

Inaugural Ball Monday Will Be Stellar Event of Winter Social Season

Brilliant social event of the winter season in Oregon's capital city will be the inaugural ball Monday night honoring Governor-elect and Mrs. Robert D. Holmes. The stellar event will follow the inauguration of the governor and the informal reception in the governor's suite Monday afternoon. The ball will officially begin a series of social events planned for Oregon's new state officials, legislators and their wives, who are arriving in the capital this weekend for the opening of the 49th biennial legislature Monday morning.

Dancing in Armory and Marion Hotel

The ball will be held in the Salem Armory, which will be elaborately decorated for the occasion, and in the Gold and Green Rooms of the Marion Hotel. There will be a covered canopy between the hotel and armory. Dancing will begin at 9 o'clock with Bill DeSouza and his orchestra playing in the armory and Lyle Glazier's orchestra in the Gold Room.

Shortly after 10 o'clock the state officials and their wives will be formally presented to the hundreds of guests, many coming from all parts of the state. Maurice Engleman of Portland will serve as master of ceremonies.

Elaborate Blue and Gold Decor Planned

The state of Oregon colors, blue and gold, and the Oregon seal will be featured in the elaborate decor. The entire armory will be draped in blue bunting with four large seals, encircled with golden boughs, the focal point of the decor. Blue and gold will also be used in decorating the reception tables.

The ball is being sponsored by the Democratic party of Oregon and will be the first inaugural ball since 1939, when one was held in honor of Governor and Mrs. Charles A. Sprague. This will be Oregon's fourth inaugural ball, with the first held 70 years ago for Governor Sylvester Penney and the second for Governor and Mrs. Julius L. Meier.

Mrs. Norman Nemer of Portland who is heading the general committee for the ball, announces that dress will be optional, with tuxedos and business suits for the men and long and short formal for the women. A few tickets are still available and may be obtained at the Marion Hotel.
