WASHINGTON, March 7 (U.P.)—Postmaster General Arthur S. Summerfield today asked Congress for a penny increase on 3-cent stamps, post cards and air mail.

In a message to House Speaker Sam Rayburn, Summerfield also proposed increases on second, third and fourth class mail.

He estimated all the increases would produce additional revenues

YM to Offer 7,000 Books At Fair Today

The third annual Salem YMCA Book Fair will open today with almost 7,000 used books for sale for 5 or 10 cents in the YM social room.

This is a little short of the optimistic goal of 10,000 but still about 1,000 better than last year and almost double the number donated for the fair.

Almost 200 of the books were taken Thursday night by the State Library, the only buyer allowed to make selections before the public sale. The library pays the regular price of 10 cents a book, 5 cents for paperbacks. It buys books that are out of print and unobtainable from regular dealers.

The Y's Menettes, sponsors of the sale to finance equipment purchase, got one "station wagon load" of books by trading a load of "rummage" with a Tigard woman's club sponsoring a rummage sale.

The public sale will open at 9 a.m. today. Books will be sold until 5 p.m. today and again from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday.

Minor Floods Reported as Heavy Rain Washes State

Heavy rains caused some minor flooding in Western Oregon and touched off a landslide that blocked the Union Pacific railroad line in Eastern Oregon for a number of hours Thursday.

The landslide buried the track 10 miles north of North Powder. A freight train plowed into the slide, but rail official said damage was minor. A westbound passenger train also was delayed a number of hours at Baker before the track was cleared.

Another storm is following on the heels of the one that dumped more than two inches of rain on some coastal points, forecasters said.

Astoria reported 2.30 inches of rain in a 24-hour period. Newport measured 1.94, Portland 1.15, Salem .80 and The Dalles .65.

Johnson Creek at Portland, which often swells out of its banks in prolonged rains, lapped onto surrounding terrain. A number of small slides were reported on rural roads of Western Oregon.

No major flooding is in prospect, Elmer Fisher, river forecaster, said.

Slides also caused some trouble in the Columbia Gorge east of Portland. One slide at Bridal Veil delayed a Union Pacific passenger train Thursday morning.

Other slides blocked the old Columbia River Highway on the side of the gorge. The new watergrade route is open.

BEND, March 7 (U.P.)—Brooks-Scanlon has closed down its logging operations in Central Oregon because drenching rains and melting snows have turned forest roads in quagmires.

Officials of the firm said that no further logging will be attempted for six weeks.

The logging halt will not affect the Brooks-Scanlon lumber mill here. Some 15 million board feet of timber, which had been cut earlier, is available in cold decks or in the mill pond.

Brain Shocks 'May Cause' Some Disease

HOUSTON, March 7 (U.P.)—Psychological shocks may trigger mechanisms in the brain which make the body subjects to many diseases, a medical researcher reported today.

Some forms of cancer as well as obesity and other disorders may be traceable largely to psychic jolts which cause the jamming of brain centers that apparently control the output of hormones, he said.

Hormones, the potent little substances which govern many body functions, are produced in varieties and quantities that change from day to day.

Conditions such as fright, anger or hunger cause an outpouring of appropriate hormones to enable the body to meet these crises. When the crisis is over, excess hormone production in the normal person stops. The body has a mechanism for shutting off this production as well as starting it, said Dr. J. B. Trunell, of the University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute here.

Dr. Trunell set out to locate this shut-off mechanism. He used a sex hormone, estradiol, containing radioactive carbon to trace the process. The carbon gives off mild radiation which can be detected with instruments. When he administered hormones to a mouse and later found some of the radioactive carbon in a certain part of the animal's brain he concluded he had located the spot which operated the shut-off procedure.

Dr. Trunell told the hospital's eleventh annual symposium on that tests are being made also with other hormones.

Over-supplies of some female sex hormones can cause breast cancer. Psychic shock which might jam a control and cause a gland to pour out these hormones in abnormal amounts conceivably could play a part in the origin of the malignancy, the physician said.

Judge Indictment Ordered Back for Grand Jury Action

HILLSBORO, March 7 (U.P.)—An indictment charging former Washington County Judge Harry M. Seabold with receiving a bribe to day was ordered re-submitted to the county grand jury by Circuit Judge Carl A. Dahl.

He is accused of accepting the money in connection with a real estate transaction while he was a county judge.

Seabold's attorney argued today that language of the indictment was not "ordinary and precise," and asked that the indictment be thrown out for that reason.

Last year Seabold was indicted on a charge of accepting the \$255 commission on the sale of county-owned property. The charge was dismissed before the case went to the jury.

Payments Due for Tribe Members

PORTLAND, March 7 (U.P.)—A \$500 payment will go soon to each enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation in Central Oregon.

The Bureau of Indian Affairs announced the allotment today. The money is from timber sales on the reservation.

For each school child a payment of \$100 will be withheld until fall in order that the money may be used to buy clothing and other necessities for them at that time.

The suggestion came from the tribal council, which met here with Glenn L. Emmerson, commissioner of Indian Affairs.

Don C. Foster, Portland area director for the bureau, said the payments will total \$270,000.

A-Research Voted

WASHINGTON, March 7 (U.P.)—A House Armed Services subcommittee today recommended authorizing \$44,700,000 to improve facilities for research on the atom powered airplane and other weapons of the future.

But later Mrs. Phyllis Dietrick, the council's office secretary, appeared before the judge and said the records would be given to Steele for presentation to the grand jury.
