Beck, Smart Again Dominate Statistics

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 20 (Special)—The brilliant scoring and all-around play of Larry Beck, Washington State, and Doug Smart, Washington, again dominated the weekly basketball statistics released today by the PCC Commissioner's office.

Beck leads in scoring and is sixth in field goal percentage and free throw percentage. Smart, who is third in scoring, is first in field goal percentage and rebounding.

Beck has averaged 21.2 points per game in 12 PCC games to date, having hit 81 field goals and 92 free throws for a total of 234 points.

Dave Gambee, Oregon State, is second in scoring with 20.1 points per game for 19.6 for Smart; Bill Boz, Stanford, is fourth, 19.1, and Charlie Franklin, Oregon, fifth, 18.8.

So States Irv Noren About Yank-KC Trade

ARCADIA, Calif., Feb. 20 (AP)—Outfielder Irv Noren today said he thinks the Kansas City Athletics got the better of the deal in their big player trade with the New York Yankees this week.

Noren is one of 14 players involved in the trade, which would send him to the Athletics from New York.

The 32-year-old outfielder said he doesn't know yet whether he'll report to the Athletics, but added that if he doesn't it won't be because he wouldn't want to play in Kansas City.

"I've been quoted a couple of times saying that I was going to quit rather than go to Kansas City," he said, "and this is not true. Kansas City is as good as any other town. Their real enthusiasm for baseball has made it so. In my opinion, it's as good a baseball town as Milwaukee."

Noren said he will wait until he has talked to Kansas City officials before deciding whether he'll play for the Athletics.

Commenting on the other players involved in the trade, Noren said: "I think (Maurice) McDermott and (Tom) Morgan and (Rip) Coleman are all capable of having good years and it's not going to be as easy for (Art) Ditmar as some may think."

Noren said Ditmar "is a good pitcher, but they won't go along with him in New York as much as they did in Kansas City."

Irv said he figures shortstop Billy Hunter, another player in the trade, also will help the Athletics.

"And I know if my knee would come around I'd be able to help them out too," he said. "It bothered me last year but it feels pretty good now."

Shorter Nose
The new Watson car has an even shorter nose than the No. 8 which Flaherty piloted to victory last year. Weight is displaced to the left end, for counterbalance in turning, and a wider tread on the rear tires.

Jud Larson of Kansas City, a dirt track driver who never has entered the 500, will drive the 1956 winning car. This car and the new Watson machine will comprise the two-car entry of John Zink, prominent stock car driver, of Tulsa, Okla.

Games Future Causes Worry

DETROIT, Mich., Feb. 20 (AP)—Two years have passed since the city of Cleveland was awarded the 1959 Pan-American games. With \$4,600,000 on hand and another half-million on the way, the city still is months away from construction and officials privately are expressing concern over the city's lukewarm attitude.

Most of the people in Ohio's largest city, including some of its high-ranking officials, were caught off guard when the selection committee picked Cleveland for the 14-day games which begin Aug. 15, 1959.

Douglas F. Roby of Detroit, head of the U.S. Pan-American games committee, said several members of the U.S. delegation were ready to junk the whole proposition as recently as six months ago. He said Avery Brundage, president of the International Olympic Committee and past president of the Games' Sports Organization, even suggested that "we turn the thing over to the Guatemala City."

Only a few months ago, Rio De Janeiro and Guatemala City offered to take the 1959 games.

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Feb. 20 (AP)—Chairman (Bump) Elliott will arrive here March 1 to assume his new duties as Michigan backfield coach.

Elliott, assistant football coach at Iowa, last night accepted Michigan's offer in a telephone conversation with Athletic Director H. O. (Fritz) Crisler. Crisler, who coached Elliott when he was a Michigan halfback, made the announcement today.

Elliott's homecoming was greeted with enthusiasm.

"We're lucky to get him," Crisler said. "He's a top-notch football man and he'll lend glamor to our team. At Iowa, he proved himself to be one of the ablest young coaching prospects in the game."

The 32-year-old Elliott returns to Michigan with nine years experience as an assistant coach. He succeeds another ex-Michigan back, Don Robinson, who resigned Monday from the staff headed by Bennie Oosterbaan.
