circuit Court is Warren A. Roberts, Corvallis, who allegedly invented the table.

Roberts alleges that Elwood G. Erickson and J. F. Howard, both of Albany, have paid only \$600 on a \$5,000 note for rights to manufacture the folding type tables.

The defendants have filed a counter-suit alleging that the table was not eligible for patent and that equipment turned over to them by Roberts was damaged.

The two Albany men allege that they have been deprived of an estimated \$6,000 a year profit. In their counter-suit they ask for the estimated profits for a year plus \$84,000 general damages.

Sale of Invention Leads To Linn County Lawsuits

GUATEMALA, Nov. 29 (AP) — President Carlos Castillo Armas said today the reported plotting of Guatemalan exiles abroad against his anti-Communist regime "is of no importance."

Ismael Ortiz, Guatemalan security chief, had told newsmen reports that Guatemalans in Mexico were plotting the overthrow of the Castillo Armas government. He said his security forces had taken the necessary measures to foil any attempted revolution.

The President told correspondents Guatemala's economic situation was good, with business steadily improving.

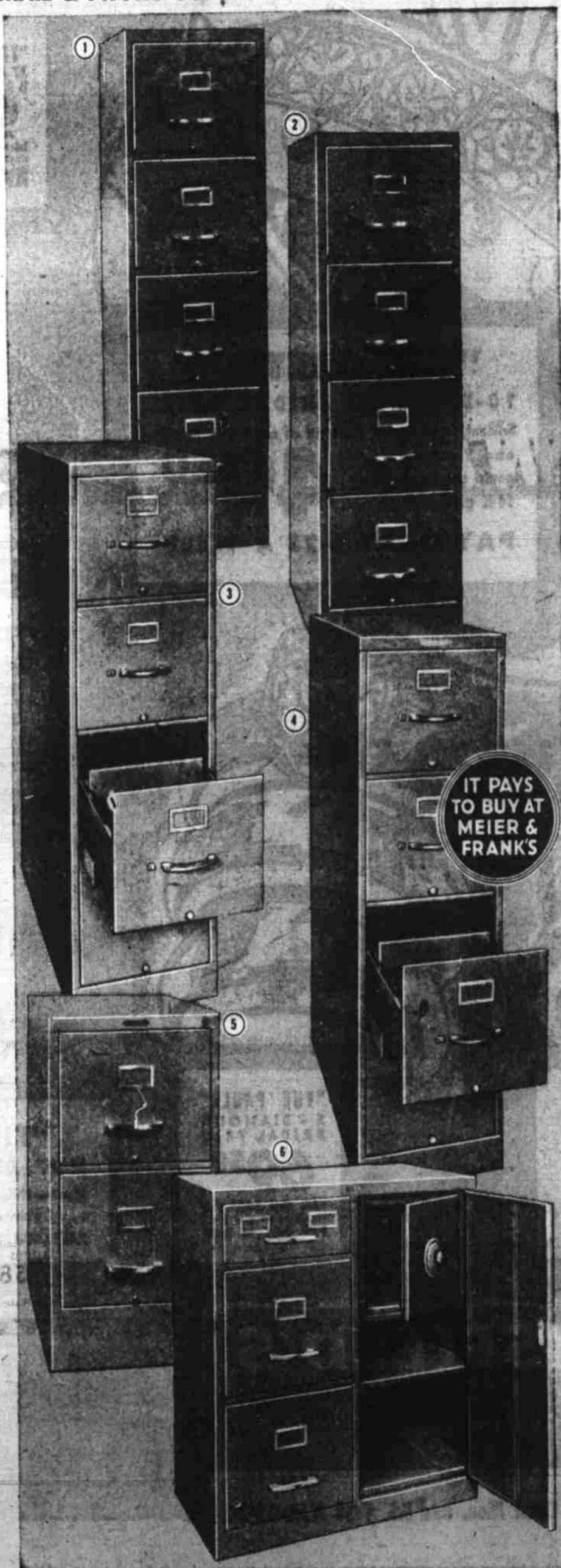
