She is a part time swimming instructor at the YMCA and is the outgoing president of the NWBA. Her league average is 165 and this season she set an all-time record for Salem women with a 657 series. 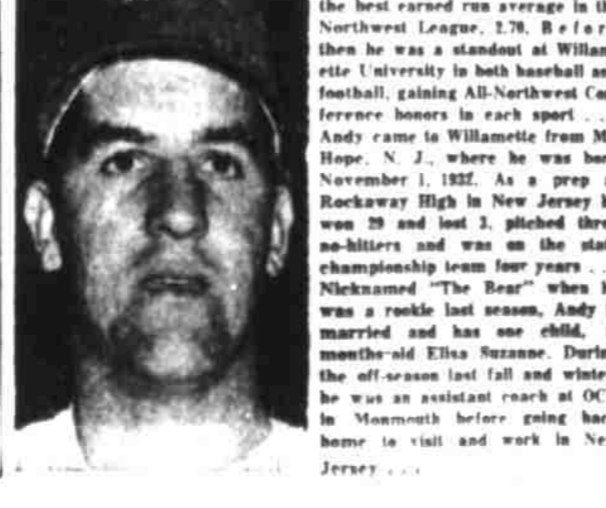

Nicknamed "The Bear" when he was a rookie last season, Andy is married and has one child, 5-month-old Eliza Suzanne. During the off-season last fall and winter, he was an assistant coach at OCE in Moonmouth before going back home to visit and work in New Jersey.

Braves Cop Two; Yanks, Chisox Win

Cincinnati tied its modern club record by running its winning streak to 12 games Sunday to remain in a first place tie with Milwaukee in the National League. Each team swept doubleheaders.

Chicago clung to its one-half game edge over New York in the American League by whipping Detroit 5-4 on two homers by Larry Doby and one by Walt Dropo.

Yankee homers accounted for all the runs in a 4-3 victory over Baltimore. Andy Garry hit two and Mantle one his first at Baltimore since 1953 breaking a 3-3 tie.

The Redlegs, who had won 11 in 1899 and 13 straight in 1900, equalled their 1939 mark of 12 in a row with 75 and 71 triumphs over Chicago. Frank Robinson had six hits in the double header including his fourth home run, boosting his average to .395. Reliever Raul Sanchez won the first while Don Gross went all the way for a four-hitter in the second.

Giants, Dodgers May Move in Package Deal

SAN FRANCISCO, May 12 (AP)—If the San Francisco and Los Angeles city administrations can deliver required commitments on new baseball park plans, the New York Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers are ready to ask National League owners in a secret poll for permission to move to California. Mayor George Christopher reported today.

Under the very tentative "package deal" which Christopher discussed in New York conferences Friday the Giants are supposed to be considering moving across the continent to San Francisco and the Dodgers from Ebbets field to Los Angeles.

Christopher, who flew back from New York yesterday, said he hoped for a firm declaration of intent by mid-July from Giant owner Horace Stoneham and Dodger president Walter O'Malley.

The next major league meeting is scheduled for the all star game in St. Louis July 9. The deal switching major league baseball to the Pacific Coast could be consummated by then, even though formal announcement could not be made under baseball rules until after Oct. 1, Christopher said.

Christopher planned to head a San Francisco delegation to the St. Louis all star game.

Under instructions from Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick not to make a Roman holiday out of franchise shift discussions, Stoneham and O'Malley were cagey about their comments on Christopher's disclosures yesterday.

Stoneham, playing it close to his vest, said he hoped to remain in New York "all things being equal."

The San Francisco board of supervisors will be asked tomorrow for a policy expression on an assurance tax would be levied here on baseball tickets. New York levies a 5 per cent amusement tax on all sports.

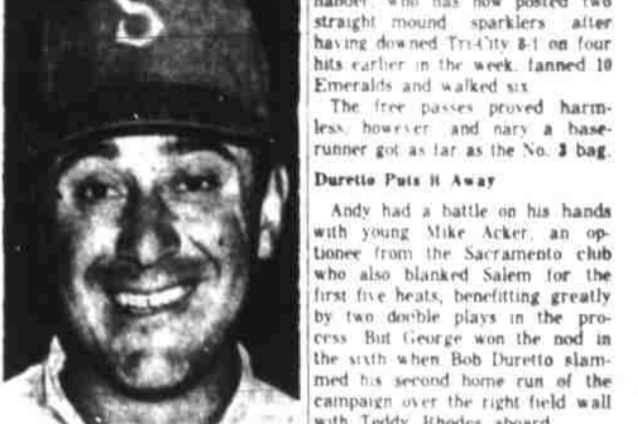
George's 1-Hit Stint, Duretto Homer Wins Opener; Rolin Victor

The scores were 2-0 and 3-1 in the winning clashes, and they gave Boss Brinner a outfit a right pleasing 3-1 verdict in the first series with Uncle Hugh Lutz's Emeralds.

