## Death Ends Career of Educator

Funeral services for Miss Eleanor Trindle, who died here Thursday, will be held at 3 p.m. Saturday at the Clough-Barrick Chapel.

The Rev. Dr. Brooks Moore of the First Methodist Church will officiate and interment will be at the City View Cemetery.

Well-known in this area as a teacher and home economist, Miss Trindle was a member of the Oregon State College faculty. She had been ill for the past six months.

A graduate of Salem high school, Miss Trindle also attended Willamette University and was graduated from Oregon State College. In 1955 she received her master's degree in education from the Teachers College at Columbia University.

She was a member of the PEO Sisterhood. Survivors include her mother, Mrs. William Trindle, 1965 S. Commercial; one brother, William Trindle, Jr. of North Powder; one sister, Mrs. Helen Reitzler of Portland; three aunts, Mrs. Leone Cookins and Mrs. Mildred Kittelson, both of Salem; and Mrs. Ethel Rucker of San Francisco, and five nephews.

## Youths Admit Bad Checks

Two 16-year-old youths were released in the custody of their parents Thursday after the boys admitted passing bad checks in Salem, according to the Marion County Juvenile Department.

One boy admitted cashing a bad check for \$20 in September and the second confessed to passing a check for \$14. The youths were arrested by the Marion County Sheriff's office Thursday morning.

## Phone Rate Hearing Ends; PUC to Decide on Increase

The hearing on the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co. application for a 7 per cent rate increase ended Thursday. It lasted only three days.

Now it is up to Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel to decide whether to grant all or part of the \$3,200,000 annual increase asked by the company.

Cross examination of company witnesses continued Thursday, followed by an accounting report prepared by C. G. Hieber, Heltzel's chief accountant.

## 46 Cents Maximum

Company witnesses testified that under the proposal, 9 per cent of the customers would get monthly increases of 30 cents a month or less. No residence would be increased more than 40 cents.

Seven per cent of the customers, all business firms, would get increases of \$2 a month or more. R. W. Mason, San Francisco, assistant vice president of the company, testified that the company needs an increase to increase the market position of its securities. This position, he said, has been weakened in the past few years by smaller earnings.

Greater Risks He also said that Telephone Companies, having greater risks, are entitled to higher percentages of profit than electric companies. During a depression, he continued, telephone revenues decline more rapidly than those of other utilities.

"A higher rate of return," Mason said, "permits a company to provide in the long run better and cheaper service to its customers."

## Order Suspends Railway Express Rates Hike Plan

A proposed 4 per cent increase in Railway Express rates within the state of Oregon was suspended Thursday pending a hearing. Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel said.

A similar increase for interstate shipments was granted Thursday by the Interstate Commerce Commission, effective Dec. 27.

The interstate increase was to have been effective Dec. 27, but the suspension order prevents them from going into effect at that time. Date of the PUC hearing has not been set.

## County Board Hears Report On Diseases

Births, deaths and communicable disease showed no unusual trend during November, a report to the Marion County Board of Health revealed Thursday.

Board members reviewed November statistics at their regular monthly meeting. Approximately 60 per cent of county school children have been immunized for polio and a somewhat higher percentage for diphtheria and tetanus, a survey of school records disclosed.

Mrs. Bernice Yeary, director of the nurses department, presented the survey of this fall's first grade students and freshmen entering high school.

Sanitarian I. G. Lerman was appointed as authorized purchasing agent of war surplus goods for the county department. The board also acknowledged the service of workers in presenting the department's open house last month.
