

Macy Gets Star Role Of Tabori

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 (AP)—John Macy, a less heralded refugee from behind the Iron Curtain, stepped forward over the weekend to grab the indoor track role originally tailored for Hungary's Laszlo Tabori.

With the ailing Tabori doing a fadeout, Poland's Macy set a new record of 9:02.6 in winning handily the 2-mile feature of the Star Games last night. He left Horace Ashenfelter, New York A.C. veteran, 25 yards behind in second place.

Snatch Said Upt.
Tabori led through the first five rounds of the 16-lap flat track event but was third when he dropped out just short of 1 1/2 miles. The Hungarian, who refused to return to his Red-ruled homeland after the Olympic Games in Melbourne, said he couldn't last because of an upset stomach that developed the previous night at the Inquirer meet in Philadelphia. Tummy aches were almost part of the program for the Star Games. Duke's famous redhead, Dave Sime, was one sufferer and was humbled in the three-mile sprint series that raised him from obscurity in the same meet a year ago.

This time Ira Murchison, the saved-off co-holder of the 10-meter outdoor record, except for 70, 80 and 100-yard straightaway dashes. Sime was second in the first two dashes but, betraying his edginess, was disqualified from the 100 for twice jumping the gun.

Cathoon Clips Record.
For all of the display by Macy and Murchison, they had to divide honors with lean Lee Cathoon whose 8.2-second romp in the 20-yard high hurdles set an indoor record. Cathoon, the Olympic 10-meter hurdle champ, also posted a decisive victory over M. J. Campbell, gold medalist in the Olympic decathlon.

Tabori's loss was his third on American boards—two at 2 miles, one at 1. Lascio has run the outdoor mile in 3:59 but has failed to show the same speed on planks as on cinders.

Lema Victor In Golf Play

EL CENTRO, Calif., Jan. 27 (AP)—Tony Lema, a 23-year-old ex-Marine from Oakland, Calif., fired a six under par 65 to tie Paul Harney, then shot a pair of birdies to win the extra hole playoff and the \$1,000 first prize in the Imperial Valley Open Golf Tournament today.

Lema and Harney, of Bolton, Mass., tied at 276.

Lema's 65 today was the lowest round of the four-day tournament at the Barbara Worth Country Club. He finished the second nine with a 66-foot putt.

Both he and the 27-year-old Harney birdied the first extra hole. Lema got a birdie 3 on the second, but Harney's putt for a 3 from 30 feet stopped 18 inches from the cup.

Bob Inman of Detroit finished third with 71 today for a six-under-par 278. Doug Higgins, Midland, Tex., equalled Lema's last nine 31 for a 68 and a 280 total, good for fourth place.

Smiley Quick, Downey, Calif., was fifth at 281, a stroke better than Bob Harris, Winnetka, Ill. Defending champion Paul O'Leary, Rosmarck, N.D., shared seventh spot with Lionel Hebert, Lafayette, La., who shot 67 today, and Dick Knight, Whittier, Calif. They had 283.

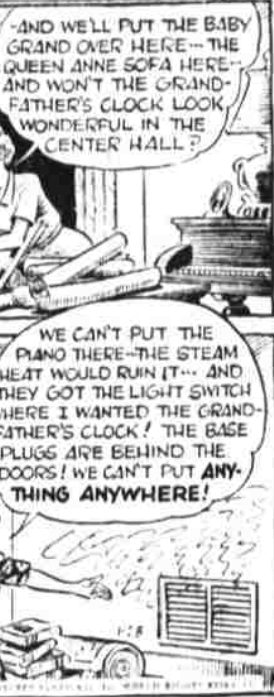
DiBiase, 21, has a 15-1 record in 17 pro fights, losing only his first pro start to Sonney Lord.

Victories by Kentucky and Auburn enabled both to deadlock idle Tulane for the lead in the torrid Southeastern Conference race. Each is 4-1.

The Wildcats, rated fifth nationally, hit on 55 per cent of their shots in the first half and then held off a Vanderbilt rally to win 91-83. Auburn took command early in the second half and went on to beat Georgia 73-66.

The other SEC games, Florida's Gators compiled the highest score ever made against Alabama on the Tide's home floor in winning 93-71 and Georgia Tech knocked off Tennessee 84-77.

Illinois, No. 9, came off a 12-day layoff to whip Notre Dame 99-81. West Virginia (No. 17) upped its pace setting mark in the Southern Conference to 6-0 by downing Furman 90-52. Lloyd Sherman got 24 points and Hot Rod Hundley 19 for the winners.

Western Kentucky, No. 20, had to go into overtime to whip DePaul 80-76. The loss was the sixth straight for DePaul.

Both Wichita and St. Louis gained ground on idle Bradley in the Missouri Valley. Wichita overcame a 14-point second half deficit to beat Drake 71-61 and third-place St. Louis rattled Tulsa's defense with sharp passing for an 84-67 success.

North Carolina's Tarheels with 15 victories and the only unblemished record among the nation's major colleges have been idle since they whipped North Carolina State 83-57 on Jan. 15. They do not swing back into action until Feb. 3 against Maryland.

Runners-up Kansas, however, will see action this Saturday against third-ranked Iowa State which handed the Jayhawks their lone defeat, 39-37, on Jan. 14.
