

Khrushchev Denies Attack on Stalinists

MOSCOW, Jan. 17 (AP)—Communist party boss Nikita Khrushchev tonight praised Stalin as a model Communist in his fight for the workers.

Nearly a year ago Khrushchev denounced the late dictator as a mass murderer, assailed "the cult of the individual," and questioned Stalin's communism.

Roars of approval by the audience and wild applause by visiting Chinese Premier Chou En-lai greeted Khrushchev's statement at a reception given by Chou for Kremlin leaders.

New Method May Detect Heart Ailment

DAYTON, Ohio, Jan. 17 (AP)—A possible method of detecting heart disease before a patient is stricken with an attack was outlined today by a Dayton physician. The method involves a new way of evaluating five standard physical tests.

Dr. G. Douglas Talbot of Dayton, described the system in a paper read before the Ohio regional meeting of the American College of Physicians and Surgeons.

Dr. Talbot said the method was developed over a period of three years but said it was still in the preliminary and experimental stages.

"It is not to be taken as the final word on coronary-heart-cases," he added.

The new diagnostic method uses five standard physical tests which are evaluated percentage-wise into what Dr. Talbot calls a "coronary profile." These are: a determination of the amount of fat in the blood, cardiograms—electrical tracings of the heart action—both at rest and under stress, an examination of the blood vessels at the back of the eyes and in the lower extremities, X-ray examination of the heart and of the large blood vessels and a study of the medical history of the patient. A high fat count and constricted blood vessels at the back of the eyes are considered danger signals.

Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin. With Soviet brandy and Chinese wine flowing freely in toasts of friendship and mutual praise, the red-faced, ebullient Khrushchev grabbed a microphone to make a speech that began:

"I don't need to say that I'm a Communist."

Bulganin interrupted:

"But some people say you are not a Stalinist."

"I am a Stalinist," Khrushchev whipped back, "but I don't separate Stalinism and Stalin from communism. As a Communist fighting for the interest of the working class, Stalin was a model Communist."

Still Critical

"We have criticized Stalin, we still criticize Stalin as a bad Communist as far as the interests of the working classes are concerned."

Stalin had his bad points, Lenin saw them before we did and pointed them out. They were borne out. The defects were bad. "But in the things that counted, that is the interests of the working class. God grant that every Communist should fight for the interest of the working class as Stalin did."

The audience roared approval again. It included foreign diplomats who have recognized Red China. Western correspondents were present.

More Playful

The Soviet party and government leaders looked more cheerful and acted more playful than at any other time in public since the Hungarian revolution three months ago.

Soviet ex-Premier Georgi Malenkov, who had been a Stalin secretary and is regarded now as one of the moderating influences in the Kremlin, stood by silent and unsmiling as Khrushchev wildly waved his arms and the party members exploded laughter and applause.

It was the second time Khrushchev defended Stalin in less than a month.

He spoke up for Stalin and Stalinism at a Kremlin banquet New Year's Eve, starting his listeners but setting what is obviously a new Kremlin policy toward the late dictator.

Helser Firm Action Under SEC Attack

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 17 (AP)—A government attorney labeled as "misleading" and "unrealistic" the formula by which J. Henry Helser & Co., Portland investment managing firm, computes its monthly checks to clients who derive income in that manner.

Frank E. Kennamer Jr., Securities and Exchange Commission attorney, argued before Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman that the company had not complied with a court order to change its procedures. The SEC says the company is not complying with requirements of the investment advisers act.

Judge Goodman said the only question at issue is whether the company's brochure, which it submits to prospective clients is misleading.

Clients Notified

A company witness testified that an estimated 100 of the company's 4,300 clients had been notified that their monthly checks are coming out of the principal of the funds which they had deposited with the firm for investment.

Kennamer said that in some cases fees charged by the company for its services equal the dividend the clients received and therefore any monthly check based on dividend income is "misleading."

Judge Goodman pointed out that Congress, in making laws, gave the company sole right to control the fees charged.

"If I were making the laws, I would prohibit" a situation where a man gets his principal back in a monthly check, Goodman said.

"Anyone who goes into a deal like that on the strength of the fact he gets a monthly check ought to have his head examined," the judge added.

Kennamer said that for the year 1955 the Helser management collected \$2,067,500 in management fees while dividends and interest on stock and bonds held by the company's clients totaled \$2,061,377.

No Violation

Frank E. Burns, attorney for Helser, said the fee figure quoted by Kennamer reflected also the first quarters of 1956. Burns said it didn't show any violation of the court order of November, 1955, directing the company to change its fee set-up.

"There was a net capital gain of over 5 million dollars for that period," Burns said.

Kennamer told the judge the SEC had been in court three times in the Helser case and that he believed as a result of what he termed SEC showings of the company's non-compliance with the court's order an injunction should be issued.

