

Salem Area Takes Five-Inch Snow In Stride; School Kids Out Early

(Story also on Page 1.)
The Salem area was taking its five-inch snow in stride by Friday evening after a day of preoccupation with tire chains and driving hazards, snow play and school transport problems, heavy work by street and road crews, reduced store traffic in the business districts.

Salem District operated its schools today but sent one-fourth of its students home in early afternoon to make sure school bus routes could be negotiated safely.

City Hall took one look at the early morning snow and set about

reserving eight choice hills in various sections of the city for children's play. For the first time this activity was put under the joint city-schools recreation program and supervisors were hired for the coasting areas. (Picture on Page 1.)

Dying Lawyer Argues Case Before Court

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (U.P.)—A Washington lawyer, known here as dying of cancer, kept his date with the Supreme Court Wednesday by arguing his last and most important case.

The lawyer, Fred Savoy, 57, had fainted himself with six pints of blood and made what Justice William O. Douglas called a "heroic presentation."

Today, Savoy was found dead in his apartment in northwest Washington.

Savoy had been operated on in February and the surgeons removed one lung. They gave him three to six months to live. Part of the work he did for his last case was in a hospital bed. It was reported by associates who said "he did a magnificent job."

In an hour-long presentation to the Supreme Court, Savoy argued on behalf of James Francis A. Ferguson, who seeks \$112,500 for goods delivered to guerrillas during the Japanese occupation of the Philippines Islands.

In his appearance before the court, Savoy was ashen-faced and coughed frequently.

The nine justices, aware of his condition, limited their questioning to one or two perfunctory inquiries. The court marshal had a trained nurse waiting at the rear of the chamber.

His office reported Savoy "just made it out of the court," rushed home and went to bed.

Seed Men Collect Assessments for Fescue Marketing

PORTLAND, Dec. 7 (U.P.)—Oregon seed dealers reported today they have collected assessments on nearly 14 million pounds of fescue seed to launch a fescue marketing program.

Tom De Armond, Hubbard, chairman of the Oregon Fescue Marketing Commission, said that the money will be used to promote and protect the seed industry.

'Provisional' Power Due For Factories

PORTLAND, Dec. 7 (U.P.)—Ten of the 13 major users of interruptible power will be getting their electric current under the classification "provisional" at midnight tonight.

Bonneville Power Administration, reporting this, said steam power was available for the other

The 10 accepted the switch from interruptible to provisional when Bonneville late Wednesday reported that it would have to be paid back, if a further shortage makes that necessary, only on the basis of 1.87 to 1 instead of 2 1/4 to 1 estimated earlier.

Interruptible power is that delivered with the understanding it will be cut off when streamflow falls to the point that firm contracts can't be met.

Hood River Man Heads D.A. Group

PORTLAND, Dec. 7 (U.P.)—The District Attorneys Assn. of Oregon, holding its annual meeting here, today elected Kenneth Abraham of Hood River as president.

Thomas Brownhill, Astoria, was named vice president and William L. Langley, Portland, was re-elected secretary-treasurer. Langley, Multnomah County district attorney, is under indictment on charges of conspiracy to permit gambling in Portland.

Named to the executive committee were Warren Albright, Jefferson County, and Winston Bradshaw, Clackamas County.

The association adopted a resolution favoring legislation to make the office of district attorney non-partisan.

The Oregon State Sheriff's Assn., which also met in annual session here, elected R. H. Busch, Washington County, president; John Elfring, Malheur County, vice president; and Forrest C. Sholes, Lane County, secretary-treasurer.

Pier Blast Blamed on Torch Sparks

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 (U.P.)—Fire Commissioner Edward F. Cavanagh Jr. said tonight Brooklyn's disastrous pier blast Monday was caused by acetylene torch sparks setting a fire which took 37,000 pounds of detonator cord fuses.

The waterfront disaster claimed 10 lives and injured 246 persons. Pier 35 was destroyed with the loss set at 15 million dollars.

Cavanagh, in making the first official announcement regarding the cause of the fire and explosion, said officials came to this conclusion: The shipment of detonator fuses "stored... on the pier, and exploded to complete fire in cargoes of rubber, alcohol, lacquer and varnish, became heated and detonated and was the competent and producing cause of the tragic explosion."

Authorities have said that the fuses, manufactured under the trade name "Primacord" by the Conign Bluff Co., of Simsbury, Conn., were stored on the pier for shipment to the West Coast.

Russia Rejects Joint Air-Photo Plan in Arctic

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (U.P.)—Russia has rejected a U.S. proposal to map the icecap in the North Pole region by means of a joint air-photo operation.

The State Department tonight made public a note from Russia which in effect said:

1. The Soviet would be happy to send its planes into U.S. polar territory to help Americans make aerial photos of the ice there.

