

Salem Couple Specializes In Wilderness Camp Trips

Wilderness camping is a specialty as well as a hobby with Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Hiatt, 1280 N. 21st St.

The Hiatts, who spend much of their spare time exploring the wilderness areas of Oregon and surrounding states, are scheduled to begin teaching wilderness camping classes at 8 p.m. Tuesday at the Salem YMCA as part of the adult winter program.

Concentrating on the family recreation theme, the Hiatts' classes will feature a new twist in camping techniques, according to Hiatt.

Wilderness camping, says Hiatt, is a recreation which can be undertaken by small families, large families or individuals.

One of Many Highlights

How to assemble and arrange your gear so that everything you need for long or short excursions can be carried on your back will be one of the many highlights considered in the class, Hiatt said.

The Hiatts, who never carry firearms on a camping trip, will also explain and illustrate survival techniques, where to go on trips, what to wear and what to carry in the way of foods, sleeping equipment and medicines.

Mrs. Hiatt, who explains the woman's viewpoint, will take over the instruction on food preparation and explain dehydration processes.

For their class on where to go, the Hiatts will show three-dimensional movies of scenic Oregon spots they have photographed on various camping trips. Some instruction, said Hiatt, will also be given in photography and on mineralogy and flowers that campers will find of interest when on an excursion.

Due Once Per Week

The classes will be conducted once a week for three weeks with an overnight outing after the last session, Hiatt said.

Closely following the wilderness camping classes will be courses in mountaineering and popular mineralogy.

Mountaineering classes start Feb. 5 under the direction of Bob Kuehnel of the Chemeketa. Kuehnel will explain use of equipment, safety measures, climbing techniques and show special training movies, according to Carl Greider, adult program director of the Salem YM.

The courses will be followed in the spring with one or two field trips. Greider added.

Popular Mineralogy

Popular mineralogy will be taught by Professor Harold Jory of Willamette University with classes beginning on Feb. 13.

Professor Jory will cover the collection and identification of minerals, classification and illustration of the geology of the Willamette valley and discussion on the earth sciences and rock polishing, according to information received. Also included will be a

field trip and visit with a local rock polisher, Jory said.

The professor made special mention that many hobbies for the family can be developed from the popular mineralogy courses. For example, as he put it, "popular mineralogy will even fit in with dad's fishing trip because the non-fishing members of the family will have an opportunity to explore while dad waits for a nibble."

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Reich Youths In Pen 'for Aiding West'

BERLIN, Jan. 12 (AP) — A Communist East German district court at Dresden today convicted four East-German teenagers of serving Western intelligence, the Communist East German news agency ADN reported.

The four, age 17 to 19, were sentenced to prison terms ranging from 18 months to five years and five months.

ADN said the defendants were found guilty of having informed Western intelligence services of the locations of railway bridges in Eastern Germany. They also had "fascist" newspapers in their possession which they allegedly used to produce anti-Communist pamphlets.

Briton Sees Mistrust of Dulles in U.S.

LONDON, Jan. 12 (AP) — Herbert Morrison, longtime Laborite foreign secretary, said Friday that during a recent trip in the United States he found Secretary of State John Foster Dulles was "not overpopular or widely trusted."

Morrison was once in line for Labor party leadership. But he lost to Hugh Gaitskill and no longer holds a prominent post in the party. He and Mrs. Morrison returned last month from a tour of America.

MADRAS, Ore., Jan. 12 (AP) — The Jefferson Plywood Co. mill will be reopened Jan. 28 and jobs will be available for 150 men.

Officials of the plant, which was closed Nov. 19, said preference in hiring would be given to former employees.

Home Building Slump Continues

PORTLAND, Jan. 12 (AP) — The West's housing construction slump continued in December, the trade journal Western Building said Friday.

Housing permits dropped 10 per cent, the magazine said, but dollar valuation went up to \$262,733,336. The December, 1955, figure was \$234,411,263.

Bill May Cut Starlings

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12 (AP) — A bill that would lift the ban on killing starlings in the District of Columbia has been introduced in Congress by Rep. Hyde (R-Md.) and Sen. Beall (R-Md.).

Starlings are only part of the bill but open season on them would make life easier for Washington officials who have tried every gimmick they can think of to chase the winter visitors from downtown trees and buildings.

Student Hearing Due

HILLSBORO, Jan. 12 (AP) — Hearings will begin here Monday to determine where to send Verboort High School students next year. The district voted 58-33 to dissolve the school because of a sharp enrollment drop.

Hungary Refugees Tussle, Say Jews Favored for U.S.

SALZBURG, Austria, Jan. 12 (AP) — A group of Hungarian refugees touched off fighting in a camp near here today by shouting that Jewish refugees were preferred for immigration to the United States.

Police said the shouts led to exchanges of insults among the refugees. Fist fights broke out among several hundred Hungarians. Police reinforcements restored order after several Hungarians were injured.

Macmillan's Cabinet Has Eden Vets

LONDON, Jan. 12 (AP) — It looked tonight as if Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's new Cabinet will be largely a regrouping of the veterans of the Eden regime—the old model with a new paint job.

The list of callers and unofficial reports indicated Macmillan is concentrating more on shifting ministers who served with him under Sir Anthony Eden than on finding new men for Britain's top political jobs.

No official announcement is expected until late tomorrow on how he is matching men and ministries for the troubles that lie ahead.
