Widow of Driver-Hero Receives Medal

An echo of an 18-months-old tragedy came to Salem Tuesday in the form of a Carnegie Medal for the heroism of Robert J. Short. The medal was received by the widow, Mrs. Wanda Short, now an aide at Oregon State Hospital, who was left with three children

when her husband was killed while trying to steer his runaway truckload of logs away from cars and pedestrians on a hilly street in Oregon City Aug. 20, 1955.

The Carnegie Hero Fund Commission also has awarded Mrs. Short an allowance of \$80 a month for 13 years, or unless she remarries. She and her children reside at 3214 Brown Rd., in a small home purchased through a trust fund set up by grateful residents

of Oregon City. Salem folk also contributed. Short, 28, was killed in a mishap when the brakes of his truck failed to hold. Steering from the running board, he sounded his horn and tried to shout noon-time traffic out of the way until at the last minute he crashed the truck into an abutment to avoid striking two boys. He was a veteran of South Pacific service in World War II.

A date for initial consideration of the 1947-48 school budget will be fixed today. Impending legislation relating to the city-wide 4-H Club program will be discussed.

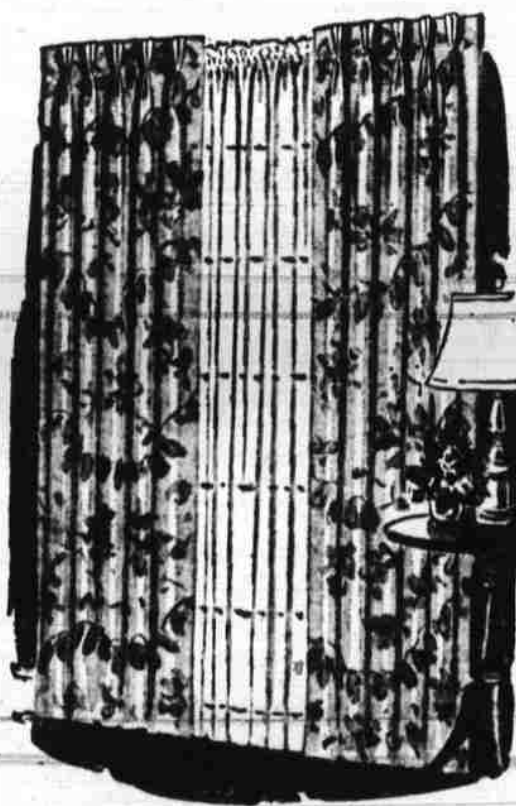


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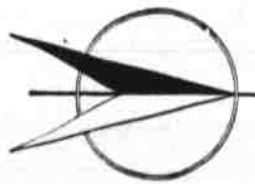
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
