SEC Reviewing Crowell-Collier Securities Sale

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—The Securities and Exchange Commission said today it is investigating to determine whether the Crowell-Collier Publishing Co. violated federal law relating to the sale of securities.

It said a public hearing would be held, with the date to be announced soon.

In New York, Paul C. Smith, president and board chairman of Crowell - Collier, said the officer of the publishing company were cooperating in the SEC investigation, and added:

"We are confident the investigation will disclose nothing unfavorable to the company."

Pastor Says Acid Splashed On Vehicle

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Dec. 20 (AP)—A Negro minister said that two men who appeared to be wearing police uniforms apparently splashed acid on his car. A police official said the case was dropped for lack of evidence.

The Rev. B. D. Lambert was one of about 18 Negroes who have reported car paint marred recently by something that left the paint sticky. Others include top leaders in the year-old Negro bus boycott.

Lambert said he heard two motorcycles stop near his auto last night, as he came out his door he saw two men in what he thought looked like police uniforms start away from the car.

Asst. Police Chief H. E. Jackson said he looked at Lambert's car right after the incident was reported. "He had washed it off and there was no evidence of acid," Jackson reported tonight.

"As far as we're concerned, we've dropped that case."

Police Chief Goodwyn J. Ruppenthal said the department could not find anything to back up his complaint. He didn't convince Jackson that it happened, Ruppenthal said Jackson talked to policemen riding motorcycles last night and they said they knew nothing of the incident.

Pen to Ring With Children's Voices At Christmas Time

VANCOUVER, B.C., Dec. 20 (CP)—There will be a Christmas atmosphere in Okalla Prison next week, including the happy ring of children's voices.

Warden Hugh Christie said Wednesday the attorney-general's department had approved an unprecedented move in which the prison will be opened to the families of 106 "specially selected" prisoners.

Date of the visit has not yet been released, but it will be "sometime over the holiday period," said the warden.

All visitors, including about 100 children, will be free to mingle with the convicts in the prison gymnasium.

The gym will be decorated for the occasion and warden Christie said coffee and cakes will contribute to a "party atmosphere."

All prisoners will have turkey, complete with trimmings, on Christmas Day, and entertainment is planned.

10 Refugees Hike Oregon Total to 104

PORTLAND, Dec. 20 (AP)—Ten more Hungarian refugees arrived here today, increasing to 104 the number welcomed by Portland in recent days.

Two of the new arrivals had been border guards under orders to stop persons fleeing from their Communist-dominated country.

The two, who have taken new names, said refugees poured through the woods and across fields in groups of 60, 70 and 80. Instead of halting them, the two guards led them through mine fields along the Austrian border. One day, they themselves walked across the border to freedom.

Still another group of Hungarians, the number unknown, is due here by train tomorrow. It includes one family of five related to Mrs. Bella Kalotay of Portland.

The Oregon Committee for Hungarian Refugees said the new group will be taken care of, although the committee is running short of available money because of the large number of arrivals. The committee pays transportation and food until a sponsor takes over.

Money-raising campaigns for the refugees are continuing.

Access Road Contract Let

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—The Interior Department has approved a \$274,861 contract for construction of 6.8 miles of timber access road in Linn County, Ore., Interior Secretary Seaton announced today.

It went to Funderburk Construction Co., Sutherlin, Ore.

The work will be done on Yellowstone road, a branch leading off the main Quartzville road. It is part of a system which eventually will provide access to 2,700,000 board feet of old-growth timber.

The Bureau of Land Management administers about 45 per cent of the timber and the Agriculture Department's Forest Service another 45 per cent. The rest is privately owned.

Steel Mill Planned

TAIPEI, Formosa, Dec. 20 (AP)—A steel mill with an annual output of 200,000 tons will be built on Formosa with equipment and technical services to be supplied by the Aertna Standard Engineering co. of the United States, the Chinese Nationalist Government has announced. Ore for the mill will be imported from The Philippines.

Bob Hope Takes Family, Troupe to Visit Alaska GIs

BURBANK, Calif., Dec. 20 (AP)—Bob Hope left Wednesday on his annual tour to entertain servicemen at Christmas time. He took his wife and four children with him.

Other entertainers among approximately 180 persons who left aboard three Military Air Transport Service planes for Alaska included actress Ginger Rogers, comedian Jerry Colonna, and orchestra leader Les Brown and about 30 musicians.

Also aboard were singer Peggy King, New York Yankees' baseball star Mickey Mantle; 56 members of the Purdue University Glee Club; the Del Rubio Triplets, a singing group; and last year's Miss Universe, Carol Morris.

Clue Lacking To Canadian Plane's Fate

VANCOUVER (CP)—A single aircraft hunted for three hours Thursday for the Trans-Canada Air Lines plane which disappeared in southwest British Columbia Dec. 9 with 62 persons aboard. It found nothing.

The search craft, a twin-engine RCAF Dakota, poked in and out of clouds hanging over the mountains near Hope, 100 miles east of here, while about 50 airplanes were held to the ground here waiting for the weather to clear.

Finally, the Dakota was forced to return to Vancouver when the clouds became too thick, the air force said.

An RCAF spokesman said a full-scale search will be resumed when the weather clears. Forecast for the general search area was showers Thursday night, cloudy with a few sunny intervals Friday.

All ground parties have returned to Hope and Chilliwack, to the southwest, after being stalled by snow.

'Traffic Hazard' to Stay 'Til Christmas

SPECULATOR, N.Y., Dec. 20 (AP)—State Police asked officials of this Adirondack village to take down a 35-foot community Christmas tree in the village square. It's a traffic hazard, they said.

So what did the Village Board do? It tabled the request until after Dec. 25.

Mayor Gerald Joyce said a Christmas tree had been placed at the same site "as long as I can remember" and it's going to stand.
