

'Simple' Operation May Help Defeat Coronary Thrombosis

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 6 (AP)—Dr. Robert P. Glover, a Philadelphia surgeon, today announced a "fantastically simple" operation that may help wipe out the effects of coronary thrombosis, the world's No. 1 heart disease killer.

"The results have been so impressive they are hard to believe," Dr. Glover told a press conference before addressing a sectional meeting of the American College of Surgeons.

He described the surgery as "very experimental." At least two more years of work are needed before results can be considered definite.

1,500 Protest Tax Increase In Multnomah

PORTLAND, Feb. 6 (AP)—A tax protest meeting in the public auditorium here last night brought a turnout of 1,500 Multnomah County homeowners.

They listened to the president of the newly-organized Homeowners Tax League, Wayne Woodmansee, pledge court action if necessary against a board of equalization directive that residential assessment ratios be boosted by 35 per cent.

The purpose of the move is to equalize all assessments at 45 per cent, but Woodmansee said raising residential assessments would not accomplish this. He said that the Equitable Building is assessed at 32 per cent, the Reynolds Aluminum plant at Troutdale 20 to 32 per cent, and The Oregonian building at 32 per cent.

Damage Claim Denied by Jury

A verdict for defendant Ralph Harlan was returned Wednesday in Marion County Circuit Court in a \$25,800 damage suit brought against Harlan by Georgia Moon, Silverton. The jury deliberated a little over an hour to reach its decision after two days of testimony.

The suit was the result of a two-car collision on Silverton Road in December, 1954.
