Both Income, Cost Climbs For Weeklies

EUGENE, May 12 — The sixth annual cost study of American weekly newspapers shows the average increase in income for the weeklies in the nation for 1956 was up over the 1955 income by 12.4 per cent. Average increase in expense for the same period was 12.3 per cent.

The study covered 141 weekly newspapers representing 30 states and was conducted by Carl C. Webb, assistant professor of journalism at University of Oregon and secretary-manager of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Assn. The survey was a joint project of the National Editorial Assn. and the American Newspaper Assn. Managers.

Nut Co-op to Vote Whether To Deal With 'Outsiders'

Whether the Salem Nut Growers Cooperative will buy or sell products of non-members will be decided at the annual meeting of the association set for May 24, 8 p.m.

A total of seven amendments is proposed to the Articles of the association. In addition there will be election of officers. Those whose terms expire are E. J. Allen of Woodburn, A. L. Page of Jefferson and A. A. Withers of Salem.

Financial Action

Also to be submitted for discussion and possible adoption by the members will be a proposal to allow the Cooperative to issue debentures for financing its activities.

Hansberry said that a comparatively good price is expected for walnuts although it may not meet the 27-cent bid-run price of last year. Any price from 22 to 25, he said, however, "Hansberry said. There was a small crop last year and the better crop expected this year will help offset a small drop in price, Hansberry believed.

The walnut situation is not so bright, according to the nut growers. Last year there was a flood of walnut meats which have started moving following a mark-down to "consumer price," Hansberry stated. If the meats are not moved now, they will be disposed of otherwise in the opinion of growers who claim the "meats are good yet this year but can not be carried much longer and retain their flavor." Some of the nut meats held over, particularly imports, are from 1955.

Improved Market

Fieldrun walnuts brought 15 cents a pound last year. A little improvement is expected in the market this year, however.

"The situation with walnuts is somewhat different than with filberts," the cooperative manager said. "Here in Oregon we carry such a small segment of the market in walnuts. We are not one of the big producing areas. In filberts we produce more than other sections in this country."

'Ambassador' Plans Visit to Plug Festival

An 'Embajador de Fiesta del Pacifico' is scheduled to appear in Salem on June 5. In plain English it means ambassador of good will for the annual summer time Festival of the Pacific at San Diego, Calif.

The ambassador, Roy Parker, will come here in picturesque dress to bring official Fiesta greetings and invitations to Mayor Robert White and other city officials. Parker's wife will accompany him and the pair also will visit other Northwest cities.

Parker, a Lions official in San Diego, also will be welcomed by William Kinney, president of the Salem Lions Club. Arrangements for the Parker's visit were made through the Lions here.

The San Diego festival is scheduled from July 26 to August 10. It is tradition for San Diego residents to don Spanish garb to celebrate the event.

UN Forces Purchase Furniture in Israel

TEL AVIV, Israel, May 12 (AP) — UN Emergency Forces have bought \$2,000 worth of modern furniture in Israel and quietly transported it to officers' clubs in the Egyptian-controlled Gaza Strip. It is believed the first consignment of Israeli-made goods to enter Arab territory since Israel was founded nine years ago.
