Salem's YMCA added more muscle to its operations with dedication of a new wing Friday night. In official words, the addition puts the YM in a stronger position to serve the ever growing needs of the youth of the community.

The several speeches at the dedication program were filled with reminiscences and history and thanks for the men who worked to make the new wing possible. Curly Abrams, in his 51st year, is a member of the YM board. He told how the main YM building on Court Street was finally realized in 1934 under leadership of longtime General Secretary A. K. Kelle. He said the new wing "another milestone" in the history of the organization.

Abrams himself drew praise during the evening as "the spearhead" behind the drive for the youth center.

Charles A. Sprague, another longtime board member, paid tribute to "these men, most of them now deceased, who supported the YM in earlier years." He mentioned such men as W. L. Slater, Thomas Kay, and William T. A. Lively, T. H. Hanks, R. J. Hendricks and C. H. Hanks.

Sprague noted that the YM has long enjoyed fine leadership under General Secretary Kelle and his successor, Gus Myers.

Heard Reed Foster, Polk County District Attorney, said while the new wing is a milestone, there must be thoughts of the future "when the program of service must reach ever further out."

Allyson Sprague and Walter C. Hendricks spoke in place of the scheduled speaker, Dr. Frank Bennett, president of Northern Oregon College. Another guest speaker, Dr. Bennett, was unable to attend.

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Special music for the dedication was provided by a quartet group from North Salem High School.

During course of the program it was pointed out that approximately 10,000 still remain unemployed in the last of the year.

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Man Admits Four Knife Slayings

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About the boy, police quoted him as saying, "I killed him to repay society for some of the pushing around I got when I was a kid."

Detective Capt. Robert Guggenmos identified the man as Stephen Nash, arrested last night on Los Angeles. Said Nash with a blood-stained hunting knife in his possession. He was brought to this suburb for questioning after, police said, bits of human flesh and blond hair were found on the knife.

The boy, Larry George Rice of nearby Venice, died in a hospital 3 1/2 hours after he was found under a pier. Doctors said he had been stabbed 18 times in the back, several times in the abdomen, partly disemboweling him and elsewhere on the body.

Capt. Guggenmos said Nash is an ex-convict, released last year from San Quentin after serving nearly seven years on a grand theft conviction.

Auto Racer Jailed for Street Chase

The second youth involved in a North Capitol Street auto racing arrest Wednesday was sentenced to five days in Marion County Jail Friday.

Laurence Andrew Davenport, 18, of 2578 Fairhaven Ave., pleaded guilty to a charge of holding a speed contest on the Salem street when he appeared in Marion County District Court.

Davenport and Franklin Delano Fleming of Denver, Colo., were arrested by a county deputy sheriff after the two drivers reportedly raced ahead of him on North Capitol. Fleming also pleaded guilty to the charge and was fined \$50 and sentenced to five days in jail. Friday the fine was cancelled.

Boy Admits Setting Fire Fatal to 11

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Nov. 30 (U. S. P.)—A new fire burned over 100 acres of brush today while an Indian boy was ordered detained on a charge of starting the disastrous Cleveland National Forest fire in which 11 men died.

Flames swept through the brush five miles north of Escondido but were controlled within a few hours by state forestry crews helped by county prison camp volunteers.

Gilbert Paipa, 15, youngest of six children of an Inaja Reservation family, was held for further hearing Dec. 19 on a statement he gave a U. S. Forest Service investigator that "I just got a mad crazy idea to throw a match in the grass to see if it would burn."

U.S. Mum on Atomic Plane

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (U. S. P.)—The Air Force declined to comment today on published reports that the first nuclear aircraft engine was being test-flown secretly.

Earlier this year the Air Force announced that a Convair B-2 heavy bomber was being used as a platform for carrying a nuclear reactor in tests of its performance in flight.

The Air Force emphasized that the reactor was not being used as a power source. Its purpose was to provide information in the development of a nuclear-powered airplane on the weight and shielding problems that would be involved with atomic power aloft.

