

Unemployment Compensation Compromise Move Collapses

Efforts to compromise the Oregon Legislature's unemployment compensation problem failed Monday night.

The Senate Labor and Industries Committee, which has studied the question for three months, split 4-3 along party lines in recommending passage of Labor's bill to boost jobless benefits and employer contributions.

The split — with the Democrats on the prevailing side — means the bill is in for some hard going when it reaches the evenly-divided Senate.

A subcommittee, consisting of Sens. Dan Dimick (D), Roseburg, and Rude Wilhelm (R), Portland, submitted a compromise to the committee.

Then Sen. Lee Ohmart (R), Salem, submitted amendments that would eliminate some seasonal workers, and the Democrats said this violated a committee agreement to accept the compromise.

The Democrats then went for Labor's bill, which had a recommendation by the subcommittee that it be modified.

The labor bill would increase maximum weekly jobless benefits from \$35 to \$40, and extend coverage to employers of one person.

The changes, with other liberalized provisions, would mean total annual benefit payments of \$25,300,000 a year, or \$1,800,000 more than now is being paid out.

The employer contribution rate, now running from 3 to 3 per cent

Passenger Rocket Ships Envisioned

PITTSBURGH, May 6 (AP)—Passenger-carrying rocket ships will fly the Atlantic Ocean or from New York to Los Angeles in a single hour within the next 30 years, an eminent international rocket expert forecast today.

Willy Ley, German-born author and advocate of space travel, made these predictions prior to an address before the Aeronautical Society of America.

Ley said the best guess among rocket experts is that the Vanguard, a U. S. Air Force project, will make its first trip to outer space by next January.

He enthusiastically says this eventually will lead to space travel, just as the ascent of the first balloon resulted in present day air travel.

Doukhobors Eye Home in Russia

NELSON, B. C., May 6 (CP)—The peace-loving, free-raiding Doukhobors, a radical branch of the Doukhobor sect, may find a new home in Russia.

Leaders of the 2,500 Doukhobors reported Monday an application to relocate in Soviet Russia—the homeland they left to come to Canada nearly 60 years ago—has met with a favorable reception at the Soviet Embassy in Ottawa.

"Our reply was most favorable to further negotiations," said Bill Mijoljasky, a spokesman for the Doukhobors.

He would not disclose the contents of the reply from Soviet Ambassador Dmitri Chuvashin.

Independence Hall Clock Bows to Electrical Type

PHILADELPHIA, May 6 (AP)—The clock atop historic Independence Hall has stopped.

It was an accident.

Melford O. Anderson, superintendent of Independence National Historical Park—of which the Hall is the center of attraction—said the clock stopped when work began last week on a new electrical system.

The contractor hopes to have the work completed within 30 days.

Anderson said the electrical work is only part of the rehabilitation work being done on the Independence Hall group of historic buildings at a cost of a quarter of a million dollars.

Work now under way or soon to begin includes an improved sprinkler system, a new specially designed fire detection system, and painting inside and out.

Team Near Peak Of Annapurna

KATMANDU, Nepal, May 6 (AP)—A two-man British expedition to Annapurna, second highest peak in the Himalayas, has almost reached the summit, they reported in a letter received by runner today.

It said Charles Evans and Dennis Davis established a second camp at 25,000 feet on April 26 and planned to climb the 500 feet to the top during this week.

When a French expedition led by Maurice Herzog climbed Annapurna in 1950 it was the highest mountain ever conquered by man.

Lebanon High School Scholarship Revealed

LEBANON, May 6 (AP)—A new \$2500 college scholarship for an outstanding student of Lebanon Union High School provided by Crown Zellerbach Foundation has been announced.

Superintendent J. W. King said today the scholarship is one of several being offered in communities where Crown Zellerbach has facilities, he said.

The Planning Commission, president, Lyle Glenn, said today the building is located in a business area where the commercial value and parking problems make it more advisable to use the property commercially. He stated the commission's views in a letter to the city council.

The property was willed to the federal government by Miss Lilly Moore, a descendant of early day Roseburg settlers.

B47 Masters Technique of Toss-Bombing

EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE, Fla., May 6 (AP)—A B47 Stratofortress showed the agility of a jet fighter today in the first public demonstration of "toss bombing" by the 90-ton bomber.

The Air Force described the feat as "a revolutionary addition to strategic bombing tactics." The technique is designed for delivery of atomic bombs.

It was shown at an aerial firepower demonstration by the Air Proving Ground Command.

The six-jet medium bomber roared in at minimum altitude in front of the stands, then pulled into a sharp climb and released the bomb while still climbing.

The B47 rolled out on top of a half loop and sped away in the opposite direction while the bomb followed a high arc and fell squarely on the target. A smoke device enabled 6,500 spectators to follow the path of the simulated atomic bomb.

The technique was developed to permit the atomic carrier to be miles from the target at the moment of detonation.

Farm Crop Profit Dips

PORTLAND, May 6 (AP)—Oregon farmers received one-half of one per cent less for their product in the period ended April 15 than they did in the 30 days before.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture crop report, service said, lower prices included sheep, lambs, wholesale milk, chickens and eggs.

But increases were registered for cattle, hogs, and wool. Wheat was a gainer, too, with prices averaging two cents above mid-March prices.

