The Luther Gulick Awards were given to Mrs. Fred Shideler of Corvallis, for her 15 years' work in all phases of Camp Fire Girls activity; and to Mrs. Hollis Smith, for 10 years service in the Camp Fire Girls' cause.

Secretary of State Mark Hatfield spoke on "Together We Make Tomorrow," in which he praised the existing educational opportunities afforded by the state of Oregon as among the finest in America.

Coy and two passengers in the car were taken to Salem General Hospital, where attendants indicated none suffered serious hurts. Coy reportedly had abrasions and bruises; Frieda Johnson, 72, 425 N. Winter St., suffered a sprained ankle and facial cuts; and Sandra Johnson, about 16, 1490 N. 16th St., had lip and tongue lacerations and leg abrasions.

Pakistan Coal Found

Dacca, East Pakistan, Jan. 21 (AP)—Government geologists have discovered East Pakistan's first coal field, a 200 square mile area in the Faidpur District. Lack of coal has hampered industry and communications in Pakistan's territories.

Polish Voters Pay Tribute To Gomulka
Warsaw, Poland, Jan. 21 (AP)—Wladyslaw Gomulka counted up a tremendous personal vote today in general elections that already have stoutly endorsed his policy of independent communism for Poland.

The Communist party boss who rose to power on a program of greater independence from Moscow got 99.4 per cent of the votes cast in his constituency, Warsaw's No. 3 district.

Warsaw radio heard in London said other leaders elected included Premier Josef Cyrankiewicz, President Alexander Zawadzki, and Edward Ochab, minister of agriculture who was Gomulka's predecessor as Communist party chief.

Sunday's parliamentary election was the first popular test for Gomulka and his followers since he took over as Communist party first secretary in October on a wave of anti-Soviet sentiment.

Warsaw radio said unofficial reports showed all the principal leaders of the Polish United Workers-Communist party, the United Farmers party and the Democratic party were elected "by an overwhelming majority."

So far as is known, no top candidates of the three parties in the popular front failed of election. But some had narrow escapes.

Flash Lights Northern Sky

FOUR CORNERS, Jan. 21 (AP)—A "meteor" and its explosion seen from Four Corners this evening was apparently the same "tremendous blue flash in the sky" which reportedly rattled windows in Yakima, Wash.

Reported seen in this area about 6:30 p.m. by Mr. and Mrs. William N. Swain, 960 Meadowlawn Dr., and by two unidentified persons who called the Weather Bureau station at McNary Field. It was still unexplained late tonight, according to Associated Press.

Swain described it as "the biggest meteor I have ever seen," silver blue in color. He said it exploded behind clouds to the north-east.

Believed to be either a meteor or sheet lightning, it was also reported seen from the Pasco, Wash., area and by two airline pilots near Ellensburg, Wash., AP said.

Death of Former Salem Man Told

Word was received here Monday of the recent death in California of Richard Orval Resident, believed to be a former Salem resident.

The body was due to arrive in Salem at 7:02 a.m. today from the McDonalds Funeral Home in Weaverville, Calif. The Golden Mortuary will announce funeral arrangements later.

Details of the death were not immediately available.

Woman Drowns as Car Hits River

WHITE SALMON, Wash., Jan. 21 (AP)—Mrs. Donald E. Butler of Camas, Wash., drowned today when a car in which she was riding plunged off Highway 8-D into the White Salmon River.

Two other persons in the car swam to safety.

They were Mrs. Butler's husband and her 15-year-old son, George W. Blong, also of Camas. They suffered only exposure.

Volunteer firemen from here pulled the car from the river. Mrs. Butler's body was inside the vehicle. The 42-year-old woman had a cast on her arm and shoulder.

Gunmen Captured By Angry Crowd
NEWARK, England, Jan. 21 (AP)—A policeman and an angry crowd captured a marauding pair of escaped lunatics today by pushing them off a stolen motorcycle and grabbing their shotgun.

The pair had terrorized central England's Robin Hood countryside for 40 hours. They were taken from the policeman and the crowd to a nearby jail for safekeeping.

Three Kennewick Youths Killed as Train Strikes Car

KENNEWICK, Jan. 21 (AP)—Three young Kennewick men were killed this afternoon when their automobile was struck broadside by a Northern Pacific freight train at the Colorado Street crossing 4 miles west of here.

The dead were identified as Wayne Amende, 20, driver of the car; Austin E. Dyess, 20, and Ellis L. Watkins, 21.

Investigating officers blamed the crash in part on the snow and ice which coated the highway. They said the car apparently skidded onto the tracks.

No charge was immediately filed.

Officers said Smith gave this account:

His wife last Friday took their two children, aged three and five,

Smith today asked agencies in the city to talk with his wife and "try to straighten her out." When that failed, he bought a shotgun and confronted his wife at the Harover home.

Several new measures designed to improve the combat readiness of Army Reserve components are being adopted by the Army effective April 1, it was announced by Army officials this week.

Most significant of the new measures is a requirement that all non-prior servicemen in Army Reserve units receive a minimum of six months active duty training. This does not effect enlistees enrolled prior to April 1.

The six-month active duty training provision was recommended by Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, Army Chief of Staff, who said "that a period of six months active duty training is the minimum time required to qualify an untrained individual to become a qualified member of an Army Reserve component of emergency."

At present, for the Army National Guard, an enlistee between 17 and 18½ is obligated to continue his training until age 28. Under the new program, an enlistee takes six months active-duty training, and is required to serve only an additional 4½ years followed by a three year obligation in the standby reserve.

