

Assistant Dean, Quizzed in Grimes Slaying, Kills Self

CHICAGO, March 6 (AP)—Police said an assistant dean of admissions at Loyola University shot and killed himself in his room tonight while detectives searched for evidence that might have connected him with the slaying of the two teen-age Grimes sisters.

Rio Pre-Lenten Festivities 'Tame,' Only 19 Killed

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, March 6 (AP)—Rio's four-day pre-Lenten carnival was relatively quiet this year, Police Chief Col. Batista Teixeira reported today.

The fun-making officially ended early this morning, but some revelers sang in the streets until dawn. The police chief said this year's casualties stood at 19 dead and 3,165 injured, compared with 29 dead and 3,854 injured a year ago. But the suburban hospitals still had not submitted their reports.

Solon Says O & C Report Misleading

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—Sen. Neuberger (D-Or.) said today the Bureau of Land Management had made an "erroneous and misleading statement" designed to "lull Oregonians into believing that all was well with management of O&C assets."

He asked Secretary of the Interior Seaton to explain it.

Neuberger said the statement was contained in a "self-serving interpretation" made by the bureau of a report by Prof. Paul F. Graves of Syracuse University. The report was on marketing areas within the Oregon and California Railroad grant lands in Western Oregon.

The statement, the senator said, "twisted the objective report of an independent forestry consultant into an attack on other federal forest management agencies and attempted to cover up revenue losses from O&C forests in Oregon."

Neuberger challenged what he said was a bureau statement that Graves' study showed O&C timber sales "averaged \$9 per thousand board feet more than prices paid for other federal timber of like quality in the same general areas and period."

According to Neuberger, Graves actually said price comparisons between the BLM and the Forest Service "are extremely difficult and have not been attempted by either federal agency" because of the variable factors involved.

The senator also disagreed with the bureau that the report "refutes published statements to the effect that marketing procedures for O&C timber might have cost the 18 O&C counties potential revenues." Neuberger said the facts are exactly the opposite.

Police Concern

Morris said the main police concern with Burch was whether he had anything to do with the slaying of Barbara Grimes, 15, and her sister Patricia, 13.

Morris, who heads a special investigation unit assigned to the slaying of three Chicago schoolboys in October 1955, said he also had planned to question Burch about this crime.

The boys, Robert Peterson, 14, and John Schuessler, 13, and John's brother Anton, 11, were found slain in a forest preserve area northwest of the city.

The Grimes girls' bodies were found by a lonely road southwest of the city Jan. 22. They had disappeared Dec. 28 after attending a movie near their home.

No Charge

Morris said Burch came to the station for questioning at police request and had not been charged with any crime. He said Burch described his job at Loyola as "mostly public relations."

Burch, who lived with his parents, was charged with crime against nature involving a boy Feb. 18, 1952. Judge George Weiss of Municipal Court placed him under court supervision.

A Loyola spokesman said Burch

had graduated from the university in 1955. He said Burch came to Loyola as assistant to the Rev. John C. Malloy, dean of admissions, last fall.

Burch worked in preparing a brochure on the university and aided in interviewing prospective students, the spokesman said.

U.S. Newsmen Told to 'Get Out of Cuba'

KEY WEST, Fla., March 6 (AP)—Two Birmingham, Ala., newsmen arrived from Cuba today and said they were told by the Cuban government to "get out of Cuba."

George Prentice, 32, a reporter, and Anthony Falletta, 35, a photographer, said they had been held in custody by Cuban authorities since Friday. They spent Sunday and Monday in a Havana jail.

Cuban government officials have been reported by recent stories in The New York Times reporting one of its correspondents interviewed Fidel Castro, a Cuban revolutionary leader.

Prentice and Falletta were on leaves of absence and were on special assignment for the National Broadcasting Co.

"We are free men only through intervention of the U. S. Department of State," Prentice told the Birmingham News by telephone.

"We have been held in custody of the military, under the surveillance of the secret police or in a Havana jail since last Friday," he said.

Prentice related, "We came to Cuba two weeks ago on assignment for NBC to contact 'rebel elements' in the mountains of southern Cuba and get their story."

He said the Cuban government claimed they had "revolutionary propaganda" in their possession. Prentice said they were charged also with releasing information detrimental to the government.