On a nationwide basis farmers gained two per cent in the same period.

Waistlines for Atom-Disfigured Japanese Starts

HIROSHIMA, Japan, May 6 (AP)—The first of a series of plastic surgery operations in Japan on 18 Hiroshima girls disfigured by the 1945 A-bomb blast started today.

Machiko Yoshimoto, 21, was the first patient. Her treatment is to correct deformities on her right arm. The 17 others will be treated later.

Selected by American doctors, they were unable to go to New York for surgery, as did an earlier group of 25 in May 1953.

Dr. Tomie Harada and Dr. Sadamu Takahashi, who accompanied the 25 to the United States to learn plastic surgery techniques, conducted the operation today. It lasted two hours.

Surgery costs will be paid by the government.

Plane Crash Hurts Man From Portland

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 6 (AP)—A man identified as Howard Fox, 36, of Portland, suffered a possible minor spine fracture this evening when his light plane crashed on takeoff from Pearson Airport here.

Another passenger in the plane at the time of the crash was able to walk away. His identity was not reported.

WOODBURN, May 6—John Jamson of Woodburn told the sheriff's office tonight that a stranger "trying out" a car he was selling failed to return with the vehicle. The car was described as a 47 Ford, 2-door, license 2A 5801.

Edgerton, who lives at Salem, was elected at the organization's meeting here last weekend.

Boston Tea Party Re-Enactment Held In New England

BOSTON, May 6 (AP)—New England businessmen staged a re-enactment of the Boston Tea Party today near the scene of the original protest against a British three per cent tax on tea.

The re-enactment, along with a lunch and forum discussion, were sponsored by the Greater Boston Chamber of Commerce as a protest against government spending.

Specifically the modern protest is aimed at the pending federal budget of \$71,000,000,000 for the coming year.

The chief speakers at the meeting were Sen. Byrd (D-Va.) and Rep. Judd (R-Minn.).

Sen. Byrd told several hundred businessmen that President Eisenhower's current budget is "the most irresponsible budget submitted in my day."

Byrd said, "This may be our last chance to stop growing expenditures—if we don't do it now, we will spend and spend and tax and tax—and destroy ourselves."

Rep. Judd, however, warned against a "meat ax" reduction of the budget, particularly in foreign aid.

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Few Montgomery Negroes Get Chance to Sign to Vote

MONTGOMERY, Ala., May 6 (AP)—Montgomery Negroes set out en masse to apply for registration as voters today, but only a comparatively few got the chance to do it.

The County Board of Registrars said there was a "steady" stream of applicants lined up outside the board's one-room office but that it was "slow moving."

A Negro spokesman, Rufus Lewis, had said at the outset that he expected 300 or more members of his race to apply for voting rights during the day.

Mrs. Willis said limited accommodations restricted the number of applicants to four at a time. It took some Negroes "a long time" to fill out the required questionnaire, she said, and "we don't hurry them."

In adjoining Elmore County about 60 Negroes made application to vote. R. H. Wideman, Elmore registrar, said, "We had more Negroes apply today than the total Negro application during the past two years."

Back Wages for Employees Fired by Teamsters Sought

PORTLAND, May 6 (AP)—James M. Byers said today the Office Employees International Union will seek reinstatement and back pay for employees fired by the Teamsters Union.

Byers' statement followed a decision by the U. S. Supreme Court today against the Teamsters. He is secretary-treasurer of Local No. 11 of the office workers union.

Byers said the court decision imposed upon a "few persons" in the Teamsters union "the principles of responsible conduct accepted by the great mass of labor representatives."

He added that he hoped the court decision would not be considered a "blanket condemnation of the Teamsters."

The office employees of the Teamsters, fired when they tried to join a union other than the Teamsters, now go before the National Labor Relations Board for consideration of their case. The NLRB must decide if the Teamsters were guilty of refusing to bargain with the office employees.

Dog With Five Hearts Described by Doctors

CHICAGO, May 6 (AP)—A dog with five functioning hearts—four transplanted from other animals—was described today by two medical researchers.

Dr. Salem F. Sayegh and Oscar Creech, Jr., of the Tulane University School of Medicine, said transplanted hearts have lived and functioned up to 10 days in animal experiments.

They described their research at the annual meeting of the American Assn. for Thoracic Surgery. Dr. Creech told newsmen later.

Dr. Sayegh said in an interview that Tulane researchers believe their recent research has given them a "good lead" which may help solve this problem, but he did not elaborate.

The dog with five hearts had two grafted on his neck—one on either side—and two more in the groin area, above each of the dog's hind legs.

The heartbeat and pumped blood in unison with the dog's own heart, some of them for as long as 10 days, the investigators said.

Beef Market Methods Need Improvement

EUGENE, May 6 (AP)—Beef cattle producers of Oregon must continue to improve their production and marketing methods if they are to meet increasing competition of other food products, the 44th annual convention of the Oregon Cattlemen's Assn. was told today.

Garland Meadow, president of the organization, made that statement at the convention's opening session.

Some 300 delegates have registered for the three-day convention. Tomorrow morning the delegates will be guests at a 6 a. m. breakfast. Gov. Robert D. Holmes is to address the morning session later.

Discussions are planned on taxation, wildlife, trespassing, brands, a proposed Oregon Beef Commission and other topics relating to beef production and sales.