Also, Salem vaulted right over the top of the Eugene and into third place in the Northwest League standings.

Sophomore George was never better as a pro than he was Sunday. The only bungle of him was a first inning single to right field by Chuck Stacy. The burly right-hander, who has now posted two straight mound sparklers after having fanned Tri-City 8-1 on four hits earlier in the week, fanned 10 Emeralds and walked six.

Andy had a battle on his hands with young Mike Acker, an optionee from the Sacramento club who also blanked Salem for the first five heats, benefitting greatly by two double plays in the process. But George won the nod in the sixth when Bob Duretto slammed his second home run of the campaign over the right field wall with Teddy Rhodes aboard.

With one out Rhodes gained life on Johnny Keller's error at short. Duretto swung on an inside fast ball and lofted it high over the wall near the first light pole. Right-fielder Herm Ross didn't even bother to look. He knew it was gone when it left the bat.

Salem continued the rally with two more hits off Acker, but another double play finally stopped it.

The Senators, who got a meagre seven hits in the first two games of the series, picked up eight in this one with Duretto and Gene Laursen each getting a pair.

Six Birdies Enable Demaret to Win Open

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., May 12 (AP)—Veteran Jimmy Demaret stroked six birdies on the first 10 holes today to shoot a 5 under par 67 and capture the \$20,000 Hot Springs Open Golf championship by one stroke.

The 46-year-old Shotmaker finished one stroke ahead of Mike Souchak, Lloyd Mangrum, Billy Maxwell, Jack Burke, and Johnny Palmer.

Demaret started the round two strokes behind Souchak in a bunch with Burke, Maxwell, Mangrum and four others at 209 for 54 holes. Palmer was 210 after three rounds.

Demaret's 73-66-70-67—276 is 12 strokes under par for the Hilly, 7,000-yard Hot Springs Country Club course.

His 31 on the par 36 front nine was within one stroke of the record set by Maxwell in 1955.

Had Only One Bogey

Demaret's crisp iron shots gave him five birdies on the front nine for a 3-stroke edge on Souchak at that point and he played steady, beady golf the rest of the way. Demaret had only one bogey.

The colorful Demaret, who shot a 66—the best round of the tournament—on Friday, said "I shot just as well today as I did when I had the 66." He rimmed the cup with a 2 1/2-footer on the 18th which would have given a 66 today.

Demaret, who started a strong comeback about 18 months ago picked up a \$2,000 check to bring his money winnings for the year to almost \$17,000.

Score's Eye 'Much Better'

CLEVELAND, May 12 (AP)—The injured right eye of Herb Score, Cleveland Indians pitcher, was described as "much better" by an eye specialist today.

Dr. Charles I. Thomas said he had seen about half the retina of the eye during today's examination and said it looks good. However, he would make no estimate of the time The Tribe's ace southpaw will have to remain at Lakeside Hospital.

12 Killed in Crash During Mille Maglia

BRESCIA, Italy, May 12 (AP)—Piero Taruffi, 54-year-old "Silver Fox" of Italian automobile racing, today won the tragedy-struck Mille Maglia which cost the lives of Spanish sportsman Marquis Alfonso De Portago, his American co-driver, and at least ten spectators.

Taruffi, competing for the 14th time in the 1,000 mile road classic from Brescia to Rome and back, won after two British favorites were forced out.

Stirling Moss of England dropped out when his Maserati developed engine trouble. Peter Collins, who led the race almost all the way, was sidelined about 125 miles from the finish when his Ferrari broke down.

Taruffi, driving a Ferrari, covered the grueling distance in 10 hours, 27 minutes, 47 seconds—an average of 94.78 miles per hour. Wolfgang Von Tripps of Germany, also in a Ferrari, was second.

The veteran Italian driver had been declared winner of the race only minutes before word was received of De Portago's crash at the tiny hamlet of Last-gramaldo, about 40 miles from here.

Killed also was Edmund (Eddy) Nelson of Beloit, Wis. Nelson was listed as co-driver.

The spectators died when De Portago's car, which had blown a tire, hurtled off the highway. Another driver, Josef Gottgens of Belgium, was listed in critical condition after his car, a Triumph, crashed into a road guard near Florence.

Wobbly No. 5 Pin Was Worth 10 G's

MEMPHIS, May 12 (AP)—A wobbly No. 5 pin that wouldn't fall cost bowler Julian Levitch \$10,000.

Levitch threw 11 straight strikes Saturday night. On his final ball, the No. 5 pin swayed but stayed up. He ended with 290.
