## Yank Flying To Korea for Cripple Waif

MCCLEOD AIR FORCE BASE, Wash., Dec. 20 (AP)—A Ft. Lewis airman flew today to pick up his son—a polio-ridden Korean orphan.

He chose him because not many people want to adopt a crippled child, Sgt. Max Richard Gilman of Tacoma explained as he boarded a military plane for the flight.

The Gilman are childless. They hope to have brown-eyed, 25-month old Gary Richard to fill the void before Christmas.

Sgt. Gilman's two suitcases bulged with Christmas presents and medical supplies for Korean orphans. They are from Henry High, the Oregon farmer who has arranged for hundreds of Korean children to begin life anew with American parents.

Last week the Gilmans drove to San Francisco, hoping their lot would be among the 20 Korean waifs flown to the United States by Capt. Don Gary Richard, through a last-minute mishap, had been left behind.

Gilman decided to fly to Korea. He got help in Washington from Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon and Secretary of the Army Bruceker in cutting the red tape.

Gilman explains it simply: "My parents abandoned me and my five brothers and sisters when we were kids. I know what it means to be an orphan at Christmas."

## Effort Made to Complete Lewis, Clark Highway

LEWISTON, Idaho (AP)—Efforts will be made to speed completion of the Lewis & Clark Highway, which follows the route taken by the famous explorers in their Pacific Northwest expedition 150 years ago.

J. J. Church, a member of the Roads and Highways Committee of the Lewiston Chamber of Commerce, said Thursday the group worked at completion of a dirt link in the first direct highway between Lewiston and Missoula, Mont., by 1908—a year ahead of the present schedule.

Appeals will be made to Congress for funds and to the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads for a speeded up program, he told a joint meeting of the committee and the Lewis & Clark Turquoise Assn.

## 'Dignified But Joyous' Inauguration Planned

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—"Dignified but joyous" is what they want to make the second inauguration of Dwight D. Eisenhower as president next month.

Planning officials said today they were trying to avoid the traffic snarls of 1953 and the jams which kept some persons from events for which they had tickets. They are also shortening the parade, which continued until after dark four years ago.

Congress has the responsibility for the traditional swearing-in ceremony on the Capitol steps at noon Jan. 21.

For the rest, an Inaugural Committee of prominent Washington citizens, aided by film star George Murphy, is planning three days of festivities beginning Saturday, Jan. 19. It will cost around a million dollars.

"The inauguration will be dignified—it will be colorful, and I'm sure those taking part will find it a very historical occasion," Hager V. Fleming, chairman of the Inaugural Committee, told reporters at a briefing session.

Graduates for watching the parade will total some 45,000 persons—2,000 more than four years ago.

Prices have gone up, too. Last time grandstand seats cost \$5.00 to \$25.00. This time they're \$3.50 to \$12.75.

This time there'll be four inaugural balls with invitations going out for 15,000 guests. In 1953 there were two balls to which there were 21,000 paid admissions. Plans are for the President and Mrs. Eisenhower, Vice President and Mrs. Nixon and Republican

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## Bank Teller Calls Young Bandit's Bluff

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M., Dec. 20 (AP)—A young man tried to rob a bank here today, but failed when a teller called his bluff and refused to give him any money.

A few hours later, 19-year-old John Wendell Dillon Jr. of Crown Hill, W. Va., was arrested and charged "with the intent of committing a felony." Dillon was jailed in lieu of \$10,000 bond on the federal charge.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation said Dillon entered the east central branch of the Albuquerque National Bank about noon, thrust a sack at teller Cornelius Arnett and demanded that he fill it with money.

Arnett, 22, said the would-be bandit also handed him a note. It said: "I have your family. I have a gun. Fill the sack with money."

Arnett balked at filling the sack. The intruder fled from the bank and escaped in a car.

The remark that tripped the would-be robber was "I have your family." Arnett has a wife, but no children.

## Increase in Tax Collections Cuts Deficit in U.S.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—Because of substantially higher tax collections, the government's deficit after the first five months of fiscal 1957 was running \$1,499,000,000 less than a year ago.

The Treasury's monthly financial statement showed today that revenues totaled \$22,658,000 from the start of the year, July 1, to Nov. 30. This was \$2,337,000,000 more than in the same five months of fiscal 1956.

Expenditures, at \$22,083,000,000 also were running higher but the difference was smaller—only 608 million dollars.

Expenditures always exceed receipts in the autumn because the period of heavy tax collections occurs in the spring.

## U.N. Forces Advance East Of Canal Zone

CAIRO, Dec. 20 (AP)—Maj. Gen. E.L.M. Burns announced today a Yugoslav company of the U. N. emergency force has advanced about 46 miles east of the Suez Canal.

The U.N. commander said these Yugoslav units following the Israeli withdrawal in the Sinai Peninsula moved eastward along the northern route toward El 'Arish. He said the condition of roads still is delaying Yugoslav units moving across central and southern Sinai.

Part Said's airport was handed over to the U. N. forces formally today by the British-French command.

The exchange of Egyptian prisoners held by the British and French for 456 British civilians detained by Egypt is expected to be completed Friday.

## Armed Forces Test 'Militant Liberty' Plan

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—The Pentagon is running a field test on material for the "militant liberty" program aimed at educating servicemen in the advantages of the American way.

The program, under consideration for a year, evolved from studies of cases of defection among American troops captured by the Communists in Korea.

Proponents of the education plan contend that some of these cases showed that the soldiers involved lacked knowledge of the advantages of American liberty as compared with communism's absolute control.

John C. Broger, deputy director of the Armed Forces Information and Education Office, said 100 kits of motion picture footage, recordings and pamphlets aimed to correct that lack are being sent experimentally to certain units of the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Coast Guard. They are for use by junior grade and noncommissioned officers in lectures.

He said that if the kits prove of value to servicemen at large, the material will be distributed generally throughout the armed forces.

The movies, voice recordings and printed matter in the experimental kits contrast American and Soviet systems in such fields as civic life, the processes of law and order, and religion.

## U. N. Votes Assessment of \$10 Million for Police Unit

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Dec. 20 (AP)—The U. N. voted 57-9 today to make a special assessment of 10 million dollars on the 80 member nations for expenses of the U. N. Emergency Force in the Middle East.

The Soviet bloc nations voted against it and have said they wouldn't pay anything toward the support of the UNEF.

The shares will be based on the 1954 budget assessment rates of members. The U. S. share would be \$3,330,000; Britain's would be \$2,500,000; France's \$2,200,000; Israel's \$1,700,000; and Egypt's \$400,000.

The Soviet Union share would be \$1,528,000. But the whole Red bloc in debates argued the UNEF is illegal and insupportable.

Soviet Russia and seven satellites present were the only ones voting against the measure. Nine countries, including Britain, Egypt and Israel, abstained. Six countries were absent.

The vote was in the 80-nation Budget Committee.

The size of the vote assures a two-thirds majority ratification by the General Assembly. All Assembly members are on the committee.

## Swallowed Bone Returns Speech After 29 Years

HAMILTON, Ont., Dec. 20 (AP)—Mrs. James Brekenridge, dumb for 29 years after a serious operation, swallowed a chicken bone and today is able to speak.

Doctors removing the bone found what they had searched for earlier without success—a displaced vocal chord. Mrs. Brekenridge, who came here from Scotland when she was 17, still speaks with a Scottish accent.

KOOSKIA, Idaho (AP)—The body of Jack Sumpter, 37, Elk City logging contractor, was found Thursday at the edge of the Middle Fork of the Clearwater River, five miles northwest of here.