Sherry Fong Asks Supreme Court Reverse Verdict

PORTLAND, Nov. 30 (U. S. P.)—Sherry Fong, under life sentence in connection with the death of her 16-year-old baby sister, Diane Hanks, today appealed to the state Supreme Court for a reversal of her conviction.

Mrs. Fong, held in the Multnomah County Jail pending the appeal, was convicted last December of second-degree murder. The body of the Hanks girl was found in Clark County, Wash., in February, 1954.

Mrs. Fong's attorney, Leo Levenson and Irvin Goodman, filed a 171-page brief, having their appeal on five points. These included contentions that the prosecutor's acts made a "fair and impartial trial impossible," and that the trial was "prejudicated on inference and not on facts."

Lad Charged With Murder In Idaho Fire

MOSCOW, Idaho (U. S. P.)—A freshman reporter, whose first big story was the three-deck fire at University of Idaho dormitory Oct. 19, was charged with first degree murder in the case Friday.

The charge was placed against Paul D. Matovich, 20, Kellogg, Idaho, 10 days after his arrest on a charge of arson in an earlier dormitory fire on the campus.

Three residents of Gault Hall died in the early morning blaze that Matovich has admitted setting, according to Prosecutor Lloyd G. Martinson. They are Paul Johnson of Davenport, Wash., William Schulberg of Teton, Idaho and John R. Knudson of Idaho Falls, all 18.

Matovich was charged specifically with the death of Johnson. No mention was made in the complaint of the other deaths.

Another charge of first degree arson was also filed against Matovich Friday in connection with an Oct. 12 fire at Sweet Hall, the first in a series of four. The youth had been charged earlier with arson in a fire at Chisman Hall, where he once lived.

Seaton Said In Favor of Federal Dam

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30—A columnist reported today that Sec. of the Interior Fred Seaton has decided in favor of a high federal dam at Pleasant Valley on the Snake River downstream from Hells Canyon.

Thomas I. Stokes, who interviewed Seaton earlier this week, reported, "Now subject to approval by the Budget Bureau, Sec. Seaton has decided to submit to Congress a proposal for a high federal dam which would be built at the Mountain Sheep - Pleasant Valley site in the Snake downstream from the Oxbow and Brownlee Dams of Idaho Power Co."

Seaton was not available for comment.

If the administration approves the proposed high dam, it would mark a sharp change in power policy.

U.N. Forces Move Into Suez Battle Positions

EL CAP, Egypt, Nov. 30—(AP)—United Nations troops launched their historic peace patrol between hostile forces today and it wasn't easy.

They took over British forward positions almost without a hitch but were barred from Egypt's entrenchments across the truce line.

By nightfall, U.N. troops occupied a buffer zone 600 yards wide and 1,000 yards deep between a British sector of the British-French front and the Egyptian lines.

Danish troops wearing blue U.N. helmets moved into sand-bagged British foxholes about 24 miles south of the British-French headquarters in Port Said. They carried machine guns and rifles.

British Withdraw
As they moved up across no-man's-land, British soldiers moved back northward.

A U.N. observer in a front line position said Egyptians did not reciprocate.

The observer said the Egyptians agreed only to let U.N. forces establish lightly manned checkpoints 20 yards in front of their forward foxholes.

Woods Fires In Oregon Under Control

PORTLAND, Nov. 30 (U. S. P.)—Fair weather and the absence of blustery east winds have enabled crews to bring all woods fires in Oregon under control, the state forestry office and U.S. Forest Service said today.

The forestry offices said they expected "no further trouble" unless the wind should return. The general weather outlook was for calm conditions over the week-end, with the prospects of rain Monday or Tuesday.

Lessening of the wind took much of the push out of the fires, particularly the blazes in the Astoria watershed. These were being held within the 4,000 acres of burned-over slash lands.

The other blazes in Clackamas