Byrd Claims Budget to Cut Dollar Value

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (AP)—Sen. Byrd (D-Va.) said today inflation has cut the American dollar in half since 1940 and President Eisenhower's budget would make it worth even less.

This budget, which will lead to still further inflation and communism, our government to new avenues of spending, must be substantially reduced to preserve our solvency," Byrd said.

Byrd, the outstanding spokesman for economy in Congress, quoted the Republican Secretary of the Treasury, George M. Humphrey, to support his call for cuts in Eisenhower's plan to spend \$71,807,000,000 in the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Three subcommittees of the House Appropriations Committee began work today on parts of the budget, with expressions of hope they can trim substantial amounts.

Bankruptcy Data Requested on Salem Building

PORTLAND, Jan. 17 (AP)—Estes Snedecor, referee for bankruptcy here, has called for more information on a mortgage of a West Salem building.

The building was the property of the bankrupt National Plywood Cooperative. A number of persons associated with this firm are under federal indictment, accused of fraudulent sales of shares in the cooperative.

It developed earlier in the hearing that the mortgage is security for a \$4,200 note held by Edgar Robert Erron, one of those under indictment.

Ex-Minister at Silverton Takes Post in Alaska

SILVERTON, Jan. 17 (AP)—The Rev. M. J. K. Fuhr, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church here for 14 years, until six years ago when he resigned to accept a call near Seattle, Alaska, according to word received here late today.

The Rev. Mr. Fuhr is now serving as assistant pastor at Phinney Ridge church, Seattle. He plans to leave for his new call within a month.

Confederate Army Veteran Has 109th Birthday Today

DEFUNIAK SPRINGS, Fla., Jan. 17 (AP)—William A. (Uncle Bill) Lundy, one of three living Civil War veterans, celebrates his 109th birthday anniversary tomorrow.

A party in his honor will be held in the Walton High School gymnasium and carried by several radio stations. The party will be limited to a half-hour so as not to tire Uncle Bill.

Approximately 1,000 persons are expected. Two pretty high school students, Judy Hinton and Karen Hinson, will present gifts to Lundy.

Uncle Bill can still read without glasses and eat rather heartily, especially such rebel dishes as greens, fresh pork and corn pone. Lundy, youngest of the three survivors of the Southern army, is growing feeble. "I used to have a big time and get around but I don't do no more rambling," he said.

Lundy was a member of the home guard at Elba, Ala., in the closing days of the war. He did not see action.

Lundy lives with his oldest son, Charles, in nearby Crestview. He has more than 200 direct descendants.

The other two living Civil War veterans, both from the Confederate side, are John Salling, Slant, Va., and Walter W. Williams, Franklin, Tex.

The last veteran from the Union Armies, Albert Woolson of Duluth, Minn., died last summer.

Red Hungary Executes Two Rebel Chiefs

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Budapest radio disclosed the executions of Istvan Varga and Jozsef Pinter as anti-Communist rebels, and said two others sentenced to death had been let off with life terms. Thus far 24 persons have been executed for "counterrevolutionary" activity under martial law provisions of the Soviet-supported Kadar regime.

The two Western reporters expelled were Michael Weigall, 27, of Reuters, and Raimund Horhager, 46, of the Suddeutsche Zeitung in Munich. John MacCormac of the New York Times was ordered out of the country yesterday, but said he was leaving anyway because his visa had not been renewed.

The election was held at the closing session of the organization's annual meeting.

2nd Suit Filed to Determine M&F Bomb Reward

PORTLAND, Jan. 17 (AP)—Another suit went into court Wednesday to decide who should get the reward for arrest and conviction of the man who bombed the Meier & Frank department store in 1955.

William Clarence Peddicord, a blind chemist, was convicted of the bombing in an extortion plot. He is serving a 20-year sentence at the state prison.

Five Portland banks, who put up \$3,000 reward, filed the suit, asking the court to determine who should get the money. Earlier, Meier & Frank asked the court to determine who should get a \$25,000 reward it had offered.

The banks' suit said the claimants are William D. Browne, James C. Quinn and B. Prescott Hutchins of the Portland police; Roland A. Severston and Stanley N. Smoot, postal inspectors; Leonard Hooker, Gladstone; Jack DeMent, laborator operator; and William D. Rogers, Portland.

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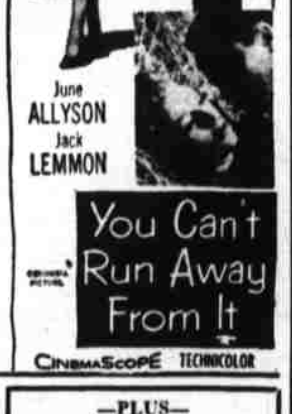