2. But Russia wanted no American planes taking pictures over Soviet territory in the Arctic Ocean.

Desire to Live in U.S. No Reason For Prison Term

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 7 (U.P.)—A federal judge who said he could not find it "in his conscience to send a man to prison for wanting to live in the United States" set a 21-year-old Mexican youth free today.

Judge Richard M. Duncan placed Rithen Nieto on probation with the admonition to go home and stay this time.

Nieto had been deported three times since 1953 for illegal entry.

Substation Additions at Salem, Chemawa on Tap

PORTLAND, Dec. 7 (U.P.)—Substation additions at Salem and Chemawa and a 24-mile transmission line between Oregon City and Chemawa are among 85 projects in a \$6-million-dollar Bonneville Power Administration construction program outlined to western states contractors here today.

The projects listed for contract in the next year are in Oregon, Washington, Northern Idaho and Western Montana.

Improvements at the Salem substation will call for construction of concrete sidewalks in the switchyard area, and paving of the entrance road and parking area. At the Chemawa substation, BPA plans to build two 23 kv line terminals. Bids for both jobs will be called in March.

The overall construction program includes 5 million dollars in contract construction, 13 million dollars in material purchases, 600 million dollars for land, \$500,000 for surveys and design, and 6 1/2 million dollars for personnel, labor, communications and other items.

Growers Pick Conservation Man of Year

PORTLAND, Dec. 7 (U.P.)—Kenneth Peck of Lexington, who has used trashy fallow with strip cropping to prevent erosion on his 1,120 acre wheat and cattle farm, today was named "Conservation Man of the Year" by the Oregon Wheat Growers League.

M. J. Frey, publisher of The Oregonian, presented the newspaper's award to him.

Mrs. C. E. Filbin of The Dalles was named winner of the league's cake baking contest. Mrs. Norma Gibson, La Grande, was second and Mrs. Mildred Kasari, Echo, was third.

Gordon Frazer, assistant administrator of the foreign agriculture service for the U.S. Department of Agriculture, told the meeting that increased exports of wheat, largely as a result of the government surplus disposal programs, will greatly improve the outlook for the U.S. wheat grower within the next two to three years.

Riesel Case Underlings Go to Prison

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 (U.P.)—Three underlings in the Victor Riesel acid-blasting case were sentenced to prison today by a judge who termed the crime an attack upon law enforcement as well as upon the labor writer.

Federal Judge William B. Herlands, a member of the Goldfish (Shickel) Mirandi, 37, and Domenico (Nick) Bando, 47, to five years each, and Leo Telvi, 26, to two years. Mirandi also was fined \$10,000.

Four more defendants are scheduled to go on trial next week. They include John (Johnny) Dioguardi, accused as the "mastermind" in a plot to intimidate Riesel from testifying before a federal grand jury investigating racket.

The trio sentenced by Herlands were accused of conspiring to obstruct justice by helping Abel Telvi, 22, the alleged acid thrower, flee to a hideout in Youngstown, Ohio. He later returned to New York and was slain.

U.S. Pushes Proposal For U.N. Observers

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Dec. 7 (U.P.)—The United States was reported tonight pushing a proposal that the General Assembly ostracize Hungary's delegation unless that country admits U.N. observers.

U.S. Wins Round in U.N. As Philippines Given Seat

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Dec. 7 (U.P.)—Eastern Europe lost its seat on the Security Council today to the Philippines, backed by the United States in the latest East-West row of the General Assembly. The Soviet Union protested vehemently.

The Philippines polled 51 of the 74 valid ballots cast during the secret voting. The Soviet candidate, Czechoslovakia, received 20 votes, Afghanistan, Spain and Yugoslavia one each and one country abstained. Four members were absent. This gave the Philippines one more than the two-thirds vote required for election.

Yugoslavia, which resigned from the Council in accord with a deal breaking a 35-ballot deadlock with the Philippines last year, will give up its seat Dec. 31 and the Philippines will serve the remainder of the normal two-year term.

It will be the first time since the Council was organized in 1946 that a country from Eastern Europe has not occupied one of the six non-permanent seats. The So-

Pair Fined For Attack On King Cole

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Dec. 7 (U.P.)—Two Anniston men today pleaded guilty to a charge of assault in the April 10 attack on Negro singer Nat King Cole, and were fined.

Kenneth Adams, 25, was fined \$50 and court costs, Willis R. Vinson, 23, \$100 and costs at a circuit court hearing. They were given until next Friday to pay the fines and costs.

Four other men arrested with them following the attack on Cole were assessed \$50 fines in a previous court action.

Adams and Vinson had been charged with assault with intent to murder, a felony. The others were charged with misdemeanors.

All six were identified as White Citizens Council members.

Cole was rushed while he was singing before an audience of 4,000 white persons.
