

North Salem Music Wing Delayed by Heating Line

(Story on Page 1.)

An unexpected underground heating line has caused a bottleneck in construction of the new music wing at North Salem High School, the Salem School Board learned Thursday night.

School Supt. Charles Schmidt said Architect Ernest Weber told him that excavating unearthed the line directly where supports for an outside wall were to go in.

Weber said original plans for the high school, which he studied prior to drawing up blueprints, failed to show the steam line. Weber told Schmidt the only alternative was bridge supports spanning the line at an added cost of about \$2,500. The board approved the added figure.

Property Study

The board took under study a communication from the West Salem Lions Club regarding possible purchase of school property on 8th Street adjacent to the former West Salem Junior High. The property, which the Lions said they wanted for Boy Scout purposes, currently contains a residence.

No action will be taken on the matter until the board inspects the property.

Action was delayed on a request for pay raises for mechanics helping in the district's transportation division. Employees in that classification want wages equivalent to starting custodians' pay. Schmidt and the board agreed that no action on this probably could be taken until preparation for the next budget.

Other Business

Approved were the following items: An additional \$157 yearly custodial pay at Liberty School; a figure of \$150 above the budget figure for blacktopping at Salem Heights School; \$227 above budget for blacktopping at Liberty School; \$133 above budget for tiling of a classroom ceiling at Richmond School.

Teacher assignments approved included: Mrs. Jean Coleman, Independence; as a replacement in the 5th grade at Liberty School starting Jan. 14, and Mrs. Coralie Rhoten, first new teacher to be hired for next year.

The following were approved as instructors for this term's adult and vocational adult education program: David F. Bates, spherical trigonometry; June H. Brown, shorthand; Chester Goodman, general social studies; Howard A. Grumms, drafting; Herbert C. Harold, radio amateur theory and code; John Medcalf, art; John Paulus, income taxes; Roger Ritchey, photography; Robert Wiper, medical office personnel; Gail Herbst, optical technician.

Pardon Denied Widow Accused Of Killing Mate

OLYMPIA, Jan. 10 (AP) — Gov. Langlie denied a pardon today to Mrs. Vilet Marie Sill, 37, serving a prison term for the 1954 shotgun slaying of her husband, Marion, a Seattle tavern operator.

The governor said he had completed an extensive and thorough study of the record in the case before reaching his decision.

He said there did not appear to be sufficient, creditable evidence to warrant any change in the verdict of the King County jury which found her guilty of manslaughter.

"I have studied this case in great detail, carefully reviewed the Parole Board's report which recommended against clemency, examined the exhibits presented to the jury, talked with witnesses who testified at the trial, listened to the recordings of Mrs. Sill, made while she was under the influence of sodium amytal, conferred with members of the families of both Mr. and Mrs. Sill and talked to ballistic and other technical witnesses on both sides of the case," Langlie said in a statement handed newsmen.

Mrs. Sill is serving a five-year minimum sentence in the State Penitentiary at Walla Walla.

A petition for a pardon was sent to the governor early last month by Mrs. Sill's attorney. It was approved by a former head of the Board of State Prison Terms and Paroles. The trial judge also said the new evidence raised doubts which warranted a new study of the case.

The pardon petition was based on an account of the shooting given by Mrs. Sill while under the influence of the so-called "truth serum."

The account contradicted her confession entered as evidence at her trial. It was to the effect that her husband shot and wounded her twice and then, when they grappled, the weapon was discharged again, the shot hitting him in the face and killing him.

Her confession, her attorney, David Weyer, said, was the result of a guilt complex and amnesia.

Portland Bridge Hues May Guide Tourist Traffic

PORTLAND, Jan. 10 (AP) — The Portland Chamber of Commerce wants the eight Willamette River bridges here painted different colors as an aid to giving tourists directions.

The proposal was relayed to Multnomah County commissioners by roadmaster Paul C. Northrop. The commissioners told him to think the project over and report again.

'Sadist' Books Result in Fine

PARIS, Jan. 10 (AP) — A Paris publisher was fined today for putting on sale the works of Marquis de Sade.

The Paris publisher, Jean Jacques Pauvert, was charged with an "outrage to morality" for offering the public Sade's unpublished 18th Century works. He was fined 200,000 francs and magistrates ordered that all the books in question be destroyed. It was from Marquis' name that the word sadism—love of cruelty—came.

Pauvert claimed he had intended the editions only for "specialists" or scientists interested in psychotherapy. The tribunal said it could not agree since Pauvert advertised the books in daily newspapers.

Wind Jars Baltimore

British Paper Says Ike to Invite Queen

LONDON, Jan. 10 (AP) — The Daily Mirror said tonight President Eisenhower will soon invite Queen Elizabeth II to America for a state visit in October.

The newspaper said the reason for the visit will be in celebration of the 350th anniversary of the founding of the first British colony in North America — Jamestown, Va.

"Discussions between the White House and Buckingham Palace on the visit have been taking place for some weeks," the Mirror said. "The official invitation will be handed to the Queen when Mr. Winthrop Aldrich, the retiring American ambassador, takes leave of her at the end of the month."

There was no official confirmation of the report.

Tear Gas Riot Breaks Up Talk by Mendes-France

PARIS, Jan. 10 (AP) — A political rally which former Premier Pierre Mendes-France was to address ended in tumult tonight when tear gas grenades were showered at the speaker's rostrum.

The meeting, in the huge Sports Palace, was on behalf of a Radical Socialist—left of center—candidate in a Paris district parliamentary by-election next Sunday, about 5,000 persons were in the building.

The former Premier had been expected to assail the policies of Socialist Premier Guy Mollet.

It was not immediately known who threw the tear gas bombs. Some blamed Communists. Others blamed the followers of Pierre Poujade, right-wing anti-taxation leader.

Scores of helmeted riot police surrounded the rostrum to protect Mendes-France and other notables. Fights still raged in the audience.

The former Premier signaled the end of the meeting by asking everyone to join him singing "La Marseillaise."

Authorities said that the damage to the hall probably would total several million francs.
