

Violent Quake Series Recorded in Aleutians

BERKELEY, Calif., Jan. 1 (U)—Don Tocher, University of California seismologist, reported tonight that a series of severe earth shocks, apparently about 2,500 miles northwest of Berkeley, had been registered the afternoon and evening on the university seismograph.

Tocher said the shocks ran up as high as 7.4 on the Richter magnitude scale and the directional indication was that they

would have centered somewhere in the Aleutian Island Chain extending west from southern Alaska.

The first of the shocks was recorded beginning at 4:46 p.m. with the second at 6:34 p.m. and the third at 7:24 p.m. Since then, Tocher said, after shocks which had traveled around the world had been recorded faintly all evening.

The 7.5 Richter magnitude was about that of the famous earthquake which resulted in the burning of San Francisco in 1906 and was as heavy as anything recorded during the last year, Tocher said.

Because of the location of the quake, he added that he understood that the Honolulu tidal wave warning system had been alerted to the shock.

Riot Ushers New Year In Oakland

OAKLAND, Calif., Jan. 1 (U)—Oakland ushered in the New Year with a big downtown riot by 1,200 celebrants.

Two reserve police officers were roughed up.

Thirty-three Negroes were arrested in the free for all brawl along four blocks of Broadway from 9th to 13th streets.

The disorder began shortly after midnight—for no apparent reason. Knives and tire irons were wielded. Milton Duarte, 39, and William Cara, 32, reserve policemen, were knocked down. Duarte suffered minor cuts and bruises. Cara's back was injured.

Tooting Horns
The merry-makers had been tooting horns, clanging bells and throwing confetti when the trouble started in front of the Broadway Theater.

About 50 youths became involved in a fight which spread rapidly.

Police began making mass arrests. One patrol wagon was filled with youths, who then smashed its windows and damaged the interior.

Rioters Arrested
More rioters were arrested and hustled into police cars. This seemed to put a damper on the outbreak, which ended after 45 minutes.

Ten of the juveniles were released to custody of their parents.

Two 15-year-old boys were charged with disturbing the peace and turned over to juvenile authorities.

The 21 adults were charged with being drunk.

Head of Soviet Atom Energy Project Dies

LONDON, Jan. 1 (U)—Avrami Pavlovich Zavenyagin, Soviet deputy premier who headed Russia's atomic energy industry, died yesterday, Moscow radio announced tonight. He was 55.

Zavenyagin was a member of the Communist party's Central Committee and a "hero of Socialist labor."

The Moscow broadcast did not give the cause of death.

When Zavenyagin was named head of the Medium Machine Building Ministry students of the Soviet Union's political structure recalled that he had once been a deputy of Lavrenty Beria, executed former secret police chief.

They described Zavenyagin as a top expert on the use of slave labor in Siberia.

Snake Dam Work to Start

BAKER, Jan. 1 (U)—Workers will begin actual construction work tomorrow on Idaho Power Co.'s Brownlee Dam on the Snake River.

Preparatory work on the dam foundation has been underway for some time.

Tomorrow the crews, using heavy earth-moving equipment, will begin placing 3,000 to 4,000 cubic yards of clay per day which will serve as the core for the 63 million dollar dam. The crews will work in three shifts around the clock.

12-Year Plan Revealed

HONG KONG, Jan. 1 (U)—Communist China has "laid an ambitious scientific research and development program for the next 12 years. Radio Peiping reported, the program will range from ending primitive farming methods to peaceful uses of atomic energy.

Year's Traffic Toll 3,772 In California

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Jan. 1 (U)—A record death toll of at least 3,772 on California's labyrinth of highways was tallied in 1956, arousing the wrath of Gov. Goodwin J. Knight who said he would seek reforms to curb the motoring massacre.

The figure of 3,772—still tentative—was announced today by the "highway patrol." It exceeded by 108 the record set in 1946.

Gov. Knight, as the old record fell at Christmas time, said he was so alarmed he would ask the Legislature, convening next Monday, to fix a new speed limit and higher penalties for speeding violations. He also will plug for more highway patrolmen.

Rail Crash Fatal to 3 Crewmen

MARTINSBURG, W. Va., Jan. 1 (U)—Three crewmen were killed and five others injured today when two long freight trains of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad collided head-on after a last minute effort to warn them failed.

B&O headquarters in Baltimore said a dispatcher at Cumberland, Md., learned only minutes before the crash, near West Cumber, that the trains were speeding toward each other on the same track.

The dispatcher frantically called railroad men living in this area in hope they would be able to stop the trains before they met.

Killed were engineer B. F. Phillips, 38, Lovettsville, Va.; fireman L. R. Holler, 31, Hagerstown, Md.; and brakeman J. C. Beard, 59, Brunswick, Md., all of whom were riding in the diesel engine of the eastbound train.

The railroad said the trains were eastbound No. 96, headed for Baltimore with 145 cars, and westbound No. 648, which had 160 empty coal cars.

The wreck came on a track used exclusively by freight. The railroad spokesman said the eastbound train had the right-of-way on the nine-mile-long line and an investigation is under way to determine why the westbound train was allowed to pass onto the track.

Critically Injured
Critically hurt was James Duval, Cumberland, a crewman on the westbound freight. The other four crewmen injured were identified as S. J. Thomas, Moorefield, W. Va.; Lawrence Lowery, Cumberland, and Perry E. Foltz, Knoxville, Tenn., all aboard the westbound train, and J. G. Murr, Cumberland, who was on the eastbound train.

Radical Irish Party Army Fights Police

BROOKBOROUGH, Northern Ireland, Jan. 1 (U)—Irish Republican Army raiders attacked a police barracks near here for 10 minutes tonight with Sten guns and hand grenades, police reported.

None of the six constables inside the building was injured. Police said two attackers were fatally wounded and that their bodies were found later about six miles from the barracks.

The IRA is an outlawed organization demanding that Northern Ireland be joined with the Republic of Ireland. IRA is blamed for nearly a dozen shootings and bombings along the border in the past month.

The Irish Republic had disclaimed any connection with the IRA and has sent troops north to help guard the border.
