Snag Seen In Urban Plan Study

The current reassessment program underway in Marion County may prove a snag in efforts to determine cost figures needed in a study of urban services for Salem's fringe areas, a special 20-man South Salem-Salem Chamber of Commerce committee learned Tuesday morning.

Failure to arrive at usable cost figures may hold up presentation of a planned questionnaire to South Salem residents, E. A. Bamford told the committee.

Bamford heads a sub-committee delegated to report on costs of urban services in the group's study of Salem's fringe area problems. "Current millages and assessments on taxable property may not mean much by the time the assessor's office completes its three-year reassessment program," Bamford said. The county assessor's office is approximately half way through the program.

"It's simple to use present rates for such urban services as water or sewage," Bamford reported. "But it's difficult to project accurate costs of establishment of such services or the general tax funds from which these services are provided."

Bamford said he planned to meet with the questionnaire committee next week in an effort to arrive at some figures which may be used in the opinion sampling planned to determine services South Salem residents need and desire.

The questionnaire committee will meet Thursday at 8 p.m. at the Salem Women's Club. A get acquainted program will be featured.

Members of the Golden Age Club will meet at 1:30 p.m. in the Salem YWCA parlor Friday. Refreshments will follow.

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Two Salem Junk Dealers Get Stiff Term in Theft

District Judge E. O. Stadler Jr. joined county law enforcement officials Tuesday in warning residents of an outbreak of junk and scrap metal thefts when he handed two Salem junk dealers a stiff sentence for stealing a crowbar from a state police officer.

"Why, it's getting so things are picked up faster than you can lay them down," Judge Stadler told The Statesman. "Thieves are picking up anything they can lift from construction jobs, farms, barns and warehouses under the guise of collecting junk."

"And the vicious part is that items are disposed of at junk yards before complaints of the theft can be made," he added.

Judge Stadler sentenced William Barto and Leonard Lee Simpson, both of 1069 Leslie St., to 120 days in jail each on petty larceny charges involving theft of a crowbar from state policeman Wallace C. Cobine. Both men pleaded guilty Tuesday in Marion County District Court.

Meanwhile, two Salem men received 60-day jail sentences on similar charges Tuesday afternoon from Justice of the Peace Irving Brown at Woodburn. Edwin L. Heuer, 1615 Candlewood Dr., and Hillard Junior Lysell, 1730 Broadway, were arraigned on charges involving theft of a load of junk from a Silverton-area farm owned by Rudy Koster, Woodburn.

In a third case, deputy sheriff Amos Shaw arrested Clarence Orville Eugene Swartz, 73, Brooks, Tuesday afternoon on a charge of attempted larceny involving theft of several pieces of heavy wire from a farm owned by Melvin Forcier, Woodburn.

Sheriff Denver Young earlier had asked county residents to take down license numbers and report them to the sheriff's office when "suspicious" cars are spotted in rural communities.

CHEMAWA, March 12 — Sixty-one seniors at Chemawa Indian School received certificates of graduation today in cap and gown ceremonies — the earliest in the school's history and the first commencement in Oregon this year.

Fifty of the students are members of the special five-year Navajo program and many of them will be leaving Wednesday morning for jobs throughout the West.

Job placement is assured each graduate. Most of the boys will be employed on ranches in Central and Eastern Oregon, while the largest share of girls will remain in western Oregon.

Commencement address was delivered by George T. Barrett, Portland, relocation specialist who spoke on "Education For Modern Living."

The colorful ceremony was witnessed by a near capacity crowd in the spacious Indian school auditorium, north of Salem.

Attendance certificates were presented by Victor E. Hill, school superintendent, and presentation of the class was made by Mrs. Nell V. Brannon, principal.

The class chose as its flower the pink carnation, colors of black and white, and a class motto "A journey of a thousand miles begins with one step."

The 11 senior members of the class participating under the Navajo program, will continue classes until mid-May, despite participation in today's graduation.
