Winter Greens

Off Seasons Time to Concentrate in Salad

Winter is a good time to concentrate on salads, because they don't come as easy as in summer. Actually now-a-days there are quite a few crisp greens, however pale, in the markets and your dinner salads can be quite creditable.

Lettuce, as we say, is a bit pale, but we do have it all winter, there is curly endive, chives, cabbage, regular white and red cabbage and of course spinach in the market now. All are good for salad greens.

We're rather fond of finely shredded cabbage dressed with mayonnaise, thinned down with crushed pineapple, as a quick crisp salad. Or we bring a cup of vinegar, 1 tablespoon butter and 1 tablespoon sugar to a boil, pour this hot over shredded cabbage and let it cool. It's then seasoned with salt and pepper and sour cream is added just before serving. This is enough for right servings.

Roquefort dressing has an affinity for lettuce, so here is one that might be just what you're looking for.

Roquefort Cheese

1/4 pound Roquefort cheese 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup olive oil
1 teaspoon paprika 1/2 cup vinegar

Mash cheese, mix with rest of ingredients. Makes about two cups, and is listed as a favorite of "Mrs. Harland," who evidently was a topnotch cook.

Mrs. Harland's Lettuce Salad

Head lettuce 1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard
2 hard cooked eggs 2 teaspoons salad oil
1/2 teaspoon salt 4 teaspoons vinegar
1 teaspoon sugar 1 clove of garlic

Clean lettuce, rub egg yolks to a powder and add to dry ingredients, mustard and salad oil. Let dressing stand 5 minutes, then beat in the vinegar. Rub salad bowl with garlic, and chilled lettuce in chunks, add dressing and egg whites chopped fine. This salad serves.

There are other salad greens too, beside lettuce. These can be served plain, combined with lettuce or with other greens in winter just as well as summer. Watch your market, it will probably offer several greens.

Romaine will be coming along soon. This is a long head of green leaves, delicate in flavor and excellent for salads. Use the inner leaves for filling with cheese or dressing as you would celery stalks.

Curly endive is an all-year green. It is bitter, but excellent with other greens or with a rather billy dressing. Blanched chicory (called French endive and Witloof, also Belgian endive) is an excellent salad vegetable. Escarole is similar to the curly endive in look but less bitter. Spinach of course is familiar as a cooked vegetable but good to enhance other greens in salads.

Many experienced salad makers add the garlic flavor in a chapon, a dry heel of bread rubbed generously with garlic until it is wet with juice. This is tossed with the greens and removed before served.