John Dierdorff said the Pleasant Valley dam PNPC wants to build would be 300 feet high and would back up the river only to the foot of Hell's Canyon Dam.

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A 90 foot addition to PNPC's planned project would make it the "high dam" Secretary of the Interior Seaton mentioned Sunday. Dierdorff said.

Seaton discussed the federal government building the dam when he proposed that the decision be held up on whether to license PNPC at Pleasant Valley.

Idaho Power Co.'s license for the Hell's Canyon Dam will have to be cancelled or modified by the Federal Power Commission if the federal government builds the Pleasant Valley Dam, he said.

Dierdorff refused to comment on whether PNPC would be interested in "partnership" construction of a high Pleasant Valley Dam.

The PNPC was created by Pacific Power and Light Co., Portland General Electric Co., Montana Power Co. and the Washington Water Power Co.

Egypt Cancels Soviet Films

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The festival was launched at the Odeon Theater Saturday night with the gala premiere of the late Maxim Gorky's "Mother" in the presence of Soviet Ambassador E. D. Kisselev and Egyptian Education Minister Kamal el Din Hussein. The festival was to run five more days.

Interior Ministry officials could not be reached for comment.

Unofficial sources said the Soviet films contained references to prostitution which are not permitted under Egyptian law. It was noted, however, that the films carried heavy doses of Communist propaganda which also are forbidden by Egyptian law.

Wife on 'Rock 'n' Roll' Jag Wounded by Irate Mate

CINCINNATI, Jan. 21 (AP)—Police said an ironworker admitted he shot and critically wounded his wife tonight because "she got the Elvis Presley rock 'n' roll jag and wouldn't tend to the kids."

Investigators said Edwin Frederick Smith, 38, gave himself up to police and told them he forced his way into his mother-in-law's home where the shooting took place.

His wife, Jean, 26, was reported in critical condition at General Hospital with a shotgun wound under the heart.

No charge was immediately filed.

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TV Quiz Show Winner Up To \$104,500

NEW YORK, Jan. 21 (AP)—Charles Van Doren increased his winnings to \$104,500 in NBC-TV's "Twenty-One" quiz show tonight. It was the largest amount ever won so far on a television quiz show.

The 30-year-old Columbia University English instructor won \$99,000 before tonight's show. He competed against two challengers and won \$5,500 more.

Van Doren will return to the show Jan. 28 to announce whether he'll take his winnings or try for more. There is no set limit as to how much he could win if he keeps going.

He is the son of Pulitzer Prize winning poet Mark Van Doren.

The complicated rules of the game follow somewhat the rules of the card game "21." The contestant and the challenger are in separate booths and cannot hear each other and do not know the other's score.

A category of questions is selected arbitrarily. Each man then picks a question ranging in difficulty on a scale from 1 to 11. If he answers it correctly, he is credited with that number of points. Each can call off the game as his score approaches 21, hoping he has beaten the other, or they can try for 21 exactly.

The winner of each game gets \$500 for each point by which he has beaten his opponent. If Van Doren had lost tonight, he would have been out of the game, but he would have kept his \$99,000, less whatever amount his winning opponent had won.

Tramway at YM Carries Pool Patients

A stretcher-equipped tramway device for carrying pool patients and other crippled persons to the therapy pool at Salem YMCA had its inaugural run Monday night.

Richard O'Connor, 25, of 4710 N. River Rd., confined to a wheel chair since being stricken with polio three years ago, was the first to be conveyed on the device. From a side door, he was transported first to a dressing room and then to the pool for therapeutic treatment.

The conveyance, installed with funds provided by Salem Masonic Lodge No. 50, was hailed by officials as a definite step forward in treatment of incapacitated persons. The program is under direction of the Salem Memorial Hospital physical therapy department.

While the new device gives a boost to the Salem program, one official said there remains a need for non-professional volunteers to help administer pool therapy.

Schiedler Rites Planned Today

Army Acts To Bolster Reserves

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Baghdad Pact Nations Back Ike in Mideast

ANKARA, Turkey, Jan. 21 (AP)—The Baghdad Pact's four Muslim members announced full support of the Eisenhower doctrine today and called for vigorous steps "to meet the challenge of false and subversive propaganda" in the Middle East.

"Subversive activities aimed at the destruction of established law and order continue unabated," declared a communique issued after a two-day meeting of officials of Turkey, Iraq, Iran and Pakistan.

"They noted with satisfaction that President Eisenhower's plan for the Middle East recognizes the threat posed by Communist aggression and subversion to the countries of the Middle East."

"They fully support the measures outlined in that plan, as it stands at present as best designed to maintain peace in this area and advance the economic well-being of the people."

"They note with gratification that the plan is not designed to create spheres of influence nor to enslave peoples of the Middle East."

The four nations—partners of Britain in an alliance created in 1955 as a shield for the Middle East against Soviet aggression—thus took a stand contrasting sharply with rejection of the "vacuum theory" by top leaders of Egypt, Syria, Saudi Arabia and Jordan at a weekend meeting in Cairo.

Federal Dam Plan, Private Plans Clash

PORTLAND, Jan. 21 (AP)—A Pleasant Valley dam 300 feet high would flood the site of a dam the Idaho Power Co. intends to build on the Snake River, a Pacific Northwest Power Co. (PNPC) spokesman said today.

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
