Kansas Tips Sooner '5'

NORMAN, Okla., Jan. 7 (AP)—The University of Oklahoma basketball team gave the unbeaten Kansas Jayhawks their biggest scare since a one-point victory over Iowa State Dec. 27, but finally bowed to the nation's top ranked college basketball team, 59-51, tonight in a Big Seven contest.

Big Wilt Chamberlain took scoring honors with 22 points but was tightly guarded by Joe King who tallied 20 points along with teammate Don Schwall.

The victory the Jayhawks' 11th, pushed Kansas into the conference lead. The Sooners have a 1-1 league mark and a 4-6 over-all record.

Oklahoma was cold at the beginning of the game and at the start of the second half. The Sooners could not score the first five minutes of the game and went pointless the first four of the second stanza.

Chamberlain, 7 foot sophomore, played the entire game and dunked seven field goals and 8 of his 9 gratis shots. He was out-rebounded by Schwall, 14 to 11. As a team, the Oklahomaans got 34 rebounds to the Jayhawks' 32.

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 7 (AP)—Middleweight Champion Gene Fullmer came home for a delayed Christmas tonight—and said it was a bigger thrill than battering the crown from Sugar Ray Robinson last week in New York.

"The biggest thrill of my life," the Mormon cyclone told a frenzied, cheering crowd which jammed Salt Lake City's Main St. at his official welcome.

"But after this greeting, winning the title will take second place."

Fullmer, accompanied by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Fullmer, his brother Jay, and his manager, Marv Jensen, and Mrs. Jensen, landed at the Salt Lake airport. He was greeted by a crowd estimated by police at 3,500, many of whom had stood shivering when then an hour in 27 degree weather.

A parade took him to the city business district, where he was presented the keys to the city before a crowd estimated at 6,000.

Following the opener at Portland, the Wolves again go on the road this weekend for games at Ashland with the Southern Oregon quint. The following weekend finds the Livingston squad here at home for a pair with Eastern Oregon.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 7 (AP)—William (Red) Holzman said today he has resigned as coach of the St. Louis Hawks "by mutual agreement with Ben Kerner," owner of the National Basketball Assn. Club.

The Hawks are in a four-game losing streak and third in the NBA's four-team Western Division with a record of 14 victories and 19 defeats, after being rated one of the NBA's top clubs before the season.

Kerner has made no secret of his displeasure with Holzman's handling of the club.

Kansas Leads Poll; UCLA 8, Seattle 9

NEW YORK, Jan. 7 (AP)—Kansas and North Carolina continued their domination of the Associated Press' college basketball rankings today, with the two unbeaten powers combining to head all but nine of 83 ballots cast by sportswriters and sportscasters participating in the fifth weekly poll.

Wilt Chamberlain and the Jayhawks, rated first in pre-season estimates and No. 1 in each accounting since, drew 45 first place votes and 732 points on the usual basis of 10 points for first, 9 for second, 8 for third, etc.

North Carolina again held the runnerup position, topping 29 ballots and winding up with 684 points.

Kentucky Holds Third
Kansas made Missouri its 10th consecutive victim Saturday. North Carolina, idle last week, has won 11 in a row.

Kentucky, twice-beaten but always powerful, held third place followed by Southern Methodist, Louisville, Vanderbilt, Iowa State, UCLA, Seattle and Illinois. Seattle climbed from 10th. UCLA was also eighth last week.

Although the makeup of the top 10 remains the same, the alignment shifted as a result of Illinois' 91-88 loss to Minnesota Saturday. The Illini dropped from fifth to 10th with the others moving up or holding fast. Biggest advance was from ninth to sixth for Vanderbilt, (Cont. on page 10, col. 1)

Satterfield To Seek KO

PORTLAND, Jan. 7 (AP)—Chicago heavyweight Bob Satterfield will be seeking his 34th knockout in 67 fights when he climbs into the ring here tomorrow night for a scheduled 10-round bout with Dale Hall of Los Angeles.

Both fighters tapered off their training yesterday — Satterfield with two miles of light roadwork and Hall with a brief gym workout.

Other fights on the program pit Andy Jurgens of Winnipeg, and Ted Poole, Satterfield's sparring partner, in one six rounder, and Tommy Thomas and Dave Gottschalk, both Portland, in the other.

His resignation was announced by Dr. Richard A. Harvill, university president, who said he will start immediately to seek a successor. Harvill said Woodson will continue as a physical education instructor.

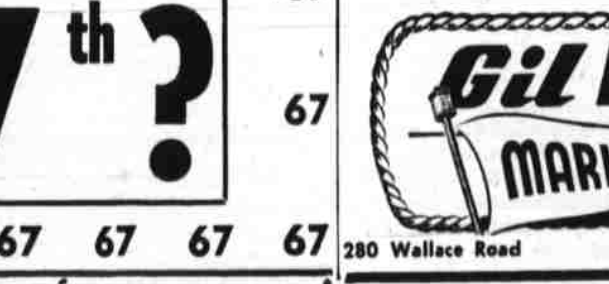

Stanford, Cal Irked

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7 (AP)—Oil poured on troubled Pacific Coast Conference athletic waters has caught fire.

Reports of possible bolts from the conference, which heretofore have centered on UCLA and the University of Southern California, were heard today at Stanford and the University of California.

UCLA and USC, hardest hit last summer by penalties for illegal aid to athletes, had urged more liberal help for football players and students participating in other varsity sports. Last Friday the conference adopted in principle a new code for financial assistance. Called Professional.

After passing by a 7-2 vote with Stanford and Oregon against it, the new aid proposal hit stormy going immediately. Channing Clark Kerr of the University of California termed it a step toward professionalism, although it falls far short of the "free rides" provided in some major conferences.

Today President Robert Gordon Sproul of California, whose authority extends over both the Berkeley and UCLA campuses, indicated he favors a plan of special (Cont. page 10, col. 2)

Scouts Given College Slap

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 7 (AP)—College baseball coaches struck back angrily at professional ball today in an effort to retaliate for the elimination of the major league college rule.

Stirred by the sudden ending of a protective rule for which they had worked eleven years, the executive committee of the American Association of College Baseball Coaches recommended a ban against professional scouts contacting players on college campuses. The coaches said in effect that they proposed to end all courtesies which have been shown to scouts in the past and to make it as tough as possible for them to get in touch with college players.

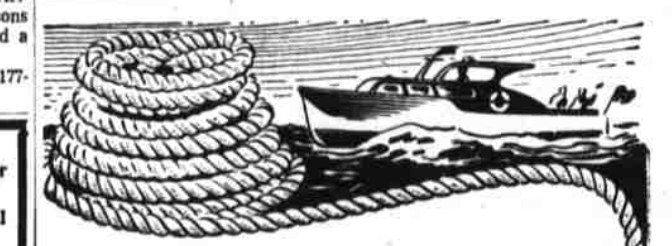
