

Teachers Ask Changes in Pay Scale

The need for jumps in the differential pay scale in the Salem School district was voiced Thursday night by members of the School Board and the district's budget committee. Action on the matter was delayed.

Jay Rorick, chairman of a special Salem Classroom Teachers Association committee, named to study differentials, pointed out inequalities present in the current scale. Differentials are paid for extra work loads carried by teachers, such as in athletic coaching and non-athletic endeavors such as drama, speech, music, etc.

Per Diem Asked

Rorick said the committee recommended dispensing with present per diem system such as that paid football coaches for work prior to opening of school. The recommendation was a flat \$500 for high school grid mentors, which would be roughly equivalent to what they now get with per diem included. The committee recommendations included: assistant high school varsity football coach from \$420 to \$540; head basketball coach from \$720 to \$840; baseball, track and wrestling head coaches from \$420 to \$540; other minor sport coaches from \$180 to \$210.

Junior high increases would include: head football and basketball coaches from \$270 to \$400; head baseball and track coaches from \$180 to \$210.

In the non-athletic category recommended were: jumps from \$180 to \$360 for teachers involved in debate, drama, music publications and auditorium duties.

The board approved final drawings of Architect James Payne for a six-room classroom addition at Liberty Heights School. Payne said he will have plans ready for bids within 60 days. Also studied were drawings by Architect John Grimmer Groom for a four-classroom addition at Salem Heights School. Final decision on plans for this project will be made later.

Request Approved

Approved by the board upon recommendation of Supt. Charles Schmidt was a request from the Popcorn School District that six of its seventh and eighth grade pupils be accepted into the Salem district on a tuition basis.

The board granted Church of Christ use of old Ricker School at a rental of \$30 per month.

Barn Burns At Crabtree

CRABTREE, Feb. 28 (AP) — A barn valued at \$10,000 was destroyed by fire Thursday afternoon when a grass fire got out of control on the Albert Schuler farm three miles southeast of this Linn County community.

Schuler was burning grass on his property when sparks ignited the roof of his barn. Also destroyed in the blaze were a \$500 pump and pump house, and three tons of hay, a tractor and a complete cabinet shop located in the barn. A standby fire truck from Crabtree answered the alarm and a second truck was sent out from Seio to assist the volunteer crew. The loss was partially covered by insurance, Schuler said.

Flood Closes Three Bridges In Central Washington Area

MOSES LAKE, Feb. 28 (AP) — Flood waters of rampant Crab Creek this afternoon cut the bridges linking the north and south sections of this central Washington city.

Traffic was stopped on three highway bridges and one railroad bridge after rapidly rising water weakened the approaches. The main east-west bridge on highway 10 was not affected.

The normally placid arm of the lake which separates the north and south sections of the city resembled a fast flowing river as the water rose more than three feet during the day. The bridge closures came in mid-afternoon.

Workers at the Boeing Flight Test Center and at Larson Air Force Base who live in the main section of the city, south of the

lake arm, faced the prospect of a 40-mile drive via Ephrata to reach their homes. The force of the flood waters which submerged the little town of Wilson Creek two nights ago began to build up here during the morning. The creek flows into the lake here, the continues to the Columbia River after emerging from Potholes Reservoir.

The flood was reported receding upstream as it built up here. Mayor Marshall Burress, a resident of Moses Lake most of his life, said it is the heaviest flow he ever has seen here. One of the closed bridges is the Alder Causeway, the main north-south artery.

Two houses along the creek, outside the city, were reported with floors under water.

Slowdown in Building Seen In Labor Row

Several sizeable building projects in the mid-Willamette Valley area could be slowed if they become involved in a plumbing work stoppage which was to start today in the five-county Local 347 area.

Union and contractors' association representatives disagree, however, on the probable action of several contractors from outside the association who are working on major construction.

Large projects now underway or about to start include Western Paper Converting Co. and Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co. expansion at Salem, MacLaren School dormitory at Woodburn, trailer manufacturing plant at Minville, Western Kraft Paper Co. expansion at Albany, and Oregon State College dormitory and Forestry Service construction at Corvallis, and a pulp mill at Toledo.

The union and contractors also are in disagreement on points of disagreement.

Major Dispute
The major dispute is the difference between union wage and fringe benefit requests amounting to 50% cents hourly and a contractors' offer of 15 cents, according to Vern Collins, secretary of Willamette Valley Plumbers & Steamfitters Local Union 347.

Union wage requests were submitted for negotiation and not as a final demand, he said. The contractors' offer was rejected because it was submitted as a "package" that could not be accepted in part, he added.

Objection to the contract wording was made on the advice of union attorneys that the old contract gave better protection to both employers and employees.

Burroughs said, adding that it was the union's intention to keep working during negotiations.

Collins said the union demand included a 35-cent hourly wage increase plus fringe benefits, principally a health and welfare plan and paid vacations.

Present rates are \$3.25 an hour for journeymen and \$3.70 for foremen, with 50 fringe benefits. Union gain in contract negotiations a year ago was 20 cents an hour.

In Salem, apparently 44 to 46 plumbers employed by six to eight contractors were affected by the work stoppage, Burroughs said. Several Salem plumbers working on construction in Albany and Corvallis also might be involved, he said.

A meeting of company and union representatives with a Federal Mediation & Conciliation Service representative has been set for 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in Marion Hotel. Collins said the employers' association was inviting the general membership of both the union and the association to attend the meeting.



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U.S. Officials Sure Israel To Pull Troops From Gaza

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28 (AP) — The paralyzing crisis over Israeli troop withdrawal appeared tonight to be broken. American officials were convinced that within a few days Israel will pull its forces out of the Gaza Strip and the Gulf of Aqaba area.

The possibility of some kind of hitch remained since the Israeli plan will not go before the United Nations until tomorrow afternoon and the reaction of all the countries there, particularly the Arab bloc, is not yet known. However, a snag was considered here to be highly improbable.

Ambassador Abba Eban announced at the State Department late today that he had informed Secretary of State Dulles in a two-hour meeting of Israel's statement to be made to the General Assembly in New York.

He told reporters that the statement "will cause widespread satisfaction" among all the people who are interested in bringing "peace and security and non-belligerency" to the Middle East.

His announcement here and a similar announcement by an Israeli spokesman at the United Nations climaxed three weeks of feverish diplomatic activity in Washington. In recent days the negotiations had involved not only Eban and Dulles but also Premier Guy Mollet and Israeli Foreign Minister Golda Meir.

Israel finally made its decision to withdraw, according to information from diplomatic sources here, after being assured of widespread support for its aims of preventing Egypt from again using the Gaza Strip as a base for raids against Israel and assuring free navigation into the Gulf of Aqaba.

Israel Pullout Signs Lacking

RAFAH, Gaza Strip, Feb. 28 (AP) — Israeli forces in the Gaza Strip show no signs of preparing for a withdrawal and the Israeli military governor of the area said today he has neither plans nor orders to pull out. Reports of an agreement in Washington for an Israeli withdrawal from the strip failed to raise much optimism either in Rafah, Jerusalem or

Still, 200 Gallons Of Mash Seized By Liquor Agents

CLATSkanie, Feb. 28 (AP) — Federal and state agents seized a 12-gallon still and 200 gallons of mash in a raid late yesterday. They arrested James Mahan, 37, unemployed electrician, on a charge of illegal possession of un-taxed liquor.

In swift action a federal grand jury at Portland today indicted Mahan on three counts involving fermenting mash, possessing and using a still illegally.

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