Commie Party Denounced by Novelist Fast

NEW YORK, March 6 (AP)—Novelist Howard Fast, who broke with the Communist party last month, has denounced the Soviet system as "socialism without morality."

Fast gave his views in an article in the March issue of Mainstream, a left-wing literary journal that has been close to the Communist party in the past.

Mainstream's editors in the same issue published a reply rejecting Fast's views for the most part, although indicating sympathy with some parts of the writer's indictment of Soviet Russia.

Fast wrote that the Soviet system is "socialism without democracy, without trial by jury, habeas corpus or the right against self-incrimination, without civil liberty, without public avenues of protest, without equality for minorities, without right of free artistic creation."

He added that present Soviet leaders should be denounced "not only for their acquiescence in the crimes of Stalin, but for their continuing record of intolerance and dogmatic bossism since the exposure of these crimes."

Fast's reputation as an author rests mainly on his historical novels dealing with the American Revolution. Although he never publicly admitted membership in the Communist party, he was for many years deeply involved in Communist causes and was a leading spokesman in defense of the party.

In 1950 Fast served a jail term for contempt of Congress growing out of his refusal to answer questions about communism.

Several years later he was awarded the Stalin peace prize.

FBI Nabs 2 In Woodburn

WOODBURN, March 6 (AP)—Elroy Archer, 22, and a 16-year-old youth, both from Staples, Minn., were apprehended tonight in Woodburn by state police, local FBI agents and the Marion County sheriff's office on a Minnesota burglary charge.

The FBI arrest was based on unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for burglary. Both were lodged in Marion County courthouse jail awaiting removal to Portland and later to Minnesota, the FBI said.

Agents said the two men were visiting Archer's relatives in Salem and Woodburn.

Entry of U.N. Troops Into Gaza Orderly; Arabs Cheer

GAZA, March 6 (AP)—United Nations troops rolled into the capital of the Gaza Strip in rainy darkness tonight to take over from the departing Israelis.

Men of five nations moved up from the Egyptian Sinai Peninsula on the southern end of the 26-km strip early in the evening.

Within three hours they reached the city and occupied strategic spots throughout the area beside the Mediterranean.

The entry of Swedish, Danish, Norwegian, Indian and Colombian units was a swift, blitz-like operation without major incident.

In Gaza City, small groups of Arabs came out of houses despite a curfew and shouted: "Long live Nasser! Long live the United Nations! Down with Israel!"

But for the most part the evacuation by the Israelis and the entry of the U.N. was orderly.

As the U. N. troops rolled through the towns of the strip, most of the Arab population peered through the windows.

People had been kept indoors by the curfew imposed by the Israelis.

The U.N. troops took over so quickly that soldiers came without field equipment.

A U.N. truck shuttled back and forth between the strip and the U.N. Sinai base at El 'Arish to bring in tents and supplies.

First contacts between Israeli and U.N. forces appeared cordial but formal.

Initial contingents of the U. N. troops totaled 2,600 men.

Polio Virus May Prevent Cancer, Report Indicates

HOUSTON, Tex., March 6 (AP)—A survey of several thousand cases of disease has yielded a hint that infection with polio virus may prevent cancer, a medical statistician reported today.

The findings came from an examination of records covering 14,000 cases of cancer and 828 cases of polio in Harris County—Houston. Among all the individuals who had cancer only one was found with a history of polio.

Among polio victims, not one case of malignancy was uncovered.

These results were cited by Miss Eleanor J. MacDonald in a report prepared for the eleventh annual Symposium of Fundamental Cancer Research sponsored by the M. D. Anderson Hospital and the University of Texas Postgraduate School of Medicine. Miss MacDonald specializes in mathematical analyses of medical statistics.

The cancer statistics covered all hospital cases in the county from 1944 through 1950. The only one of the 14,000 cancer victims found to have had polio was an aged woman with breast cancer.

Normally, the statistician added, three or four cases of polio would have been found among that many people.

The survey of the polio cases covered all those reported in the county for 1948 through 1950. On the basis of chance, three of these should have had cancer, Miss MacDonald said.

The number of cases involved is too small to prove anything but

the conclusions are "provocative," she asserted.

The findings tie in with results obtained by other researchers who have demonstrated that some viruses can destroy cancer cells, but their experiments have been confined to the laboratory.
